Noisy in the prisons



Nick Stirling has been MCM's prison chaplain since Covid closed the Narrowgate Shelter. He made a lot of noise about Jesus back in the shelter days, telling people who were experiencing homelessness about Jesus, through 'one to one' work and the worship which took place in the nightly shelter devotions.

He is still noisy now, leading courses like 'Alpha' and 'The Bible Course' - an eight-session course designed to help people explore the BIG story about lesus.

Nick says, "Prisons are always noisy places. There is the constant chatter on our two-way radios, the loud clank-closing of heavy doors and steel barred gates, and the rattle of meal trolleys or cleaners' carts up and down the corridors. Most disturbing of all are the sounds made by an inmate in distress "

At Christmas time, more joyful noises are added to the clamour. As the Prisoners Choir and band rehearse for the Carol service, they stand in competition with the inevitable caterwauling and door banging emanating from the cells of less pious prisoners.



This Christmas, let love be the loudest noise in our prisons. May the quiet strains of the **Gospel of Peace drown** out other noise!

Competing voices in the home

Cath Stirling spends a lot of her time on the phone; much of it waiting to get put through to the right department and then to the right person. Advocacy is a challenging occupation; there is no shortage of people who need support because there is no shortage of housing problems, benefit failures or folk who have simply fallen on hard times.

Cath represents those of us who get bewildered by bureaucracy and lost in the endless game of switchboard shuffle; being passed from pillar to post. For some it's just too much, especially at this time of year when money can be tight and there are competing demands on scant resources. Cath said. It seems ironic that celebrating the birth of the Prince of Peace has become so stressful, especially for those on the edges of society. The support that Cath offers can help reduce the noise of internal conflict so that people can make the right choices. Sometimes, all it takes is a phone call.

This time last year, 'A' and her family were thrilled when Cath found them a home in time for Christmas. They are now looking forward to a 2nd Christmas in their own home. --

Seven:Nine

Last summer there was a lot of noise on our streets as protestors, fuelled by Islamophobic sentiment and fake news, went on the rampage. A lot of bottles, bricks, insults and accusations were thrown around. Emotions ran deep and the message of hate was broadcast at maximum volume

This time of year gives Sarah, from our Seven:Nine project, an opportunity to turn up the volume a little as she shares the message of Christmas with Muslims in schools, in the Holy Book discussion groups, and in the English class - which enjoys a party with celebratory food.

In contrast, the message about the love of God, in Jesus, for Muslim people needs to be like a quiet, but constant, melody; persistently woven into the background hum of everyday life. Too loud can be counterproductive.

- The ENGAGE Matrix: How every believer has a part to play in evangelistic mission.
- Working with homeless people.
- How to work with church leaders to set up outreach activities.
- How to lead a team.
- Practical experience in a wide variety of evangelistic projects including church-based outreach.
- Monthly 1:1 coaching and mentoring sessions.

Threshold Coaching

Threshold Coaching is a new MCM project offered freely to those in Christian ministry of all kinds.



Joy in the Prison

Cath and Nick Stirling were visiting Forest Bank Prison to take a service. Cath had forgotten to take ID and had to take a 1 hour round trip to go home and collect it. As she was driving home she asked God why it had happened? Why had she forgotten to take ID when she has been before and knows full well how strict the system is. She arrived back at the prison with only 15 minutes of the service left. The 'lads' did some good-humoured jeering about her lateness, so she told them about the forgotten ID and how, no matter how much she had smiled, cajoled or said, "I'm with him", they would not let her in. She then reminded the lads that one day, they will stand before the gates of heaven and, unless they have the right ID, they would not be able to enter. A short while later, 7 souls raised their hands and were led into the kingdom.



Vital Comunication

Paul had wondered if there would be any demand for the pre-paid SIM cards that had been provided to MCM by 'Good Things Foundation'. However, just 2 weeks later, Paul met 'C' in Piccadilly Gardens who explained that she was finding it hard to stay in touch with the agencies dealing with her case because she had no credit. Paul asked what provider she used and it turned out to match some of the SIM cards that Paul had been given. Shortly after, a similar request for credit was made by someone else on the streets. Communication is vital for those trying to move on and we are blessed by the support given to us which allows us to offer targeted care in our work.
