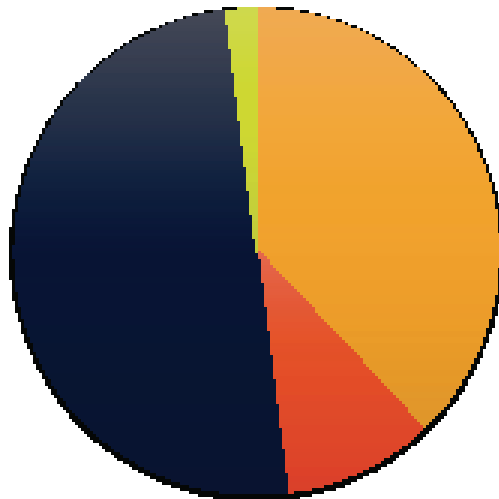

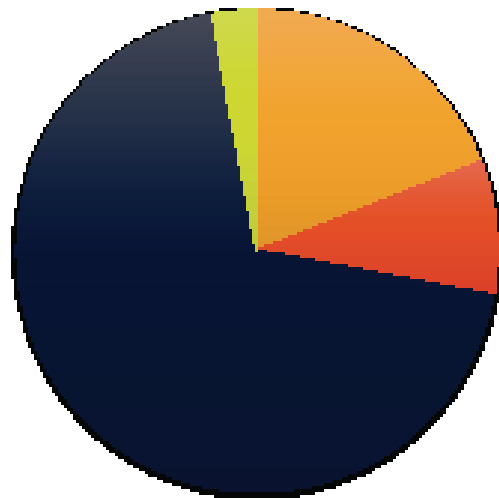

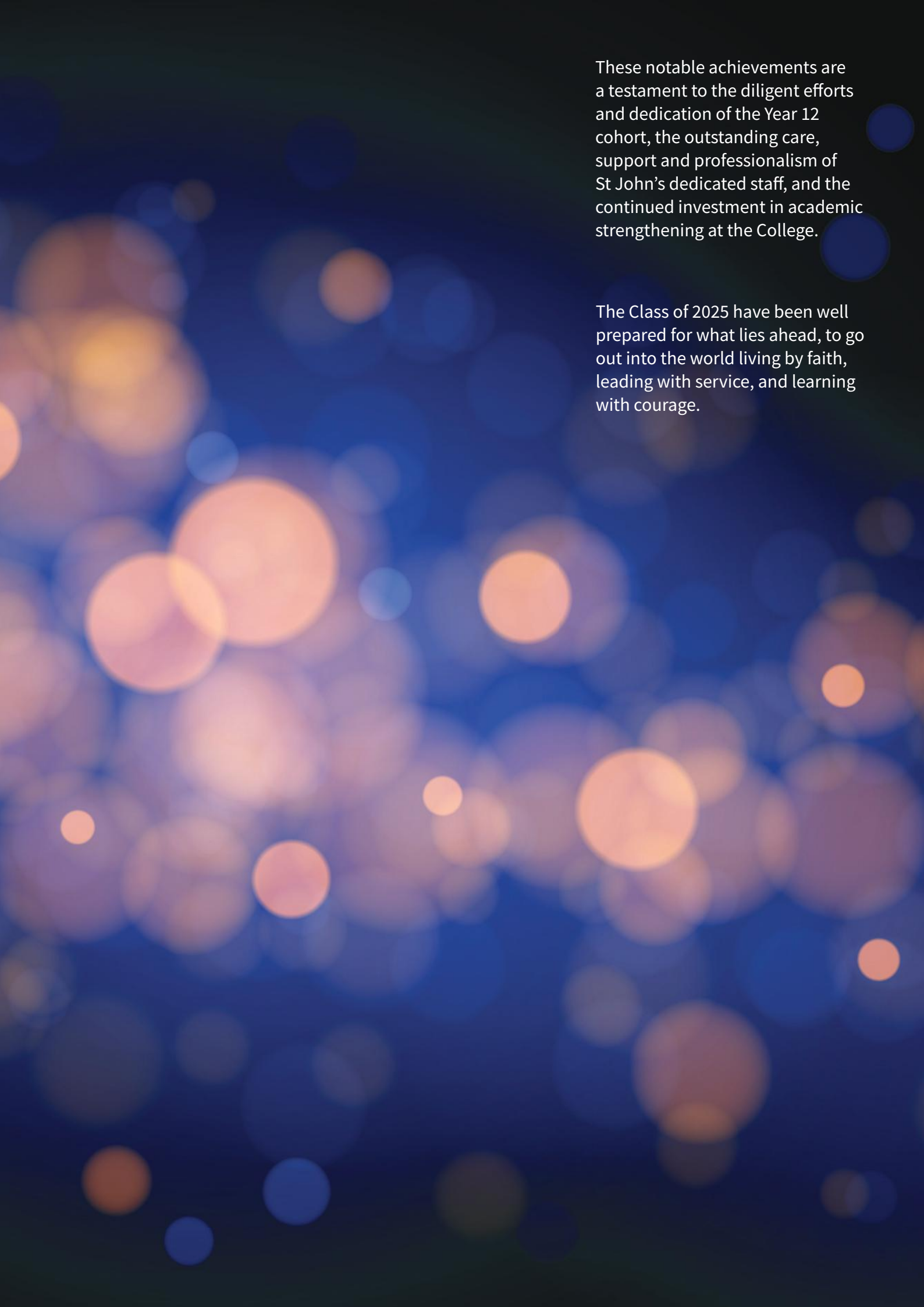
In 2025, seven St John's senior students achieved an A in every subject they studied and eight students achieved 100% on one or more external examinations.

Over 50% of our ATAR eligible students achieved an ATAR of 80 or above. An ATAR of 80 represents the top 20% of ATAR eligible students in the state.

Students must give permission to QTAC for schools to be advised of ATARs. Not all students in the 2023 Year 12 cohort have done so.

FAITH MISSION AND WELLBEING ENTERPRISE

The College's wellbeing framework is continually refined equip our students with the skills to navigate life's challenges. The Pulse program, which measures wellbeing for students in Years 3-12, has expanded and the data collected informs necessary adjustments to further enhance our wellbeing initiatives.

Staff continue to be trained to teach The Rite Journey to ensure we have quality staff teaching the program. Approximately 50% of staff have completed mental health first aid training, and students will be offered the opportunity to complete mental health first aid training in 2025. Approximately 40 students received training in 2025.

Wellbeing lessons continue for our Year 11 and 12 students. The variety of programs offered continues to grow, as does student engagement.

The College Psychologists provided weekly wellbeing tips to our staff, and coordinated initiatives for whole school staff and student wellbeing activities. They also presented to Junior School parents on building resilience, managing anxiety and worry in our younger students. Students participated in the Peaceful Kids program delivered by staff which develops resilience with the aid of coping strategies.



The Coman Building on the Junior Campus was refurbished at the end of 2025 to incorporate separate meeting spaces to provide a Faith Mission and Wellbeing area for our Junior students. In conjunction with the University of Queensland, the College was involved in co-designing the Groups 4 Health program which is designed to enhance the ability to connect with others.

Students across both campuses participate in Cyber Safety classes. In addition, a series of guest speakers is engaged to deliver targeted messages to all year levels on the Secondary Campus. Students in Years 7-9 participate in Character Builders sessions, while Years 10 and 11 attend YLead workshops. Year 12 students take part in a two-day leadership retreat.
