Follow that up with '60s stars Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons, Ricky Nelson, Paul Simon and into the 70s with Bruce Springsteen, Jon Bon Jovi, Kool & the Gang, George Clinton & the Funkadelics, Dionne Warwick, the great Whitney Houston, and currently with Queen Latifah and Lauryn Hill.

But maybe nothing had a greater impact on the Jersey sound, than the Tony, Grammy[®] and Olivier Award-Winning Best Musical "Jersey Boys," described as "the international musical phenomenon that took you behind the scenes and behind the music — of Frankie Valli and The Four Seasons."






Early last month, a talented quartet of singers named, "The Jersey Tenors" brought many of those sounds to John Knox Village. The Jersey Tenors are Jersey Proud — and highlighted some of Jersey's finest like Frankie Valli and The Four Seasons, Frank Sinatra, Bruce Springsteen,

Kool and The Gang, and even Jersey Girl Whitney Houston. Their harmonies also featured an explosive blend of iconic Opera classics alongside Rock 'n Roll greats like Queen, Elton John, Bon Jovi, Journey and the Beach Boys – to name but a few.

On stage at JKV's Cultural Arts Center, the Tenors performed before a near capacity audience and quickly captivated the concert goers with their harmonies and on-stage presence.

The Jersey Tenors are led by Brian Noonan with more than 30 years in the entertainment business. He has starred on Broadway and National Touring Companies, as both The Phantom and Raoul in "Phantom of the Opera," Enjolras in "Les Miserables," Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde in "Jekyll & Hyde," Cable in "South Pacific" with the legendary Robert Goulet, and Gus/Growltiger in "Cats," and "Jesus Christ Superstar."

Vaden Thurgood is the Frankie Valli of the group. His musical credits include National Tours: Michael in "Smokey Joe's Cafe" (20th Anniversary National Tour). Regional credits: "Good News!" (Goodspeed Opera House), Dr. Hart in "Yoshimi Battles the Pink Robots" (La Jolla Playhouse), Rocky in "Damn Yankees: Red Sox Version" (Ogunquit Playhouse), Vernon in "Damn Yankees" (Paper Mill Playhouse, 5th Avenue Theater).

Rounding out the group were Joseph DePiertro, and Robert Koutras, both with impressive resumes, who added their enthusiasm, lead vocals, harmonies and dance routines to The Jersey Tenors show.

The Jersey Tenors invited audience participation, as JKV Lakeside Villa resident Carol Venuti joined the act during their "Kool And The Gang" medley.

True to their Jersey roots, the Tenors began their musical repertoire with a tribute to Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons, starting with "Big Girls Don't Cry," and "Let's Hang On."

The act quickly shifted from Newark across the Atlantic to England with a tribute to Queen and the operatic harmony of "Bohemian Rhapsody," only to return to their Jersey roots with a Frank Sinatra medley.





The Jersey Tenors had great audience rapport and took time to meet JKV residents after the show.

The boys then crossed the Atlantic again to visit Sinatra's Italian roots with "Come Back to Sorrento," and a rock/opera medley: "Funiculi," "Still Rock and Roll," "La Donna Mobile," "Don't Stop Believin'," and "O Sole Mio." The audience got personally involved in the show as the vocalists started a conga line that wound through the crowd. The Tenors were ably joined by JKV

residents Carol Venuti, Linda Allen and Nancy Logue.

From Jersey to the western reaches of the U.S., the Jersey Tenors also brought us memories from the Beach Boy hits: "409," "Little Deuce Coupe," and an audience singalong favorite, "Barbara Ann." The entire show was a nostalgic trip in time and place to the songs we remember so very well.

From hits by Andrew Lloyd Webber: "I Don't Know How to Love Him," "Don't Cry for Me Argentina," "Memory," and "Music of the Night," to Elton John's "Your Song," "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road," "Crocodile Rock," and "Don't Let the Sun Go Down on Me," the onstage trio breezed through hit after hit. Paul McCartney

was given his tribute with "Live and Let Die," "Maybe I'm Amazed," and "Yesterday." But it was the showstopping encore "Hey Jude," cowritten by McCartney and Beatles' partner John Lennon, that got the audience to its feet in song by remembering: "To let her into your heart, then you can start to make it better."



12 Reasons Why Pickleball May Be the Greatest Sport Developed in Decades

Whether you've taken to the court yet, it's hard to escape the fastest-growing sport in the United States. Pickleball, the racket sport that's a tennis-ping-pong hybrid, seems to be everywhere.

With its skyrocketing popularity and the demand for places to play, public parks are making renovations to create more courts to keep up with demand, and now empty retail spaces abandoned by the likes of Bed Bath and Beyond are being considered as potential locations for indoor courts.

What makes Pickleball so great? JKV Village Towers residents Michael Featherstone and Barbara Morningstar say it gives them purpose to get up in the morning and get moving. "When we're playing, we are using almost all the muscles in the body, and the game connects us socially to so many other residents, "Barb said.

"We laugh so much when we play. We're so lucky to live at JKV and to be able to utilize the beautiful Pickleball courts, any time of the day, at the Aquatic Center."

She says the reason they play almost every day is, "A day without Pickleball is like a day without sunshine."

If you're not already in the game and that hasn't convinced you, here are 12 reasons why you should be playing:

1. It's Easy to Learn

Pickleball is an approachable

sport. Even for those not athletically inclined, it's a non-intimidating sport that can turn even the most unlikely candidate into an athlete. You can step onto the court and be at an intermediate level within a short amount of time. Unlike tennis, the rules and basic techniques are relatively easy to learn.

2. Anyone Can Get in the Game

Whether you've always been active by nature, or have always wanted to be, Pickleball is suitable for every fitness level. The court is one-fourth the size of a tennis court. With that much less real estate to cover while trying to hit the ball, it's less intimidating for those who may not be athletes.

3. It Contributes to Longevity

A Mayo Clinic study found that playing racket sports may increase the life expectancy of participants by six to 10 years. Although the study was observational by nature, it was noted that because racket sports involve more interaction with others than individual sports, and socialization has been shown to positively impact one's well-being, this benefit may be a factor in Pickleball's overall health benefit.

4. Your Heart Will Get a Low-Impact Workout

Playing Pickleball provides a moderate workout for middle-aged and older people, but may be safer than tennis for people with heart issues. Although it's a cardiovascular workout, it doesn't put excessive strain on the body. You'll burn twice as many calories as you would walking three miles per hour on moderate terrain.

5. You'll Build Muscle and Improve Your Balance

In addition to the boost it

gives your cardiovascular system, playing Pickleball requires hand-eye coordination, and builds your muscles. Your forearms, biceps, triceps, hamstrings and quadriceps are all getting a great workout when you play. It can also help your balance.

6. It Keeps Your Brain Sharp


Once you master the basic skills of the game, you start to think about strategy. Where is your opponent positioned? Where does their typical serve land on the court? Analyzing the competition, your own placement and strategy, and the desire to keep improving your own game all keep those synapses firing and help keep your mind sharp.

7. You'll Sleep Like a Baby

Playing Pickleball is so much fun, you'll hardly notice that you're getting a real workout until later in the day. Aside from

the physical exertion that's been proven to have significant benefits for sleep, getting out there and playing helps lower stress levels and helps you relax when the day is done.

8. It Promotes Healthy Habits that Can Lead to Weight Loss

Playing Pickleball burns eight to 11 calories a minute, so 60 minutes of play can burn 480 to 660 calories. You'd need to play four-and-a-half hours a week to meet recommended exercise guidelines, but with the enticement of the social aspect, it gets some people moving who would otherwise not be doing any physical activity.

9. Get a Confidence Boost

Even for those who historically haven't been athletic, Pickleball is a great entry-level sport anyone can master. There's much to be said for the confidence that physical activity, accomplishment, and pride (especially when you're on the winning team) can do for your confidence.

10. It's Good for a Laugh

Pickleball is a very social sport, and most people who play would probably agree that this is one of the things they most love about this sport. Although you can play "singles" (one-on-one), games are often played as "doubles," where you and a partner compete against another team of two. Inevitably, you'll get a good laugh. Laughing isn't just good for your mental and emotional health – it's good for the soul.

11. Your Relationships Will Grow

There's something about spending time together and competing on a Pickleball court that fosters mutual respect

among players in the game. It's a great way to get to know someone in a setting that's typically lighthearted (unless, of course, you're competing in a tournament).

12. It's Fun for All Ages

Another truly great thing Pickleball has going for it is that it's a sports activity that different generations can play together. In this world of generational divides, especially when it comes to technology-driven activities, Pickleball is simple fun that brings people of all ages together.

As always, engaging in any sporting activity is not without risk. Talk to your doctor before starting and find out if playing Pickleball is right for you.

19th Annual JKV Antique and Classic Car Show

It will probably be close to some 5,000 collective years of automotive history on display during the 19th Annual John Knox Village Antique and Classic Car Show, set for March 23 at the Village's Welcome and Innovation Center.



With more than 50 Car Show entries expected – many close to 100 years old – the Village's show offers a little something for enthusiasts and casual observers alike. Last year's oldest entry was a 1929 Chevrolet Cabriolet and guests to the show voted for their favorite vehicle, with a 1931 REO Speedwagon winning the prestigious "People's Choice Award."

Dr. Paul Loree Founder Of The Show

The Car Show was the brainchild of JKV's Heritage Tower resident, retired ophthalmologist, Dr. Paul Loree, an avid antique car collector who recently gave his 1941 Cadillac Series 62 Formal Sedan by Derham to his son in Boston.

Paul recalls how the show began: "My first tour, when I previously owned my 1929 Hudson Dual Cowl Phaeton, was in the small city of Canandaigua in New York. Driving slowly down the road, I noticed the people watching have tears rolling down their faces. They were so moved seeing the cars from their youth and childhood."

Shortly after moving into JKV in 2004, Paul

shared that story with then-Director of Marketing Bob Milanovich. "Bob agreed it would be an incredible event for our residents—to have several cars and their owners on campus for John Knox Village's own Car Show."

The Car Show has become one of the most popular events during the year, starting from some 20 participating cars to now more than 50. Paul helps the Marketing Department promote and plan for the event.



"Our residents and guests really love walking the grounds, seeing the old cars and talking to the owners. It's always enjoyable listening to them share memories and personal stories," Paul told the *Gazette ACE*.

When it comes to variety, each year there are regular participants and always some newcomers. "We have great participation by the Antique Automobile Club of America [South Florida Region], the Classic Car Club of America, and lately, the local Volkswagen Club."

Attendees are given the opportunity to vote for the "People's Choice Awards" by choosing their favorite automobile. Around noon on March 23, there will be a parade of cars around JKV, for viewing by all residents campus-wide, before the participants enjoy a delicious lunch in JKV's Cultural Arts Center.


According to Dan Buettner, author of "The Blue Zones: Lessons for Living Longer From the People Who've Lived the Longest," there are nine factors all Blue Zones have in common; these include:


- Physical activity: Blue Zone centenarians maintain high levels of physical activity.
- **Sense of Purpose:** The source of life satisfaction, contributing to a longer and happier life.
- **Sleep:** Blue Zone centenarians prioritize rest and sleep.

- **80 percent rule:** Blue Zone people stop eating when their stomachs are 80-percent full.
- **Plant-based diet:** Blue Zone centenarians' diets largely on plants.
- **Moderate alcohol consumption:** Blue Zone centenarians contributed to their long life span.
- Sense of community: Strong community ties promote longevity.
- **Loved ones first:** Strong family ties are the cornerstone of Blue Zones communities.
- **Social encouragement:** Blue Zones centenarians live in social networks that promote healthy behaviors.

The JKV activities' calendar will offer lectures, events and dinner outings focusing on that month's featured country.

Having already focused on Japan in February, the calendar now moves to Ireland in March with many Irish-themed events around St. Patrick's Day.

What Are the Tax Benefits?

Current federal income tax laws permit residents in Life-Plan Communities or CCRCs, like JKV in

Pompano Beach, a tax deduction on a sizeable portion of the one-time entrance fee the year of move-in. In addition, a percentage of the monthly service fees paid during each year can be itemized as a medical expense.

At the beginning of each year, in some communities, such as JKV, auditors calculate the portion of the Entrance Fees and Monthly Service Fees that are attributable to medical expenses and provide this information to residents for their tax preparation.

Tax and Financial Advisors Can Help You

Tax and financial advisors can play a crucial role in helping seniors living in CCRCs and Life-Plan Communities navigate the complexities of tax laws related to their unique situation. An advisor can help you understand CCRC-related tax deductions, such as:

The amount or portion of your healthcare services and fees to the CCRC, as applicable

- Other potential itemizable deductions, such as local income taxes related to living in a CCRC
- Specific tax implications of different types of CCRC contracts, including the nuances of life care, fee-for-service, and other modified contracts

In addition, financial advisors can help seniors project future healthcare needs and provide guidance on potential tax implications for accessing long-term care services within or outside of the CCRC.

How Much Can I Deduct?

According to Carol Enisman, Investment Advisor Representative and Managing Partner at Premier Wealth Planning in Ft. Lauderdale, "The current tax code allows you to deduct a portion of your unreimbursed medical and dental expenses that exceed a set percentage of your Adjusted Gross Income."

However, she says, it's important to note that you'll need to itemize your deductions rather than take a standard deduction, which would disqualify you from claiming medical expenses.

I'm not sure which type of care contract I'm going to choose. Can you tell me the tax benefits of each?

The tax benefits may vary, depending on which type of care contract you select. Any of JKV's four Life-Plan Consultants can explain the different contract options, including Type A, B, and C contracts, and what each includes. Depending on how much healthcare coverage is included in the contract you

choose, the medical expense tax benefit may vary.

For some types of CCRC contracts, a portion of the entrance fee and monthly fee may be applied toward future medical expenses. Essentially, this portion is considered a pre-paid medical expense and may be included as part of your annual medical expenses.

It's always best to speak with your tax professional, who will be able to advise you with up-to-date tax regulations.

Are there any other tax deductions seniors should keep in mind when filing taxes?

Most of us know that medical bills, hospital bills, prescription costs, dental and vision care, in-home medical care, and costs for hearing aids and glasses are tax deductible.

Another hidden gem that might surprise you is that the standard mileage rate for driving to and from doctor appointments, therapy sessions, and other medical care is also tax deductible.

Residents Visit State Farmers' Market

Broward County's Amazing History as an Agricultural Powerhouse

In an outing arranged in conjunction with the Sample-McDougald House, JKV residents visited the Edward L. Myrick State Farmers' Market. Guides for the visit were Fred Segal, President of the Broward County Farm Bureau, and Edward L. Myrick, now in his 80s, who remains fully active and working daily in the produce business.

Edward L. Myrick State Farmers' Market is one of 12 markets run by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. They offer attendant services such as produce refrigeration, packinghouses, coolers, offices, farm supplies, restaurants and produce brokerage sales as well as produce and freight shipping companies.

One of the few remaining reminders of Pompano Beach's agricultural past, the doors to the Edward L. Myrick State Farmers' Market officially opened for business on Nov. 15, 1939. The 1,008-foot-long platform was said to be the longest in the world at that time.

Since its opening, the Farmers' Market serves as a major produce hub. It is a redistribution site where prepacked vegetables are brought in and sorted for shipment to supermarkets. Its location is ideal for shipping and distribution. Across the state, State Farmers' Markets are self-sustaining. Revenue earned from tenant leasing pays for the market expenses.


During the winter growing season, the 85-year old market handles hundreds of trucks a day that bring Florida produce to be sold and shipped to customers near and far. Average truck traffic during the high season, November through April or May, is 200 trucks daily or more. The Edward L. Myrick State Farmers' Market offers over 100 jobs to stimulate the local economy. These positions include a range of opportunities in working in agriculture ranging from the broker, to the restau-

rant waitress, dock attendant, attorney, truck driver and many more. The market also houses over 300 parking spaces for produce truck drivers.

With a total of 25 tenants, the market offers agriculture-related industries an opportunity to lease space at a significant amount lower than the surrounding area. In doing so, this gives the market an opportunity to support the agriculture industry and local economy. It also offers continued support of growth in the agriculture sector.

JKV residents each received a swag bag containing information about the State Farmers' Market, Broward County agriculture, even flower seeds to plant in their own gardens.


Time to Fulfill Who We Are






Live to Your Full Potential
