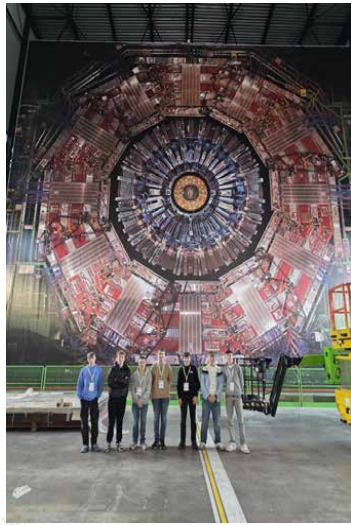

Headteacher's introduction

As we come to the end of the autumn term, I am immensely proud to reflect on what has been a genuinely positive and successful start to the academic year at Eckington School. Since September, there has been a real sense of purpose, momentum and optimism across our community, firmly rooted in our shared motto: Ambition for All. This ambition is not just a slogan; it is something we see lived out every day in classrooms, corridors, on the sports field and beyond.

This term, our three key school improvement priorities have been clearly visible in practice and are already strengthening the quality of education our students receive. Firstly, staff have focused relentlessly on checking students' understanding in lessons. Teachers are making greater use of questioning, retrieval and feedback to ensure that misconceptions are identified early and addressed promptly. As a result, lessons are increasingly responsive, and students are more confident, engaged and secure in their learning.

Secondly, we continue to ensure that our curriculum is ambitious for all learners. This means high expectations, rich subject content and careful sequencing so that all students, regardless of starting point, are supported to achieve their best. Departments have worked hard to refine schemes of learning and assessment, and this is translating into stronger progress and deeper learning across subjects.

Thirdly, attendance remains a major priority because we know it underpins everything else. There has been a clear improvement this term, supported by strong systems, early intervention and positive relationships with families. Our target of 97% attendance for all students reflects national evidence showing that good attendance is closely linked to stronger academic outcomes, better wellbeing and positive social development. Every day in school really does matter.

We are also delighted to celebrate the significant investment from Chorus Education Trust over the summer, including the installation of new external windows. This work has already improved the learning environment and we are excited about the planned programme of continued improvements over the next three years, ensuring our school buildings reflect the high standards we expect for our students.

The Eckington Way continues to shape our culture powerfully. This term, there have been countless examples of kindness, respect, responsibility and aspiration shown by our students, who represent the school so well every day.

Educational visits have been another real highlight, with students benefiting from a wide range of enriching experiences, many of which are showcased elsewhere in this newsletter. My sincere thanks go to staff who have given their time and energy to organise these opportunities.

One of the most moving moments of the term was our annual Remembrance event, where the entire school community came together to pay respect. It was an impeccably conducted and deeply respectful occasion, reflecting the maturity and values of our students.

Sport has also been a source of pride, with outstanding individual and team achievements. In particular, our girls' football teams have excelled and will now represent the region in the New Year; a fantastic achievement!

Finally, we are proud to have achieved the Careers Platinum Mark, recognising the outstanding careers education, advice and guidance we provide to our students.

Term 1 - Behaviour & Attendance

As we round off what has been a busy, rewarding and genuinely rewarding first term, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on just how far our students have come. The atmosphere around school has been increasingly positive, and it's been fantastic to see pupils engaging so well in lessons and around the site. I am always proud to walk visitors around our school who all remark on the calm and purposeful atmosphere.

Behaviour continues to improve in all the right ways, and that's down to the hard work, maturity and positive choices our young people are making every day. Between the end of November and early December, we recorded **99 fewer removals from lessons** compared with the same period last year which is an achievement that really highlights the progress being made. Even more impressively, students clocked up **over 1,500 more "Stars of the Lesson"** than this time last year. These are big numbers, but behind them are real moments of effort, kindness and determination, and we couldn't be prouder.

A big part of sustaining this positive culture is ensuring that every student feels safe, respected and valued. I'd like to remind families that our **Anti-Bullying Thresholds** are available on the school website, and I encourage you to familiarise yourselves with them. We are committed to being a school where **there is absolutely no place for hate**, and we will continue to promote open conversations around respect and inclusion. During Half Term 1, I had the privilege of meeting with a group of BAME students to explore their thoughts and experiences around racism and inclusivity. Their reflections were powerful, honest and incredibly helpful in shaping our whole-school approach. As a result of these conversations, we developed an assembly centred on racism, protected characteristics and Black History Month. These assemblies reinforced our message that we stand firmly against all forms of discrimination. It's something we are proud of and something we will continue to champion throughout the year.

Attendance is another crucial part of our school's success, and I can't emphasise enough how important it is for students to be in school every day. Consistent attendance supports academic progress, builds confidence and helps students stay connected socially and emotionally. I want to give special recognition to the many students who have maintained **100% attendance** throughout the year so far. To celebrate these achievements, we send weekly emails home to congratulate students on perfect attendance, and we look forward to recognising even more students as we move into the new term. Let's keep pushing for strong attendance across the board, as every day really does count.

As we head into the festive break, I want to thank all students, families and staff for their ongoing support, positivity and teamwork this term.

I wish you all a **very Merry Christmas** and a **happy, healthy and restful New Year**.

We would like to say a massive thank you to all the parents and students who came to our event. We hope you found it useful in figuring out if we are the right place for your child.

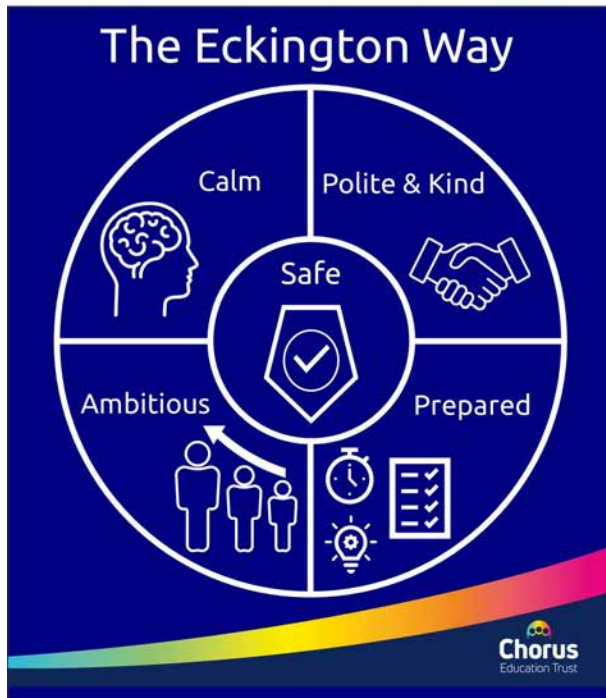

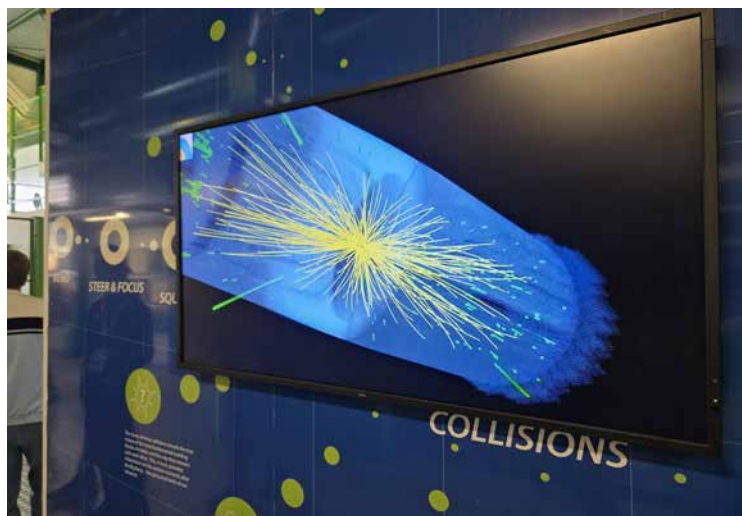
Students explore science and culture on CERN trip

Earlier this term, our Sixth Form students embarked on an unforgettable journey to CERN, the European Organization for Nuclear Research, located near Geneva. Known as the world's largest particle physics laboratory, CERN is home to groundbreaking experiments that have transformed our understanding of the universe.

The visit offered students a rare opportunity to step inside the heart of modern physics. Highlights included a guided tour of the Large Hadron Collider (LHC) facilities, where scientists probe the fundamental building blocks of matter. Students learned about the discovery of the Higgs boson, the role of particle accelerators, and how international collaboration drives innovation in science.

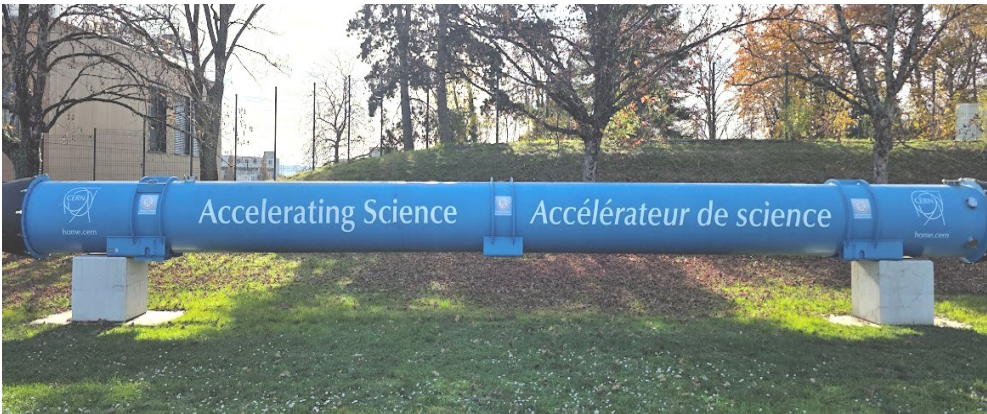
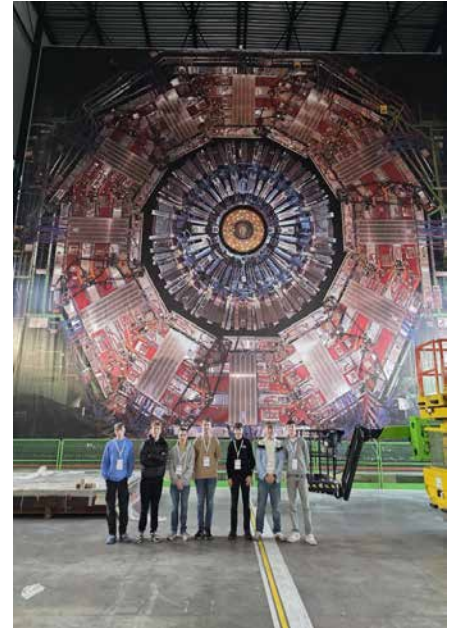
Beyond the scientific experience, the trip also allowed students to immerse themselves in the culture and beauty of Geneva. They explored the city's prominent attractions, including the Old Town, and the United Nations headquarters, while enjoying time to discover local cafés and lakeside views. This balance of science and sightseeing made the trip both educational and enriching.

Reflecting on the experience, many students described it as "eye-opening" and "inspiring," with several expressing a renewed interest in pursuing physics and engineering at university. The visit to CERN and Geneva was not just an academic excursion - it was a glimpse into the future of scientific discovery and a celebration of global culture.

Eckington School Remembers

On Monday 11th November, the entire Eckington School community came together to mark Remembrance Day with a moving and reflective whole-school ceremony.

At 10:30am, over 1,150 students and 120 staff left their classrooms and gathered in silence to honour those who made the ultimate sacrifice in service of others.

The ceremony began with words from Mr Cronin, Headteacher, about the meaning of remembrance and the importance of taking time to pause, think, and be thankful for those who fought for the freedoms we enjoy today. The event particularly recognised the 85 young men from Eckington who lost their lives during the First World War, as well as the countless others from across the British Armed Forces and the Commonwealth who have served, and continue to serve, in conflicts around the world.

Following the ceremony, a group of students accompanied Headteacher, Mr. Cronin, to the Eckington Cenotaph, where they laid Eckington School's wreath on behalf of the school community. The wreath symbolised the school's shared respect, gratitude, and ongoing commitment to remembering those who have fallen.

Reflecting on the event, Mr. Cronin said:

"It is vital that we take the time to remember and reflect on the sacrifices made by others so that we can live in freedom today. Acts of remembrance teach us about respect, gratitude, and the importance of upholding the British values of democracy, tolerance, and mutual respect. They remind us of the strength that comes from unity and compassion, even in the most difficult of times."

He continued:

"I am incredibly proud of the conduct of every student who observed the silence impeccably. Their maturity, empathy, and respect were evident throughout the ceremony, and they represented Eckington School with great dignity."

The whole-school remembrance was a powerful moment of unity - linking Eckington's proud history with the values that continue to guide its students today.

Year 7 and 8 Girls:

Year 7 and 8 girls topped their group stages, won the quarter final (2-1 against Netherthorpe), went to penalties to decide the semi-final winner and secured their place in the final in the morning. The girls were up against Dronfield in the final and won 4-0, with some incredible girls, winning the Utilita Cup and also winning their spot at Nationals, which will be on in early to mid-January 2026.

Year 9 and 10 Girls:

Year 9 and 10 girls then played in the afternoon and made it through their group stage on penalties, then secured a win in the semi-finals, with a 1-0 win against Outwood. They then had an impressive final match where Ellie scored in the final 2/3-minutes to secure them the win and win the Utilita Cup for their age group.

Both teams came back with gold medals; a fantastic result for Eckington!

We wish her all the best in her training.



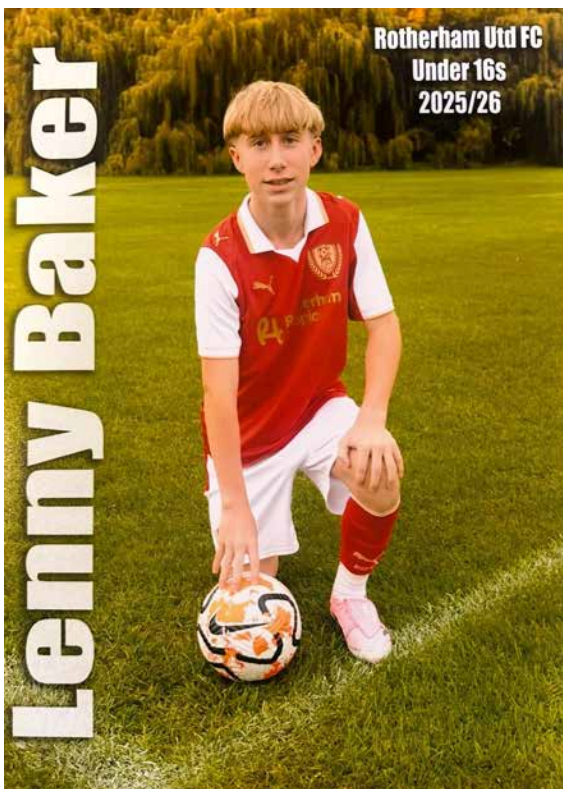

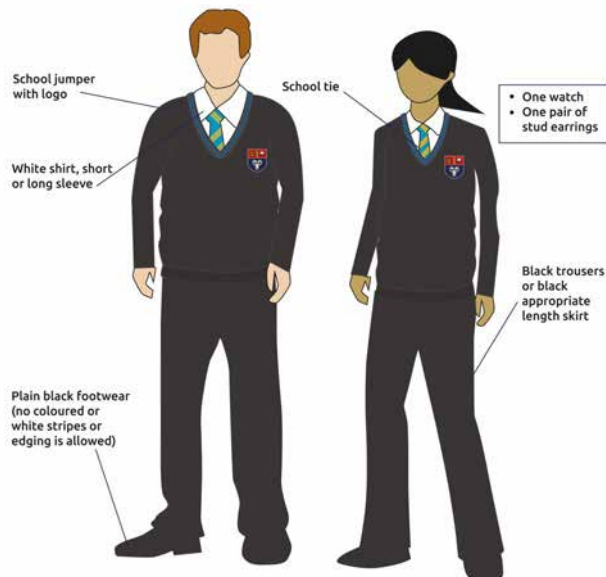
