Introduction to the Journey of RUPP-AAS Collaboration in Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Cambodia

The RUPP-AAS Collaboration in Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Cambodia represents academic collaboration in a transformative shift in Cambodia's approach to Social Sciences and Humanities. Originally envisioned as "Developing the Social Sciences and Humanities in Asia," the initiative recognized the need to cultivate a knowledge ecosystem that not only advances academic research but also responds to the unique social and cultural challenges facing post-conflict and marginalized communities. Evolving from a focus on merely developing individual scholars, the project now aims to foster a resilient, community-engaged academic landscape where Cambodian researchers are empowered to effect meaningful change within and beyond scholarly circles

At the heart of this journey lies the belief that scholarly excellence must align with local relevance and social responsibility. As project leader, Dr. Un Leang notes, the initiative strives to "build scholarship that meets international standards while remaining grounded in the reality and context of Cambodian society." Supporting scholars from underrepresented backgrounds, particularly those from conflict-affected regions, this initiative provides essential resources—including research grants, travel opportunities, and mentorship—building their capacity and resilience to contribute knowledge that is both impactful and socially attuned.

2022 Journey: Developing Capacity-Building Program

The Capacity Development Workshop on Research in Cambodian Humanities and Social Sciences, held from 8-12 August 2022 at Maison Wat Kor, Battambang, was the first of two connected workshops, which marked the beginning of the Journey of RUPP-AAS Collaboration towards Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Cambodia. This workshop sought to address the need for revitalizing social sciences and humanities research in Cambodia, particularly given the limited opportunities and resources available to academics in these fields. Bringing together 19 participants from diverse academic and professional backgrounds, the workshop aimed to build foundational research capacity while fostering collaboration among Cambodian scholars.



Workshop I: Capacity Development on Research in Cambodian Social Sciences and Humanities

8-12 August 2022
Battambang, Cambodia

A key feature of the workshop was its integrative structure, blending theoretical training with hands-on fieldwork. Participants were equipped with essential skills in qualitative research, including research question formulation, ethnographic fieldwork, and academic abstract writing. Guided by a team of esteemed resource persons, the workshop offered an enriching learning experience. The local expertise was provided by RUPP-FSSH's faculty members, including Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Peou Chivoïn, and Dr. Timothy Rackett. External resource persons who offered academic supports in the first workshop included internationally recognized scholars such as Dr. Un Kheang (Northern Illinois University), Dr. Nathan Green (National University of Singapore), Dr. Sophea Young (University College London), Dr. Hy V. Luong (University of Toronto), Dr. Jennifer Estes (National University of Singapore), and Dr. John Forrest (State University of New York). Their diverse expertise enriched the participants' understanding of social sciences methodologies, fieldwork techniques, and academic writing.

The workshop's practical aspect included fieldwork in Battambang and Pursat Provinces, which further allowed participants to engage with local communities and explore Cambodia's socio-economic changes. This combination of expert guidance and real-world application provided participants with significant insights into conducting meaningful research. As the first in a series of capacity-building initiatives, this workshop laid a strong foundation for the RUPP-AAS collaboration's mission to cultivate a robust research culture in Cambodian social sciences and humanities.







Workshop II: Capacity Development Workshop on Research Concept Note on Cambodia Social Change and Participation in Qualitative Analysis Program

8-9 October 2022

Siem Reap, Cambodia

The Capacity Development Workshop on Research Concept Note on Cambodian Social Change and Participation in Qualitative Analysis Program, held on 8-9 October 2022 at The Sanctuary Residence in Siem Reap, was the second workshop in the 2022 Journey in Developing Capacity-Building Program. This workshop, as part of the Journey of RUPP-AAS Collaboration in Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Cambodia, furthered participants' research skills by introducing them to grounded theory methodology and qualitative analysis tools. Participants engaged in refining research questions, applying sensitizing concepts, and mastering memo writing and coding techniques to enhance their conceptual frameworks for exploring Cambodian social issues.

The workshop featured interactive sessions led by prominent resource persons, including Dr. Peou Chivoïn and Dr. Un Leang, who provided theoretical grounding in qualitative research methods and practical guidance. Participants were immersed in activities such as developing open-ended research questions, utilizing sensitizing concepts, engaging in memo writing, and applying coding techniques. A distinctive feature of this workshop was its emphasis on practice over lectures, allowing participants to revise and present their concept notes, with constructive feedback to refine their research strategies. This hands-on approach culminated in the selection of five outstanding concept notes for small grants to support further research.

A standout feature of this workshop was the awards of five Research Grants to five exceptional participants to further conduct the fieldwork for their research and had the opportunity to present their research at regional Symposium on Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Chiang Mai at the end of that year in 2022. This regional platform allowed Cambodian researchers to present their findings, engage in academic exchanges, and strengthen Cambodia's academic visibility in the regional research community, reflecting the growing capacity and ambition of Cambodian scholars. The workshop's impact was therefore extended beyond Cambodia and demonstrated a collective commitment to fostering innovative research in Cambodia and bridging local knowledge with regional and global academic standards.

2023 Journey: Expanding Capacity-Building Program in Cambodia

Workshop Series: “Writing Your Proposal for Doctoral Research in Social Sciences and Humanities”

The 2023 Journey was to expand Capacity-Building Program in Cambodia. As part of this journey, a series of four interconnected workshops was launched under the theme, “Writing Your Proposal for Doctoral Research in Social Sciences and Humanities,” which marked the second year of the RUPP-AAS Collaboration in Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities in Cambodia. These workshops were designed as a cohesive journey throughout 2023 to support doctoral students in developing comprehensive research proposals, enhancing their scholarly capability step-by-step.



Workshop I: Topic and Research Questions

27 February - 3 March 2023

Kampong Cham, Cambodia

The first workshop in the series, “Topic and Research Questions,” was held from 27 February to 3 March 2023, in Kampong Cham, Cambodia. It aimed to equip doctoral students with the skills to formulate impactful research questions and design robust research proposals in social sciences and humanities. Seventeen doctoral candidates participated, benefiting from the guidance of nine experienced resource persons.



The resource team featured distinguished academics, including Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Jenna Grant (University of Washington), Dr. Vong Sotheara (Royal University of Phnom Penh), Dr. Keo Chanvuthy, Dr. Sok Serey (Royal University of Phnom Penh), and Dr. Sou Veasna (Royal University of Phnom Penh), who brought their extensive

expertise to guide participants through the process of developing well-defined research topics and questions. They also provided detailed instruction on the structures and components required for effective doctoral research proposals. The sessions addressed practical topics such as refining research hypotheses, writing abstracts, conducting discourse analysis, and searching for scholarly literature. Participants actively engaged in hands-on exercises, personalized mentorship, and group discussions, fostering critical thinking and collaboration while gaining practical understandings about research design. This collaborative learning environment, coupled with constructive feedback from mentors and peers, laid the foundation for the subsequent workshops that ensured participants’ preparation for the next stages of their research proposal development.







Workshop II: Literature, Theory and You

22-26 April 2023

Kampot, Cambodia



The Workshop II on Literature, Theory, and You, held from 22-26 April 2023, at Les Manguiers in Kampot, Cambodia, was the second in the four-part series, “Writing Your Proposal for Doctoral Research in Social Sciences and Humanities.” Building on the foundational skills from the first workshop, this session focused on equipping doctoral students with the tools to conduct literature reviews, identify theoretical frameworks, and position their research within broader scholarly conversations.

Fifteen PhD students participated in this workshop, guided by a team of distinguished academics and researchers such as Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Jenna Grant, Dr. Ly Kimlong (Royal University of Phnom Penh), Dr. Eng Sothy (University of Hawaii), Dr. Im Soksamphoas (University of Michigan), and Dr. Keo Chanvuthy. The workshop covered a range of topics, such as integrating theory into research design, mapping scholarly conversations, identifying key articles and scholars, and drafting literature reviews. Through a combination of lectures, exercises, and group discussions, participants refined their ability to contextualize their research within existing literature and develop strong theoretical foundations.

This workshop also emphasized hands-on engagement through exercises like identifying key scholars, working with theory, and outlining literature reviews. Participants received personalized feedback from mentors and peers, which fostered a collaborative environment that helped strengthen their scholarly skills. As a vital step in the connected journey throughout 2023, this workshop ensured participants were well-prepared to advance their doctoral research proposals and contributed to the ongoing development of academic capacity in Cambodia’s social sciences and humanities.





Workshop III: Methods, Data, Ethics and Writing

3-7 June 2023

Battambang, Cambodia

The Workshop III on Methods, Data, Ethics, and Writing, held from 3-7 June 2023, at the Sanctuary Villa in Battambang, Cambodia, was the third workshop of the four-part series, "Writing Your Proposal for Doctoral Research in Social Sciences and Humanities." As part of the 2023 Journey, this workshop focused on equipping doctoral students with the knowledge and skills to design robust methodologies, address ethical challenges, and enhance academic writing for their doctoral research proposals.

This session brought together 16 PhD students, supported by 13 expert resource persons, including Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Jenna Grant, Dr. Keo Chanvuthy, Dr. Chann Sophea (Michigan State University), Dr. Miriam Stark (University of Hawaii), and Prof. Chhem K. Rethy, among others. Participants investigated the essential topics of research methodology, data management, and ethical considerations, with an emphasis on practical exercises, peer reviews, and personalized mentorship. Key focuses include developing detailed methodologies, which align data collection with research objectives and address ethical responsibilities in fieldwork.

In the workshop, participants received tailored feedback from mentors and peers, which enabled them to integrate methodological rigor and ethical depth into their research designs. This workshop built on the progress made in earlier sessions to help prepare participants to move confidently toward the final stages of their doctoral proposal development while reinforcing the RUPP-AAS collaboration's commitment to advancing social sciences and humanities research in Cambodia.







Workshop IV: Conducting Literature Review for PhD Thesis in Social Sciences and Humanities

22-26 September 2023

Siem Reap, Cambodia



The Workshop IV on Conducting Literature Review for PhD Thesis in Social Sciences and Humanities, held from 22-26 September 2023, at Sanna Villa Residence in Siem Reap, Cambodia, concluded the four-part series, "Writing Your Proposal for Doctoral Research in Social Sciences and Humanities." This workshop equipped participants with advanced skills to conduct systematic and comprehensive literature reviews, essential for crafting high-quality PhD theses.

The workshop, attended by 22 participants, was led by a distinguished team of speakers and resource persons, including Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Uk Krisna (Association for Asian Studies), Prof. Furrukh Khan (Lahore University of Management Sciences), Prof. Anagha Tambe (Savitribai Phule Pune University), Prof. John Marston (El Colegio de México), and Dr. Po Sovinda (Royal University of Phnom Penh). Participants were guided on techniques for searching, citing, and critiquing existing literature, identifying research gaps, and synthesizing studies to formulate credible research problems. Emphasis was also placed on connecting literature reviews with fieldwork data to ensure originality and relevance in their research.



In addition to the workshop's intensive training, the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities facilitated the participation of some selected PhD students in two prestigious academic events in South Korea. These included the AAS Symposium "Mainstreaming the Margins" held from 21-22 June 2023, in Seoul, and the AAS in Asia Conference held from 24-27 June 2023, in Daegu. These events provided participants with a platform to present their research, engage with international scholars, and integrate their learnings into regional and global academic discourse. These opportunities further underscored the RUPP-AAS collaboration's unwavering commitment to nurturing research excellence and promoting Cambodian scholars on international stages.



As a continuation of this momentum, the workshop series, “Mentorship on PhD Writing Journey and Journal Article Writing,” was launched in 2024 with the aim of equipping participants with essential skills for crafting strong PhD research proposals and writing publishable journal articles. The workshop series has four connected workshops, which were conducted from April to November 2024. This initiative focuses on fostering a strong and sustainable academic environment by guiding doctoral students and early-career researchers through the complexities of research design and academic writing.

Orientation to the 2024 Workshop Series

20 April 2024

Royal University of Phnom Penh



In preparation for the “Mentorship on PhD Writing Journey and Journal Article Writing” Workshop Series, the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities at the Royal University of Phnom Penh hosted an orientation session for participants, resource persons, and organizers, which took place on the morning of 20 April 2024, at the Institute for International Studies and Public Policy, Royal University of Phnom Penh.

This session aimed to familiarize attendees with the workshop series’ objectives, structure, and expected outcomes, ensuring everyone was well-informed about their roles and responsibilities throughout the program. The session was welcomed by Dr. Un Leang who emphasized the significance of the initiative for academic capacity building in Cambodia and followed by an overview of the workshop schedule and activities by Dr. Po Sovinda and a presentation on the logistical preparations for the four workshops by Mr. Ly Makara. The orientation facilitated meaningful connections among participants and resource persons, creating a strong foundation for collaborative engagement during the workshops. The session ended with a group photo and a chance for further networking over coffee at Nisset Coffee.



Workshop I: Introduction, Research Puzzle and Question

26-28 April 2024
Kampot, Cambodia



The Workshop I which introduced the Workshop Series, “PhD Writing Journey and Journal Article Writing,” held from 26-28 April 2024 at Kampot Sweet Boutique in Kampot Province, Cambodia, marked the beginning of the 2024 Journey: Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities Research in Cambodia. This first part of the four-part workshop series aimed to provide doctoral students and early-career researchers with critical skills in crafting PhD research proposals and developing publishable journal articles.



The workshop was attended by 10 PhD students and 10 early-career researchers, supported by an accomplished team of resource persons, including Prof. Chet Chealy, Dr. Un Kheang (Northern Illinois University and in August 2023 became Secretary of State of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation), Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Alisa Freedman (University of Oregon), Dr. Chheang Vannarith (Angkor Social Innovation Park), Dr. Ky Sereyvath (Institute of China Studies, Royal

Academy of Cambodia) and several others. Sessions covered essential topics such as structuring research proposals, formulating research questions, and outlining methodologies.

This workshop brought together a dynamic group of 32 people, including 10 PhD students and 10 early-career researchers, alongside several staff members, distinguished speakers, and resource persons. In addition to the sessions of interaction and mentorship between resource persons and workshop participants, the first edition of the workshop series featured a series of impactful addresses and presentations by esteemed academics and professionals, including:

- Presentation on “PhD Research Proposal: A Perspective from an Examiner” by Dr. Ky Sereyvath, Director General, Institute of China Studies, Royal Academy of Cambodia

Workshop II: Research Framework: Qualitative and Quantitative

7-9 June 2024

Sihanoukville, Cambodia



Building upon the success of Workshop I, the Workshop II on Research Framework: Qualitative and Quantitative, held from 7-9 June 2024, at the Sea Breeze Hotel & Villa in Sihanoukville, Cambodia, served as the second milestone in the Workshop Series. This workshop aimed to deepen participants' understanding of research frameworks, emphasizing their importance in aligning methodologies with research objectives and ensuring the rigor and relevance of academic research.

All the 20 participants from Workshop I attended Workshop II. They were guided by a distinguished team of resource persons such as Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Kuok Fidero (Ministry of Industry, Science, Technology, and Innovation), Dr. Lay Sok Heng (National Bank of Cambodia), Dr. Heng Kimkong (Cambodian Education Forum), Dr. Keo Chanvuthy, and Dr. Po Sovinda. Participants had several rounds of mentorship from the resource persons to help them design their research frameworks, integrate theoretical perspectives, and address ethical challenges in research. Structured sessions, including expert-led presentations, interactive mentoring, and peer collaboration, ensured participants had practical opportunities to apply their learning.











Workshop III: Research Methodology and Findings

9-11 August 2024

Siem Reap, Cambodia

The Workshop III on Research Methodology and Findings, held from 9-11 August 2024, at Mony Rothna Villa in Siem Reap, Cambodia, was the third session of the Workshop Series. This third workshop focused on equipping participants with advanced skills in qualitative and quantitative data collection, analysis, and the presentation of findings, building upon their previous milestones in the series.

The workshop hosted 16 participants, reduced from the original 20, due to the workshop series' rigorous milestone requirements. Only participants who submitted their milestones from previous workshops within the workshop series—such as drafting and submitting earlier components of their research proposals—were eligible to progress to subsequent sessions. This requirement was to ensure that participants remained committed to their research journeys and were prepared for the advanced content of this session.

Under the guidance of our esteemed resource persons, including Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Sok Serey, and Dr. Po Sovinda, participants gained hands-on experience with practical methods for data collection and analysis, alongside effective strategies for writing and presenting research findings. The workshop emphasized an interactive approach, combining personalized mentorship with collaborative learning, which allowed participants to refine their research methodologies and enhance the quality of their results. With a dynamic and supportive environment, this workshop upheld high standards of engagement and achievement, further advancing the RUPP-AAS collaboration's mission to build a sustainable and impactful research culture in Cambodia.









Workshop IV: Writing Up Your PhD Thesis Proposal and Journal Article

27-29 November 2024

Kirirom National Park, Kampong Speu, Cambodia



The Workshop IV on Writing Up Your PhD Thesis Proposal and Journal Article, held from 27-29 November 2024, at Kirirom National Park, Kampong Speu, Cambodia, marked the final session of the Workshop Series. This culminating workshop provided participants with the opportunity to synthesize their work into a well-structured PhD thesis proposal and a publishable journal article, while celebrating the achievements of the 2024 journey. Guided by a distinguished panel of resource persons—Dr. Un Kheang, Dr. Soeng Reth (Ministry of Economy and Finance), Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Keuk Chan Narith (Institute of Foreign Languages, RUPP), Dr. Peou Chivoine, and Dr. Po Sovinda—this final workshop of the 2024 workshop series emphasized advanced mentoring and collaborative feedback to 12 remaining participants, reduced from 16 in the third workshop, at the final stage of their work throughout the whole 2024 journey with the workshop series.

A standout moment of the workshop was the announcement of three research grants, each valued at USD 2,000, awarded to Ms. Sun Theary, Mr. Aun Youvara, and Ms. Bou Sesil to support field studies for their research projects. While Ms. Bou Sesil was unable to attend the final workshop, her absence marked a significant achievement as she had recently been awarded an Australian Awards Scholarship to pursue her PhD at the Australian National University in Australia. Notably, she acknowledged the invaluable contribution of the workshop series, which played a significant role in preparing her for both her PhD application and her successful Australian Awards Scholarship. This highlights the transformative impact of the program in shaping participants' academic and professional trajectories, which demonstrates the profound influence of the projects on advancing participants' academic and professional goals.

At the final session, participants presented their finalized proposals and journal articles and received constructive critiques to refine their work further. The sessions focused on writing their conclusions, enhancing academic rigor, coherence, and readiness for publication. In addition, Workshop IV also featured a special guest lecture titled “Communicating Your Research Findings to the Publics” by Mr. Leang Delux, Executive Director of ThmeyThmey News. This session covered the critical importance of effectively translating complexity of academic research into accessible narratives for broader audiences.



The workshop series concluded with a comprehensive wrap-up report delivered by Dr. Un Leang, summarizing the significant milestones and accomplishments of the 2024 journey. Dr. Un Leang highlighted the participants’ progress throughout the workshop series and emphasized how each workshop systematically contributed to enhancing their research capabilities, from developing foundational concepts to preparing final PhD proposals and journal articles. He also acknowledged the dedication of the resource persons and organizers in providing continuous mentorship and creating a supportive learning environment. The wrap-up underscored the series’ role in fostering a collaborative research community and its contribution to the broader goal of building sustainable academic excellence in Cambodia.



Following the report, Prof. Chet Chealy, Rector of RUPP, delivered heartfelt closing remarks. He commended the participants for their unwavering commitment to advancing their academic pursuits and praised the transformative nature of the workshop series in empowering Cambodia’s next generation of scholars. Prof. Chet Chealy reaffirmed the critical importance of such initiatives, not only in developing individual research skills but also in strengthening the

country’s higher education and social sciences and humanities research landscape. His remarks concluded with a message of encouragement for participants to continue contributing to Cambodia’s academic growth and global research dialogue.

I helped develop and organize the workshops: Writing your PhD Research Proposal in 2023. There were three workshops: 1) Topic & Research Questions; 2) Literature, Theory & You; 3) Methods, Data, Ethics & Writing. For these workshops, I worked with Dr. Un Leang and Dr. Keo Chanvuthy to identify and invite guest speakers based in Cambodia and the U.S. (some via zoom); develop the syllabus, including exercises; give feedback on student work; and generally, help with running the workshops, with the RUPP FSSH Khmer Studies PhD Program team. Students worked very hard during the workshops. They were challenged to think and write quite a lot. I was impressed with their dedication and how they came together during the workshops to support and encourage each other. Students have many pressures on their time and energy, including work and family, in addition to their PhD studies. Outside the workshops, it was hard to keep the community going as their commitments sometimes took over.

This was some of the most rewarding work I have done. I was challenged by the students to decolonize my approach to teaching theory, methods, and literature reviews. I learned a lot from them and my colleagues and brought some of the lessons home to my teaching of research design at the University of Washington in 2024. I also value becoming familiar with their research topics and those of our guest speakers, and more generally getting to know a bit more about higher education in Cambodia. Whereas I want to encourage students and faculty to participate in workshops such as 'Writing your PhD proposal', I also want to support Dr. Un Leang, Dr. Keo Chanvuthy, and their team to not have to rely on workshops to educate their students. The Khmer Studies PhD faculty and staff work extremely hard with few resources and structural support. It is hard to know how I can best contribute over the long term in a meaningful and sustainable way.

My journey as an educator began in high school, where I taught English, and later transitioned to higher education, teaching tourism and hotel management. However, my life took a deep personal turn when my son was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Suddenly, I wasn't just an educator—I became a mother determined to find solutions for my child in a system that offered little support for children with ASD.

Living in Kampong Thom province, 200 kilometers from Phnom Penh, I faced significant challenges in finding resources and understanding autism in rural Cambodia. When I enrolled my son in a local school with neurotypical children, I hoped he would adapt and flourish. Instead, he faced discrimination and isolation due to his social and communication difficulties. These painful experiences made me realize that the current educational system in Cambodia does not fit the needs of children with ASD and inspired me to take action. Determined to make a change, I embarked on a PhD in Curriculum and Instruction, focusing on identifying the core social skills children with ASD need to thrive in mainstream education. My goal is to develop an educational model tailored to Cambodia's context—one that gives children like my son a chance to grow and be included.



Joining the Workshop Series, “Mentorship on PhD Writing Journey and Journal Article Writing” has been a transformative experience in my academic and personal journey. The workshops provided structured guidance and close mentorship, which have been instrumental in shaping my research. Through this program, I learned how to frame my research questions, develop a solid methodology, and write effectively to communicate my findings. The mentors not only offered academic guidance but also encouraged me to connect my personal story with my research, giving my work both depth and meaning. One of the most impactful moments of the workshop series was receiving a research grant of \$2,000 to support my data collection. While the amount may seem modest, it has made a world of difference for me.

This grant has allowed me to travel to rural areas, conduct interviews, and gather the necessary data to support my study. For a researcher like me, working in a resource-limited setting, this support has been both practical and empowering. It has enabled me to move forward with confidence and focus. Furthermore, the close mentorship offered by the workshop has been invaluable. Over the months, the mentors have not only monitored my progress but have also provided constructive feedback at every step. They helped me refine my research framework, focus on achievable objectives, and prepare for academic publication. This personalized guidance has brought me closer to completing my research and achieving my vision of creating a model of education that fits Cambodia’s unique context.

My research is not just about my son—it is about the many children with ASD in Cambodia who deserve better opportunities. I believe investing in early childhood education for children with autism is not just a necessity for families like mine; it is a societal imperative. Early intervention unlocks the potential of these children, allowing them to contribute meaningfully to our communities. Thanks to the workshop series, I am now equipped with the tools, knowledge, and support to bring my research to life. Together, we can bridge the gaps in special education and create a more inclusive Cambodia—one where every child, regardless of ability, has the opportunity to thrive for a better future.



Embarking on a PhD journey often stems from a deep desire to explore, understand, and contribute meaningfully to addressing complex issues. For me, this decision emerged after a decade-long career as a tax advisor. While I excelled at crafting solutions to immediate challenges, I realized I needed more tools to deeply analyze and address the systemic problems underlying these issues. The decision to transition from a seasoned professional to an early-career researcher wasn't easy. I spent over a year resolving personal and financial considerations, weighing the security of a stable career against the uncertainty of a four-year PhD journey. Ultimately, I decided to pursue research on economic policy, an area closely aligned with my professional expertise and growing interests.



While developing my research proposal and seeking potential supervisors and funding, I came across a Facebook post from the Faculty of the Social Sciences and Humanities of the Royal University of Phnom Penh announcing a workshop series for PhD students and early-career researchers. Despite initial doubts, I applied and was thrilled to be accepted. The workshop series became a turning point in my journey. I vividly remember the first workshop in April 2024, where I was surrounded by my peers and mentors from diverse fields. The workshops provided invaluable opportunities to refine my research proposal through insightful feedback that challenged my assumptions. The ideas and discussions sparked during these sessions shaped how I articulated my research vision in my application for the Australia Awards Scholarship.

The resource persons and speakers were incredibly knowledgeable and supportive. The guidance of resource persons like Dr. Kuok Fidero went beyond academic support; it created opportunities for collaboration that significantly strengthened my research proposal. During the workshop series period, I had the opportunity to collaborate with Dr. Kuok Fidero on a research article proposal, which enabled me to compete for the RUPP-AAS Research Grant to support my data collection. Around the same time, furthermore, I received an invitation to interview for the Australia Awards Scholarship. Remarkably, the questions I faced during the interview mirrored those posed by mentors during the workshops. This experience made me realize how thoroughly the workshops had prepared me for the scholarship process.

Now, as an accepted PhD student at the Australian National University, set to begin in 2025, I reflect on the transformative role the three RUPP workshops played in my journey. They not only sharpened my critical thinking but also pushed me beyond my comfort zone, both academically and professionally. I remain deeply grateful to the organizers, resource persons, and mentors for their dedication to developing Cambodian research capacity and supporting aspiring scholars like me.

Mr. Hun Chhunteng: My Personal Journey: Placing a Keystone for a Great Temple Participant in the Expanding Capacity-Building Program Journey in 2023 and in the Cultivating Social Sciences and Humanities Research Journey in 2024



I am currently an Associate Professor at the Royal University of Phnom Penh, where I specialize in Khmer epigraphy, particularly the Old Khmer language. With over ten years of experience in higher education, I have noticed that many students struggle with the basics of the Khmer language. They frequently devote significant effort to understanding ancient literature that should be more accessible. Furthermore, many high school teachers lack knowledge of Khmer inscriptions, resulting in the spread of incorrect information due to the absence of key texts on Cambodian epigraphy in the Khmer language. This situation creates a cyclical effect in which minor knowledge gaps grow into substantial inadequacies over time. This issue reminds me of the keystones in a temple; without a proper keystone, the structure will collapse.

Reflecting on my educational journey, I recall visiting the Pursat Provincial Museum in eighth grade, where I saw two sandstone doorframes carved with Old Khmer scripts. This experience spurred my interest in reading and comprehending Khmer inscriptions, which motivated me to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Khmer Literature, a Master's degree in Linguistics, and, most recently, a PhD in Khmer Studies. Throughout my academic career, I have faced two significant challenges: resource availability and study methods. Promoting the field to students and the general public has been difficult, as many important documents are in foreign languages, and there is limited interest in Khmer literature. Furthermore, I have struggled with a lack of confidence in my research abilities, particularly in terms of publishing internationally recognized works. These challenges inspired me to enroll in a PhD program and attend courses designed to improve my skills.



The journey with the workshop series with the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities of the Royal University of Phnom Penh has provided treasured insights into the process of producing and publishing articles in peer-reviewed journals. Engaging with seasoned researchers and experts from other sectors has greatly expanded my understanding and knowledge. As part of my PhD program, I am required to publish two articles—one globally and one locally—so my participation in this series has been especially valuable. My PhD research focuses on the evolution of the Khmer script, which has been largely overlooked by previous scholars.

While many researchers have prioritized reading Cambodian epigraphy to reconstruct the knowledge of history, culture, and religion, the evolution of the Khmer script has received scant attention. Although this subject appears neglected, much of the knowledge gained over a century ago is still mentioned in textbooks without sufficient verification. When discussing the evolution of the script, it is critical to evaluate not just the script itself but also its relationships to society in various contexts. The script is an important part of national identity since it reflects the cultural and historical narrative of the Khmer people.

Finally, my goal is to provide comprehensive publications on Cambodian epigraphy in the Khmer language, promoting this knowledge within Khmer society while critically evaluating and decolonizing current narratives established by French and Western researchers. To accomplish this, I must first develop a solid understanding of the Old Khmer script and its historical relationships with society. Once again, I compare my initial steps to a keystone, which is critical to the structural integrity of a great temple.
