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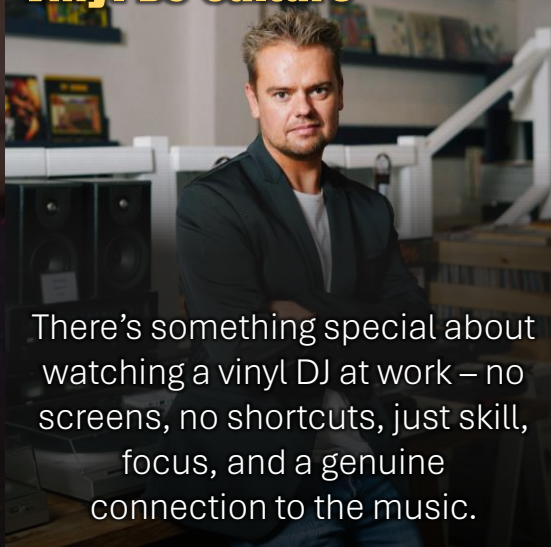

Global Icons, Local Leaders

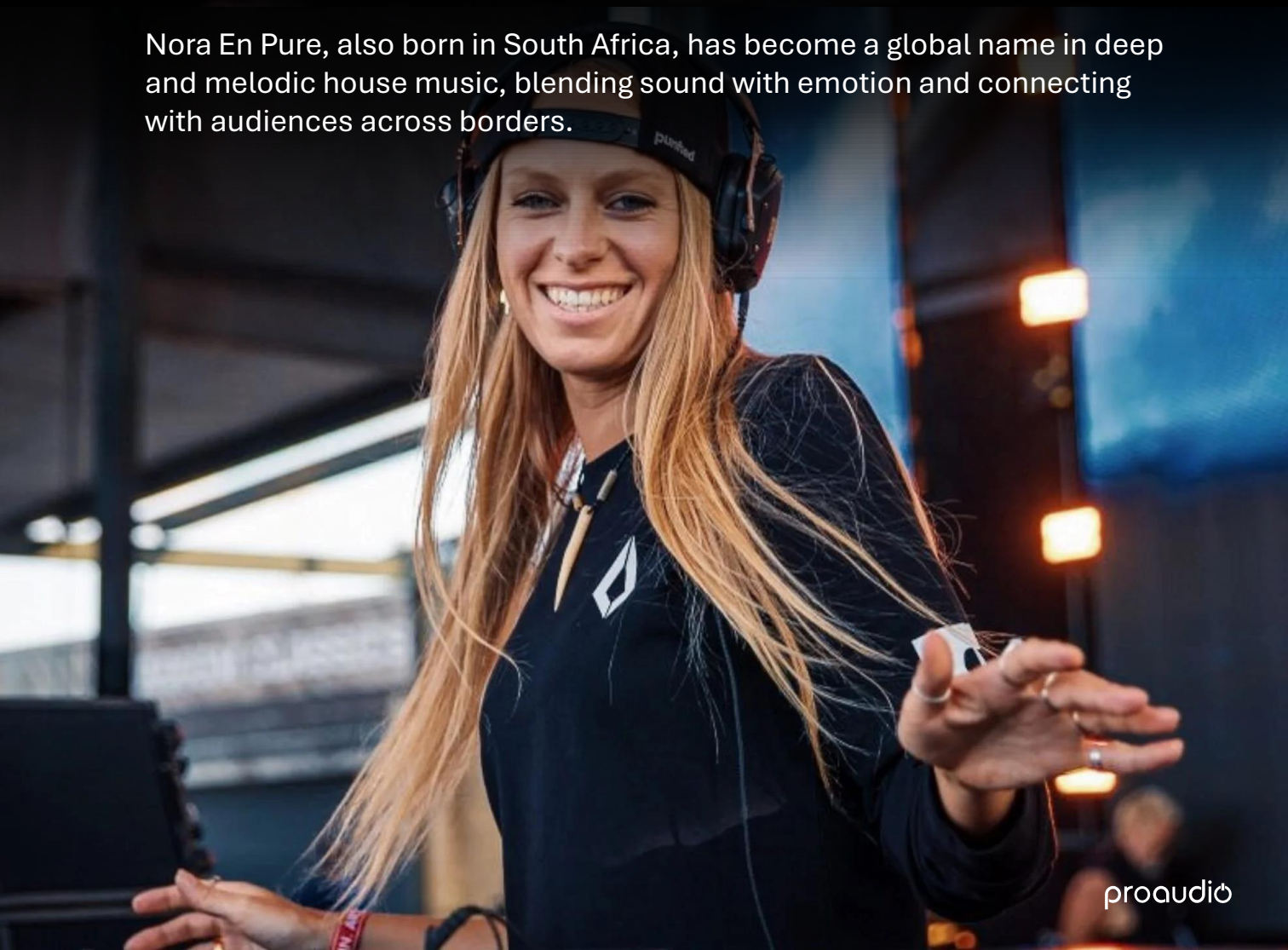
The global stage has seen the rise of powerful female figures who are not only headlining major festivals and tours, but also influencing sound, style, and culture.

– Celebrating 20 Years with a South African Pioneer

Born and raised in the vibrant streets of Soweto, DJ Buhle has been a defining voice in South Africa's deep house and dub music scene since 2005. With a hypnotic, soulful sound and a career that spans 20 influential years, Buhle stands as a symbol of perseverance, authenticity, and sonic excellence.

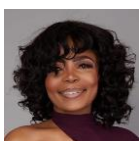
As one of the country's most respected female DJs, her journey has earned her titles like *Best Female DJ 2019*, *Top 10 Deep House Female DJ 2020*, and a consistent place in the hearts of fans nationwide.

In 2025, she marks her 20th anniversary in music – a journey punctuated by timeless productions such as *Winter's Call* and *Autumn Tips*, groundbreaking performances at festivals like Ultra and Adjuna, and unforgettable residencies with Deep Town Jozi. Having recently opened for Nora En Pure for a second year in a row, DJ Buhle remains rooted, inspired, and ever-evolving.





DJ Buhle, you've been part of the deep house scene since the early 2000s. Can you share with us how you first discovered your passion for electronic music and what inspired you to become a DJ?

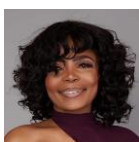


It was on the Sunday Surgery on 5fm with Roger Goode, I always wondered what they were doing on those knobs. Then in 2005 I learnt how to play being taught by Slaka Vega from Orlando west and it was on that same week where I got a job so I could purchase my own records.

I've always had a thing for sound because I did also studied Radio/Tv Presenting and Drama. I did I.T / project management so I did kind of have an idea that I would be in the industry being a radio presenter or DJ.



Growing up in Soweto and Johannesburg, how did your environment influence your sound and style as a deep house artist?

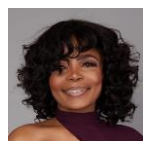


Well it takes a lot to stand out and I've always known that I was different and through that I've learnt so many things and not take things personally.

Being many of the First Lady djs in the industry, it was tough, but the support system was there in a sense that I would always be reminded that ma'am no one is going to spoon feed you. Always play your heart out!

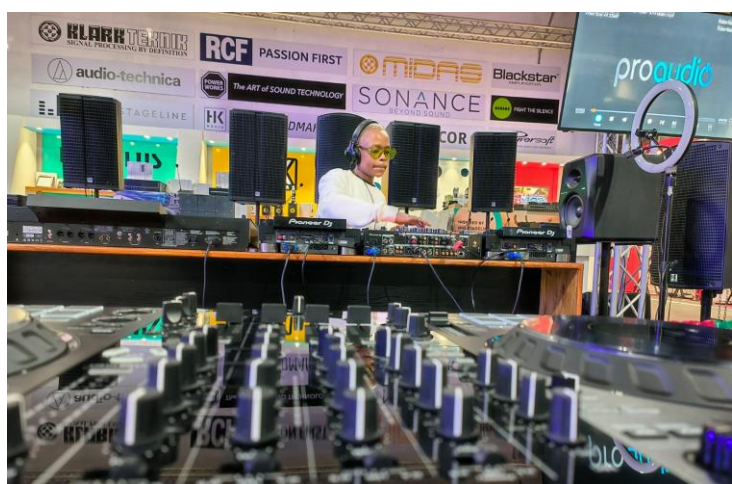


2025 marks 20 years since you started your career - how would you describe your growth as a DJ and producer over the past two decades?



It's been intense and challenging but I'm rolling with the punches & it doesn't help that now everything is about "numbers and influence " the industry has changed and happy to have witnessed the changes- though some were uncomfortable.

Also running my record label also has its own challenges you know. The admin and trying to get the right sound. Also people still don't believe me when I tell them I still get nervous before I play.





You've achieved incredible milestones like Best Female DJ 2019 and being named one of the Top 20 Female DJs in Africa. Looking back, what has been your biggest highlight or proudest moment in your career so far?



Every show for me is always a huge milestone hey, the residencies and all of the above! However, honestly winning Best female DJ in 2023 for "3 jester street" - that was epic!



In March, you opened for Nora En Pure, a renowned international DJ. How was that experience, and what did it mean for you professionally and personally?



It's was huge because it was actually my second year opening for her & also being able to play for Adjuna / Ultra and all these huge festivals means I'm doing something right and yet still very opened to learning more about how to curate such huge shows.



You've remained a key figure in the SA deep house scene while evolving with the global sound. How do you stay inspired and keep your sets and productions fresh in 2025?



I take time off every now and then in order to ground myself, the industry is no longer the same people have become a bit "uncultured " so I have little "rituals" before shows and even during the week and just watch how everyone else does their thing.

And of course I watch my own sets and think okay there gaaaaalll you need improvement here and there! I always celebrate my small wins and always speak from a place of abundance I don't complain.



What challenges have you faced as a female DJ in a male-dominated industry, and how have you overcome them?



Always being undermined also because of my dress code and how quiet I am you know. Half the time I remain calm and be kind to people because it's hard being in the game- the pressure of always making sure you play a dope set.


What's next for DJ Buhle in 2025? Are there any upcoming projects, tours, or new directions in your music that fans should look out for?

Groove Without the Gimmicks

– **Cape Town's Boldest Beat Selector**
Introduction

Meet *Housewife* – a Cape Town-based DJ shaking up the local scene with an infectious blend of deep disco, leftfield house, and feel-good grooves that go straight to the soul. With sets that dance between golden hour elegance and full-tilt rave energy, Housewife brings a magnetic presence to the decks, rooted in rhythm, instinct, and a playful approach to performance.

What started as a lockdown hobby quickly turned into one of the most exciting rising names in South Africa's electronic scene.

More than just a name, Housewife is a sonic identity—confident, curious, and unapologetically fun. Whether she's commanding a festival stage or a smoky club floor, her musical intuition and genre-bending style offer dance floors a fresh kind of freedom.

Now, as she looks ahead to production and the next evolution of her craft, one thing is clear: this is not your average Housewife.

Your name, Housewife, is instantly intriguing - what inspired it, and how does it reflect your approach to DJing and music?



When I first started collecting music, my style naturally leaned towards house. That's actually how my name came about—it was a play on words that just stuck. I leaned into the brand fully from the start. While I do explore and collect a range of genres, house music is the root and foundation of my sound.

You've carved out a distinct sonic identity blending deep disco, leftfield house, and high-energy grooves. What artists or moments have shaped this eclectic sound?



There wasn't one specific artist that shaped my sound—it was more a collective love for the Cape Town scene. During my student years, I spent a lot of time both working at and attending events and festivals. That exposure introduced me to a mix of styles and sounds, and I found myself constantly inspired by artists in the local scene.

I knew the exact feeling of being on a dancefloor where the DJ has the crowd completely locked in—and I knew I wanted to create that kind of magic one day.

Cape Town's club and festival scene can be both competitive and collaborative. How has the local landscape influenced your evolution as a DJ?



I was lucky to meet and become friends with artists and promoters early on. My journey actually started during hard lockdown, with a small controller in my bedroom. I taught myself the basics, recorded a few sets, and uploaded them to SoundCloud. People noticed, took a chance on me—and things grew from there. So I cannot stress this enough, get yourself out there!

PRESS** Your sets move from golden hour to peak rave energy seamlessly. How do you read a crowd and decide where to take them next?



There are so many elements that make a dancefloor great. First, sound and lighting are essential for setting the mood. Once that's in place, my job is to play music I truly love.

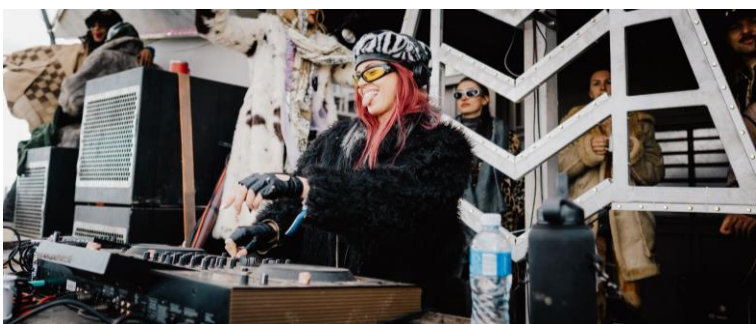
I usually have a rough idea of what I want to play, but there are plenty of times I've had to pivot mid-set because the energy in the room called for something different. I really believe intuition is what sets a great artist apart—mixing is the easy part.

PRESS** You're known for guitar-laced basslines and tight percussion - do you play any instruments yourself or come from a musical background?

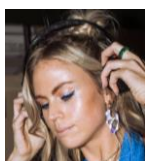


Funnily enough, I have no formal musical background. I grew up playing loads of sport, but music was always a big part of my life. I used to travel across the country for tournaments, and those long road trips were filled with my dad's endless iPod playlists.

I was surrounded by old-school house and disco—the likes of Donna Summer and Scissor Sisters. To this day, I still play edits of the tracks we used to listen to together in the car!

PRESS** There's a sense of fun and freedom in your sets. How important is playfulness and not taking things too seriously in your musical philosophy?



I believe people go to parties and events to let loose, express themselves, and have fun. The DJ plays a big part in allowing that playfulness to come through. My first-ever gig—hosted by my friends Seb and Tom from Paradise Citizens—taught me something I'll never forget:

“Never play to the other DJs in the room. Play to the crowd.”

That's stuck with me ever since. It's not a competition. Music is meant to be everything but serious, and I try to carry that spirit into every one of my sets.

PRESS Do you think being a woman in the electronic scene in South Africa comes with unique challenges - or maybe unexpected advantages?



Being a female artist definitely comes with its challenges, but honestly, I've found it to be mostly an advantage. When I started out, there weren't many women—especially playing house and disco.

Lineups were mostly male, and as I started gaining traction, I was lucky to be considered for lots of gigs. **What mattered most to me was knowing I was being booked because I was respected and good enough—not just to fill a “female artist” slot.**

Of course I had doubts, but the responses I received gave me the confidence to trust that I deserve my place.

From my experience, I truly believe female artists bring a unique kind of energy to the dancefloor. I hope to see more women stepping into the scene here in Cape Town and claiming their space—because they absolutely deserve it.

PRESS** What's next for Not Your Average Housewife - any releases, collaborations, or dream gigs on the horizon?



Housewife has always been a fun, creative outlet for me—call it a side hustle if you will. I'm excited to see where it goes. My next goal is to get into the studio and start producing. I want to take my taste and turn it into something of my own. I want to create my own kind of magic.



Emotion, Edge & Energy

The Global Minimalist Making Waves

Berlin-based DJ, producer, and sonic visionary Yulia Niko is one of the most compelling forces in underground electronic music today. Known for her hypnotic, minimal-house sound and boundary-breaking creativity, she's released on powerhouse labels like Crosstown Rebels and Watergate, commanding dance floors from Ibiza to Cape Town with a deep emotional resonance and fierce club energy.

In 2024, she released her debut album *TWINSOUL*—a raw and analog-driven tribute to love, loss, and self-expression. Now, as the sole artist curating *Body Language Vol. 26* for Get Physical Music, Yulia is showcasing her full artistic identity through 11 floor-ready tracks that distill her instinct, groove, and signature edge.

She's not chasing trends—she's shaping them. And with her sights set on Africa and beyond, Yulia Niko is just getting started.





You've come a long way from your early days DJing as a teen to performing on some of the world's most respected stages. Can you walk us through your journey and what initially drew you to electronic music?



Honestly, it still feels like a bit of a mystery to me. When I was just 11, someone handed me a DVD from the Ibiza club Bora Bora. I had no idea what it was, but once I watched it, I became completely addicted. I was fascinated by how people moved—it looked almost alien to me. All I could think was, “I want to grow up and go to Ibiza.”

At the time, I was actually a professional dancer, so I was already deeply connected to music through movement. But around the age of 16, I started buying vinyl records. That's when a new idea hit me—what if I could be the one behind the decks, mixing music and controlling the energy of the crowd? That thought never left me.

By the time I was 21, I realized that music wasn't just something I loved—it was something I needed to pursue fully.

I moved to New York to study music production and ended up meeting some key people who helped shape my path. Behind everything I do, there's a mix of raw passion, a kind of blind belief that I could make it, and a deep, lifelong love for music.

Now, I'm here—playing some of the best festivals around the world and building a career that's been driven by instinct, energy, and heart since day one.



Your sound is often described as hypnotic, emotional, and minimal. How would you define your musical style, and where do you find the emotional energy behind your tracks?



I'm completely obsessed with edgy vocals—those bold, raw voices that carry insane amounts of energy and emotion. For me, they can transform a track and bring it to life in a way nothing else can.

I'd describe my sound as rooted in minimal, but with a twist. For me, minimal isn't about doing less—it's about doing just enough to take people on a hypnotic journey.

It's quality over quantity. It's about how just a few elements, if done right, can groove harder than a wall of sound.

My music is always groovy, sexy, uplifting—and at its heart, it's always House. Whether I'm producing or playing, I'm chasing that energy that makes people close their eyes, move without thinking, and feel completely free.

sound PRESS In March 2024, you released your debut album **TWINSOUL**, a deeply personal and exploratory project. What was the inspiration behind this album, and what does it represent in your artistic journey?



I honestly believe that every artist should fully express their creativity—even if it goes against what everyone else is doing. And trust me, everyone on my team was against the idea at first.

These days, there's just so much music out there, and people rarely take the time to sit and really listen to full albums. But this wasn't about trends—it was a dream I had for myself.

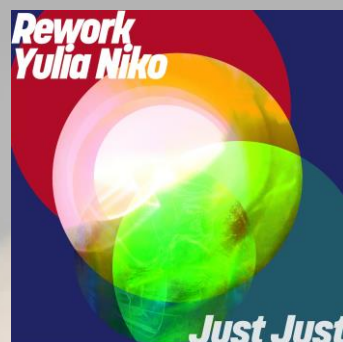
I created the album as a personal tribute to my father, who passed away around that time. It's timeless music, made with love and intention. I recorded it fully analog, with beautiful original vocals and contributions from some incredible artists. It's emotional, raw, and very real.

I'm extremely proud of it—and I honestly think people should hear it. Not just as a collection of tracks, but as a story. I made it from the heart, and I hope it resonates with people the same way it did with me while creating it.

sound PRESS Let's talk about your new single 'Just Just' - a modern rework of Rework's 2002 track. What made you want to revisit and reinterpret that specific song?



Since I first started digging for music around 2005, this one track always stood out for me—it was an all-time favorite. It's not even so much about the lyrics—it's more about the simplicity, the sexy tone of the vocal, and the vibe it creates.



Every time I dropped it on the dancefloor, it created a special kind of moment. It's not commercial at all—it's underground, cool, and something any real DJ would love to work with.

So I finally decided to do it justice and rework it in my own way. I made it darker, more melodic, and gave it an unexpected drop to bring something fresh to today's dance floors.

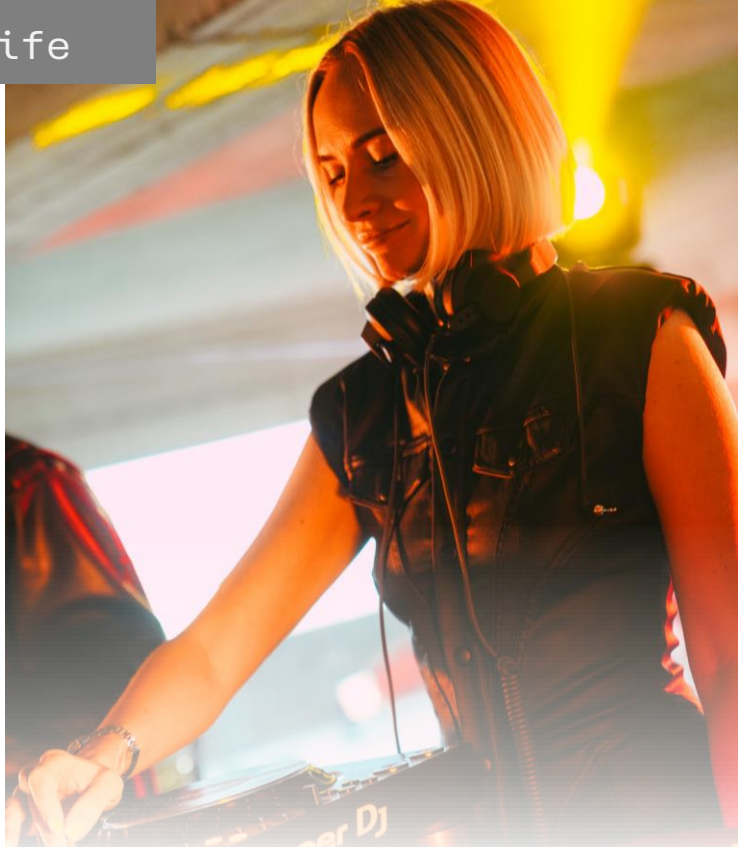
The result feels really trendy and powerful—and I'm obsessed with how people react when I play it. It's like honoring the past while pushing forward, and I love that balance.



How did the collaboration with Rework come about, and what was the creative process like in bringing 'Just Just' to life?



I was honored to be chosen by Get Physical Music to curate their Body Language compilation this year. It's a legendary German label that's been around since 2002, so to be a part of that legacy really means a lot.



The concept behind the compilation is amazing—it gave me full access to the label's entire catalog. I could choose any track I wanted to remix, collaborate on, clear vocals for, or even reinterpret as a cover. It was basically unlimited creative freedom.

After digging through the library for days, I was honestly blown away by how many timeless, classic records they've released over the years.

And then I came across Just Just—a track I've always loved—and I got super excited. I reached out, and luckily, the guys from Rework were really open and easy to work with. Instead of doing a simple remix, they were up for a full-on collaboration, which made it even more special.

It's been a very rewarding project, and I can't wait for people to hear what we've created.



This track is part of your curation for Body Language Vol. 26. What was your vision when selecting and creating the tracks for this compilation?



To be honest—there wasn't some big, dramatic vision behind it. I just wanted to take some of my favorite vocals and create my own versions, in my own sound. For me, it was more about making a statement:

“This is what I love. This is how I hear it.”

I wasn't trying to follow any trends or fit a formula. It was more like a passion project—taking iconic acapellas I've always loved and giving them a fresh twist with my personal touch. And that's what made it fun. No pressure, just pure creativity.



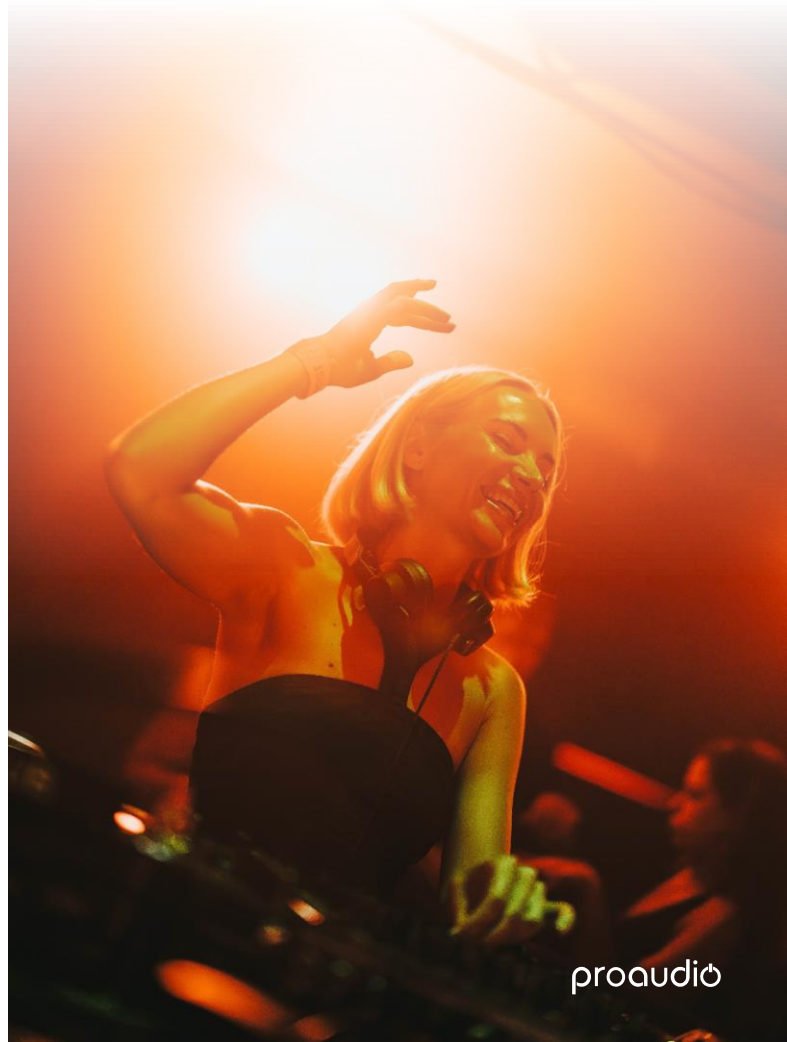
As the sole artist behind the entire Body Language Vol. 26 release, what can fans expect from the full project when it drops in September?



It's a collection of 11 strong dancefloor bangers—each one tested and fine-tuned over the past year. I played them out, watched the crowd, adjusted, and didn't stop until each track felt like the one.

It's a happy, uplifting album designed for any kind of situation—whether it's a peak-time set, a beach party, or just vibing at home.

Honestly, you can just download the whole thing and play it from start to finish. It's made to flow, to lift energy, and to make people move.





Have you performed in South Africa before, you've expressed interest in touring the continent. Are there any concrete plans to bring your music to South Africa or elsewhere in Africa - and what would a visit like that mean to you personally and creatively?




Yes! I actually performed at a festival in Cape Town two years ago, and it was incredible. The energy was so special—people were genuinely there for the music, dancing nonstop, and just radiating good vibes. It was honestly one of the best experiences I've had as a performer.

Outside of the festival, I got to explore a bit—I even saw these tiny, adorable penguins on the beach! The food was amazing too—we ate at this beautiful seaside restaurant that reminded me of Malibu in LA.

I'd absolutely love to come back—especially to go on a safari and experience some of the iconic festivals in the region, like Afrikaburn. It's such a magical place with a deep connection to rhythm, nature, and energy.

Who is Mr Vinyl?

Mr Vinyl is one of South Africa's most well-known record stores, based in Johannesburg. For over 12 years, it has been the go-to spot for collectors, DJs, and music lovers looking for vinyl across all genres - from hip hop and house to jazz, soul, funk, and more. It's more than just a shop; it's a community built around music.

Over the years, many of South Africa's best vinyl DJs have walked through the doors. Some quietly test new records on the in-store decks.

Others have surprised everyone by dropping full-on live sets in the middle of the shop - unplanned, raw, and brilliant.

After seeing so many of these moments, the team at Mr Vinyl decided to start capturing them properly.

These aren't pre-announced gigs - there's no promotion, no flyers. The idea is simple: invite a great DJ, hit record, and let customers experience it in real time without any expectations.

Each set is filmed during shop hours, adding to the unique energy. Shoppers might walk in looking for a record, only to find themselves in the middle of a live DJ set. The reaction is always the same - surprise, excitement, and people stopping to enjoy something rare.

The first featured DJ was **Dokta Ooz**, delivering a powerful set that perfectly captured the spirit of vinyl DJing.

Since then, Mr Vinyl has recorded a new set with **Abby Nurock**, known for her deep house vinyl-only sets and serious passion for the format.

Coming up, there are two top international house DJs in the pipeline, plus a very special set from a leading South African techno artist.

Beatmatching by ear, digging for the right record, reading the room - this is the foundation of DJ culture.

The sets are uploaded to YouTube, giving local DJs a global platform, and giving viewers a front-row seat to something real, raw, and musically rich.

ABBY NUROCK

Strictly Vinyl, Seriously Visionary

A Story of Culture, Curiosity & Courage

A true vinyl evangelist and musical curator, Abby Nurock has earned her place as one of South Africa's most respected and original selectors. Known for her signature #StrictlyVinyl sets that span Chicago House, acid, jazz, disco, and even classical influences, Abby's career has taken her from legendary venues like Fabric and Ultra Resistance to the co-founding of SAMP Records—a label dedicated to preserving South African musical heritage through wax.

Abby's sound isn't just nostalgic—it's deeply intentional, shaped by a lifetime of eclectic influences, from her mother's classical guitar to crate-digging rare white labels. Her performances are guided by instinct, driven by heart, and always rooted in connection.

As an artist, cultural archivist, and fearless tastemaker, Abby Nurock represents a powerful voice in music—one that doesn't just follow trends, but revives and redefines them.





You've built a strong reputation around your #StrictlyVinyl identity. What originally drew you to vinyl, and why has it remained such an important part of your DJ journey?



I started collecting and buying vinyl from a young age acquiring used and discarded collections; crate-digging for white label gems. Back when I first learned how to DJ, vinyl was the only way to learn! I sound ancient, haha—but yes, I started from scratch (pun intended) and became completely addicted to the sound, tactility, and whole culture of vinyl. The rest is history.



Your sound blends everything from Chicago house and acid to jazz, disco, and classical. How did your early influences help shape the selector you are today?



I was lucky to grow up surrounded by a wide range of music. My mom's a classical guitarist, so I absorbed a lot of intricate, emotive sounds from an early age.

My dad had razor-sharp taste- he was always making me mixtapes filled with everything from Kruder & Dorfmeister to Erykah Badu. Live jazz nights were one of our favourite shared rituals. All of that shaped the way I listen, feel, and select. I pull from everything that's made an imprint on me.



You've performed at legendary spaces like Fabric, Ultra Resistance, and Mixmag Lab, alongside names like Bonobo and Black Coffee. What have these global experiences taught you about yourself as an artist?



Playing everywhere from big-name festivals to obscure basement setups has taught me one thing: people connect with energy, not ego. It's never about the crowd size or time slot. It's about reading the room, trusting your gut, and reaching even one person who's vibing with you.

That said, I'm often my own toughest critic- looping on what I could've done better, what I missed etc.

But I'm learning to be more present and remember that I'm doing something I love that brings people joy.

What a privilege!!!!

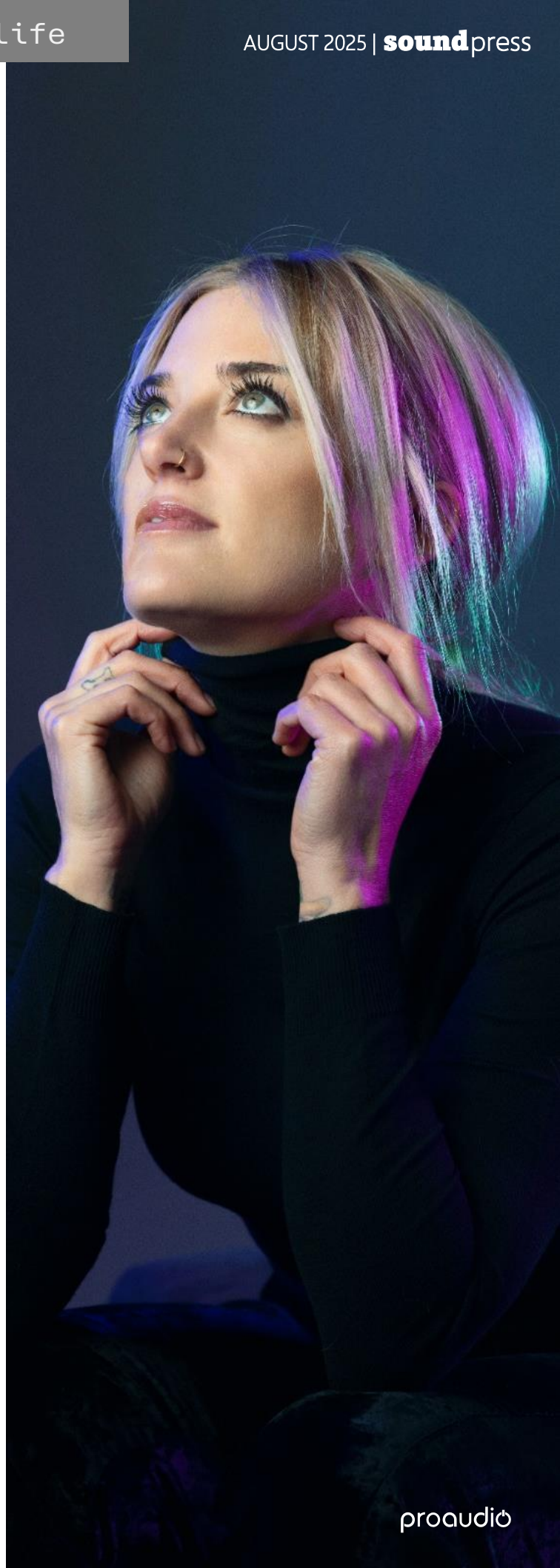
But my biggest lesson? Have the guts to take risks- and own them. Drop that weird B-side no one's touched in decades. Even if the crowd doesn't "get it" right away, conviction has a way of setting the floor on fire



You're also a co-founder of SAMP Records, dedicated to preserving and celebrating South African music through vinyl. What inspired the creation of the label, and what role do you see it playing in local music culture?



SAMP started out as an organic concept between me and my old friend Bret Dugmore (aka Mr Vinyl). An opportunity came up to distribute a few international labels locally- and then the reverse clicked too: why not take South African music to the world? With Bret's extensive musical knowledge and industry connections, and our shared passion for vinyl, we founded SAMP Records.



The name stands for South African Music Press, but it's also a playful nod to local staple samp mielies. And phonetically, it's short, punchy, percussive. The final piece of our trifecta is Adrian King, who brings a lifetime of invaluable music industry experience into the mix. Together, we hope to reignite the love for vinyl while shining a spotlight on South African music heritage and giving it the global platform it deserves.



How has your connection to vinyl grown or evolved - whether in your personal collection, live performances, or your work through SAMP?



I've been collecting vinyl my whole life, so my sound-and my record collection-is a constantly evolving journey. My taste has shifted over time, but one thing's stayed the same: I'm always drawn to the unexpected. I'm a bit of an '80s arcade game nerd, so I've got a soft spot for quirky synths and electronic bleeps. When it comes to sourcing vinyl, it's a deep-dive process: time-consuming, costly, and incredibly rewarding.



I don't really follow specific artists; I follow record labels and niche sub-genres that speak to me. Some of my favourite finds are limited edition, vinyl-only, in-house pressings....bonus!

Of course, I'm limited by what's actually available on wax, but that's part of the magic. It pushes me to dig deeper and broaden my horizons. When people ask what I'm playing, I often only have label artwork or my own scribbled notes as a reference.

I'm not into the obvious so if I'm at a festival, chances are you'll find me on the most obscure dancefloor, vibing to something weird, and just a little bit off the map.

Lately I've been interested in contrasts, and playing with tempo. I'm really inspired by

DJs who break the rules and genre-hop mid-set. It reminds me that curation isn't about perfection, it's about storytelling and creating memorable moments. I'm crate digging deeper, and more freely than ever.

For those who are just discovering you - how would you introduce yourself, and what defines you as an artist?

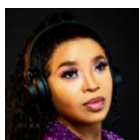

I am the "queen of vocals" because I play vocal- driven music-music that speaks, heals and moves.

The ability to blend emotion with rhythm and staying rooted in my identity and let my energy speak louder than words is what also defines me. I am as real and they come and what you see is not what you get because my sets are mean.



Your sound blends Deep House, Soulful House, Old School, and Afro House - how would you describe your musical identity and the feeling you aim to create on the dancefloor?

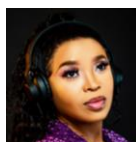


It's all about feeling, rhythm real connection. I play music that speaks to the heart but still gets people moving.

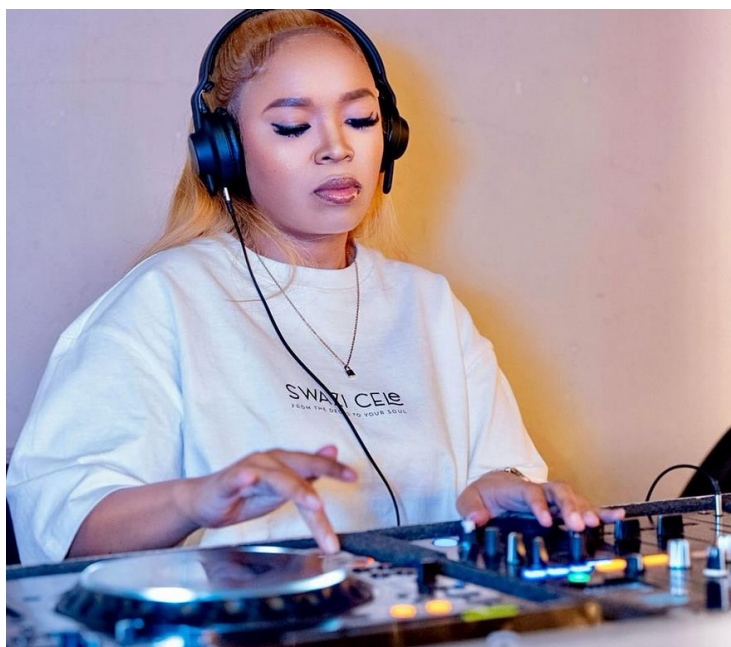

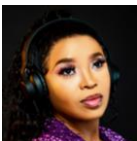
Your residencies and performances span across South Africa and even Botswana - how do different cities or crowds influence your set and musical direction?

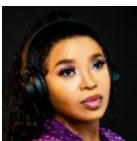
You've been featured on Channel O, Metro FM, and more - how important is media exposure for a DJ today, and how has it helped shape your journey?

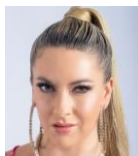

For those who might be new to your journey - who is DJ Kasi DuchAz, and how did your love for music begin?

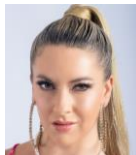

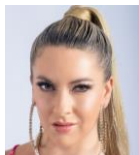

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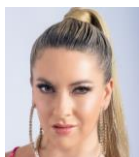
What have you been up to lately - are there any new projects, collaborations, or releases your fans can look forward to?

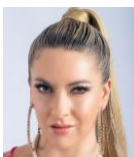
As a woman in a male-dominated industry, especially one who doesn't fit the traditional mold, what have been some of your biggest challenges and how have you overcome them?

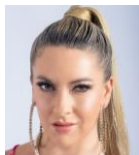
You've performed across all 9 provinces and internationally - how do crowds outside South Africa respond to your sets compared to local audiences?

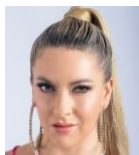

I am a South African Afrohouse & Afrotech DJ. My style of Afrohouse is rooted in deep, percussive rhythms and powerful, emotive energy. I gravitate toward sounds that blend traditional African elements with futuristic electronic textures, creating a hypnotic, bass-driven journey on the dance floor. The sound is club-orientated and unapologetically bold, often layered with haunting melodies, tribal vocals, and heavy tech-inspired drops.

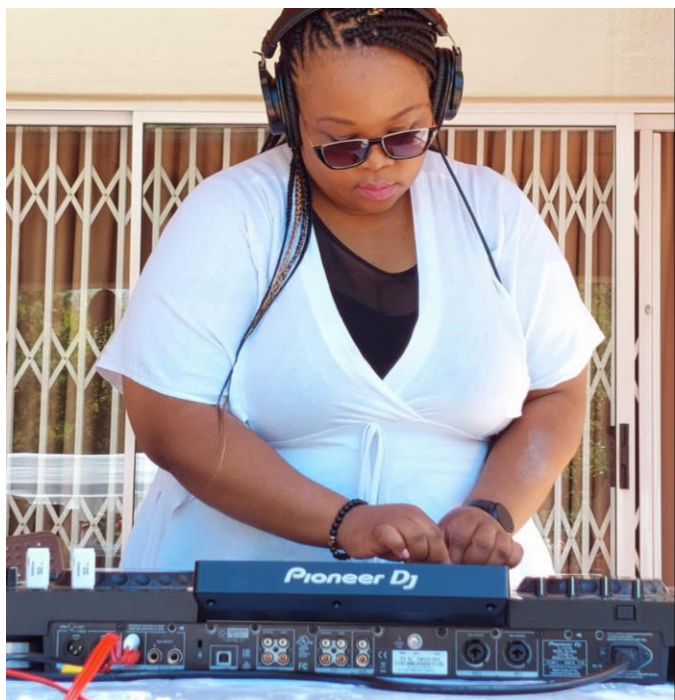

Afrohouse and Afrotech have become your signature. What draws you to these genres, and how do they allow you to express yourself?



To be honest, when I started learning to DJ, I did not know of this genre. I always say Afrohouse "chose" me. I was just having a practise session with a fellow DJ. And she made me aware that when I played "Afrohouse," my mixing was "better" - So after our session, I searched and listened to songs that sounded similar to what I had played earlier.

That's how I got introduced to Afrohouse, and I have never looked back. The way I feel it and the way my soul reacts to it when I play Afrohouse, no other sound has that effect on me.

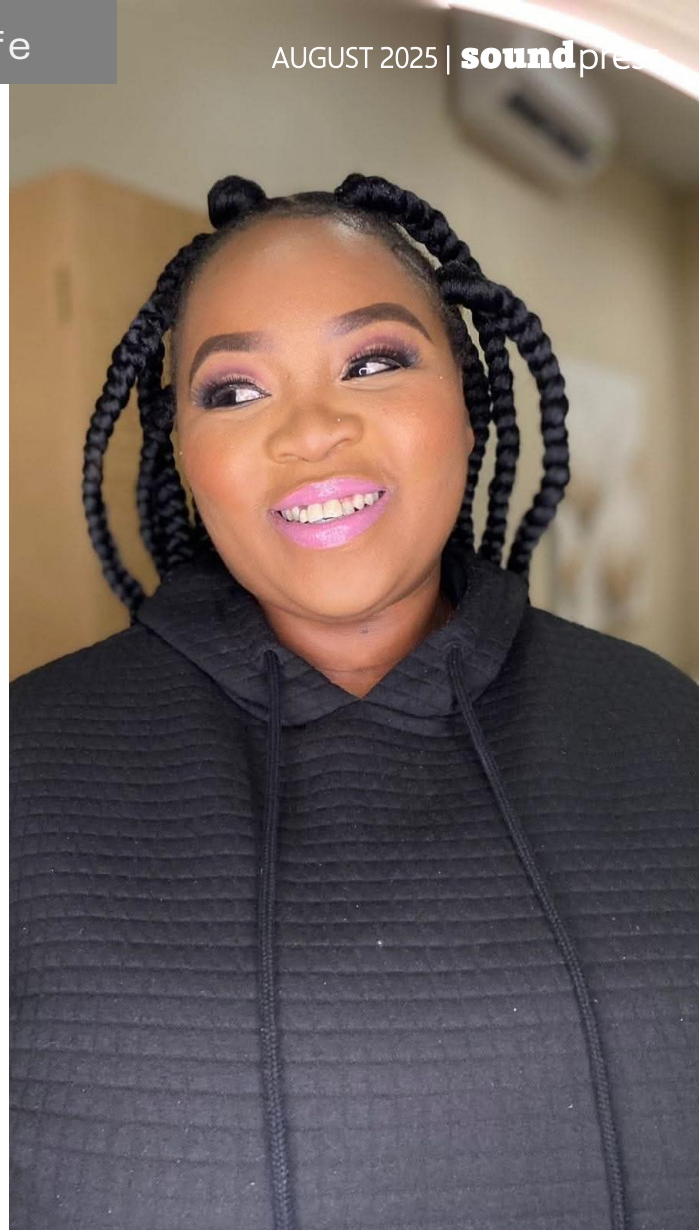
Both the Dance Afrika Live session and my feature on UJ FM's Groovist Sessions gave some people a chance to experience my sound in a different context, outside the usual club setting. These platforms allowed me to connect with a wider and more diverse audience, including listeners who may not frequent clubs but still have a deep love for Afrohouse and electronic music. The exposure definitely boosted my visibility and credibility as a DJ. It also pushed me creatively. I had to craft sets that were not just for dancing, but for listening and feeling, which helped me grow as an artist and storyteller through sound.



What has it been like navigating the music and entertainment industry as a woman, particularly in the DJ scene? Have you faced any unique challenges or moments of empowerment?



I believe our challenges and experiences as women in most spaces are always different from those of our male counterparts. Every time I step behind the decks, I'm claiming space for every woman who's been told she can't or shouldn't.

From there, she charted her own course through sound, earning her stripes with formal training through Pioneer DJ and quickly proving she was a name to watch.

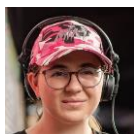

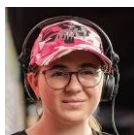
You fell in love with music early on - can you tell us what first inspired you to start DJing?

He has always had my back, and he believed in me no matter what, he has always wanted me to do better and be better.



You've completed a Pioneer DJ course - how did that formal training influence your technique and confidence as an artist?



I didn't know where to start and how to go about it, like how to blend songs together and which songs go where, by doing the course it helped me more than I thought, and they showed me it's ok to make mistakes, the key is learning from it.



What was it like being the only woman to compete - and win - Battle of the DJs in 2021?



It was a load of emotions, to name a few nervous being one of them, but the most I felt was excitement, to win the competition was a whole different set of emotions, I was so shocked and surprised at the same time when I heard my name.



You're known for blending different genres so seamlessly - how do you approach creating a unique sound in your sets?



To me its practice ,and know your music, your crowd .but at the same time have fun and interact with your crowd same time have fun and interact with your crowd it's all about the energy, And don't be afraid to throw in something new, something they haven't heard before.

Keep them guessing; keep them moving. Most importantly, be yourself, be passionate, and let the music speak for itself.

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FAREWELL TO THE PRINCE OF DARKNESS

A Tribute to Ozzy Osbourne

A true icon, trailblazer, and survivor, Ozzy's legacy transcends decades, genres, and generations. As the world prepares to say goodbye to the Prince of Darkness and he steps away from the stage for good, we pay tribute to the man who changed the sound—and soul—of rock forever.

THE VOICE That Launched a Movement

Born **John Michael Osbourne** in Birmingham, England, Ozzy rose from humble beginnings to become the voice of a revolution.

As the frontman of **Black Sabbath**, he didn't just help create heavy metal—he *defined* it.

With their self-titled debut in 1970, Sabbath introduced a dark, brooding sound that broke all the rules and rewrote what rock music could be. Tracks like *Paranoid*, *War Pigs*, and *Iron Man* didn't just shake the charts—they shook the very foundations of popular music.

Ozzy's haunting vocals, unpredictable stage presence, and raw vulnerability made him an enigma. He sang with pain, with power, and with an otherworldly energy that couldn't be replicated. His voice became the battle cry of outcasts, misfits, and dreamers all over the world.





Reinvention and Resilience

After parting ways with Sabbath in 1979, many thought Ozzy's career would fade into darkness. Instead, he lit a fire that burned even brighter.

His solo career produced timeless albums like *Blizzard of Ozz*, *Diary of a Madman*, and *No More Tears*. With hits like *Crazy Train* and *Mr. Crowley*, he proved not only that he could stand on his own, but that he could dominate.

Behind the scenes, Ozzy's life was a storm of substance abuse, personal loss, and public controversy. But through it all, he remained a figure of resilience. His marriage to **Sharon Osbourne** became a cornerstone of his survival—and a public spectacle of its own.

Together, they redefined celebrity culture, inviting millions into their chaotic, hilarious, and deeply human family life with *The Osbournes*, one of the earliest and most influential reality TV shows.

A Legacy Carved in Stone (and Ink and Fire)

Ozzy is more than a singer—he's a symbol. A symbol of rebellion, of enduring spirit, and of unapologetic individuality. His music inspired generations of artists, from metal giants to punk rebels and even pop stars.

His bat-biting antics, devil-may-care attitude, and surprising emotional depth made him a paradox: terrifying and tender, unhinged and utterly beloved.

He was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with Black Sabbath, received the Global Icon Award at the MTV Europe Music Awards, and earned a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award.

But no accolade captures what Ozzy means to the people who grew up with his music in their headphones and his message in their hearts.





Goodbye, Ozzy—But Never Forgotten

Now, with his health declining and his touring days behind him, Ozzy Osbourne has made the difficult decision to step away from the stage. It's a farewell not just to the man, but to an era.

Yet even as the final curtain falls, Ozzy's voice will never stop echoing. His music will rage on in headphones, on car stereos, at festivals, and in the hearts of those who found themselves in his madness.
