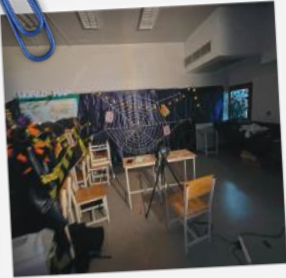
YEAR 8

After completing each piece, we ensured that everything was ready before sending the finished products to schools located in rural areas of our country. This initiative aimed to provide additional resources to students who may not have easy access to such materials, helping to enhance their learning experiences.

Throughout the process, we worked in teams, shared ideas, and collaborated to overcome challenges and improve our designs. The assignment not only required creativity and problem-solving but also helped us develop valuable life skills. It encouraged us to take initiative, manage our time effectively, and support one another in achieving a shared goal.

More importantly, the project contributed to the development of our leadership and communication skills. We learned how to express our thoughts clearly, listen actively to our peers, and take responsibility for our roles within the team. It was a meaningful experience that allowed us to grow both personally and socially, while making a positive impact on communities beyond our own.

In addition to creating learning materials, we also organized a Bake Sale for Charity Project as part of our Service in Action course. Each class formed small groups to plan, budget, and prepare baked goods for sale during lunchtime. All profits from the sale were donated to the Ramathibodi Foundation. This project gave us hands-on experience in teamwork, fundraising, and financial planning, while also encouraging us to think about social responsibility and how small efforts can lead to meaningful change.

Field Trip to Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA BANGKOK)

Surrounded by an impressive collection of modern and contemporary artworks, they explored the museum's striking galleries, starting from the fifth floor. Their artworks are fascinating, rich in detail, and filled with insightful narratives. Students found themselves deeply immersed in each piece, sparking our curiosity about the unique techniques each artist employed. The collection features works from artists across multiple generations, including Surasith Saokong and Thongchai Srisukprasert. Additionally, we admired paintings by esteemed National Artists in Panya Wijinthanasarn, whose masterpieces continue to shape the landscape of Thai art. 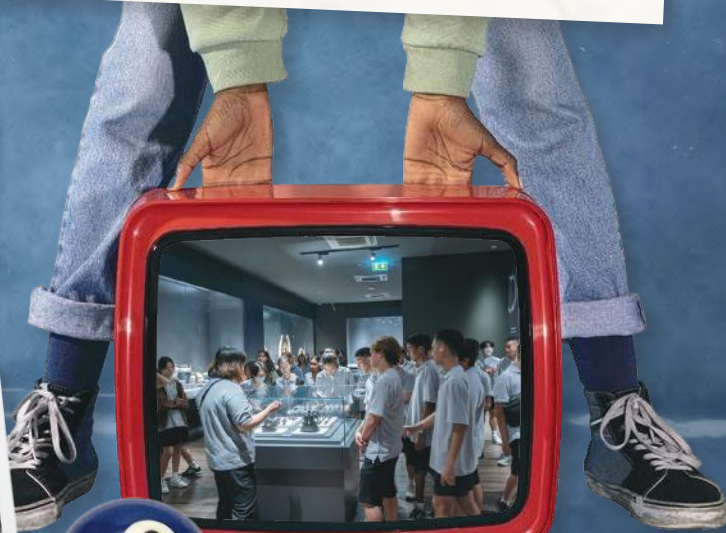
Field Trip to Bangkok National Museum

Visiting the Bangkok National Museum was like stepping into a vibrant collection of Thai history and culture. Established in 1874 by King Chulalongkorn (Rama V), the museum has the largest collection of Thai art and historical artifacts in the country, spanning from prehistoric times to the modern era.

Our journey began in the Siwamokhaphiman Hall, where the Thai History Gallery unfolds the nation's story through ancient inscriptions, royal regalia, and ceremonial artifacts. We marveled at the Phra Phuttha Sihing, a revered 15th-century bronze Buddha statue enshrined in the Buddhaisawan Chapel, its serene presence captivating all who entered.

The museum's diverse collections transported us through various periods, from Srivijaya to the Sukhothai and Ayutthaya eras, each represented by exquisite sculptures, ceramics, and artifacts. A highlight was the remarkable exhibit that was recently repatriated "Golden Boy," a 900-year-old bronze statue returned from the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Its presence underscores Thailand's ongoing efforts to reclaim and celebrate its cultural heritage. The museum also features the Pavilion of Regalia, Royal Decorations, and Coins, displaying a vast array of medals, decorations, and currencies from different periods of Thai history.

Walking through the museum's courtyards and halls, we felt a connection to Thailand's rich past. The National Museum Bangkok isn't just a museum of artifacts; it's a living narrative of a nation's journey, making our visit an unforgettable experience that deepened our appreciation for Thai culture and history.

After that, we attended a Sea Farming Demonstration where we learned about sustainable aquaculture, focusing on mud crab farming. It was fascinating to see how local communities raise these crabs in an eco-friendly way.

Next, we traveled to PranBuri Forest Park, where we explored the peaceful mangrove forest via a nature trail and also enjoyed a scenic boat trip through the calm waterways. Finding Activation Energy Chemistry Lab

In Core Practical 10, chemistry students are set out to find the Activation energy of a reaction between bromide/bromate solution and sulfuric acid in different temperatures by plotting a graph. We started off by adding the bromide solution into a boiling tube alongside 4 drops of methyl red indicator. In a separate boiling tube we pipette 5 cm³ of sulfuric acid. After the preparation, the 2 boiling tubes are heated in a water bath. Once reached appropriate temperatures, the 2 contents are poured and mixed together, and the time taken for the color of the methyl red to disappear. The temperature was 25, 35, 45, 65, 75.

After times were recorded, a graph was plotted with $1/T$ in kelvin in the X axis, and the \ln of time on the Y axis, the gradient is $-E_a/R$. Finally activation energy can be calculated by multiplying the value of $-R$ into the gradient.

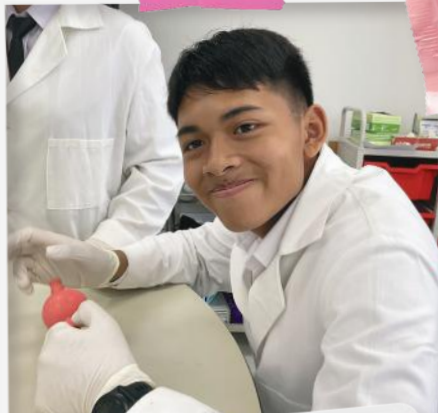

Residential Trip to Osaka, Japan

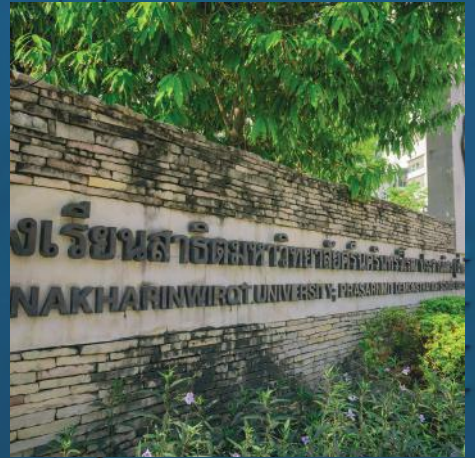


Hackathon

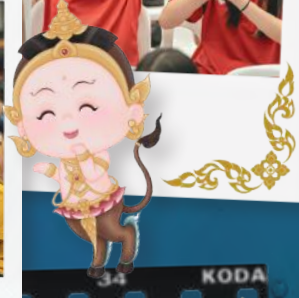
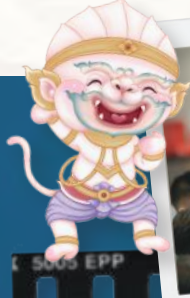

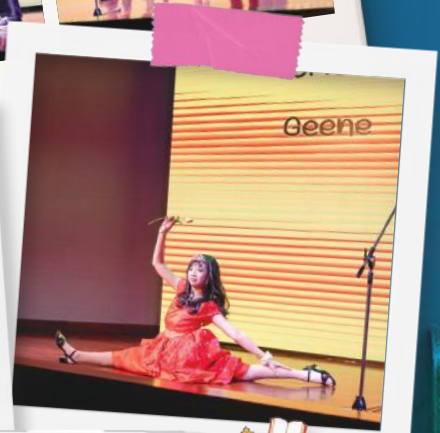


The 2nd of May proved to be a memorable day as it was SPIP's celebration of World Book Day, where students filled the halls dressed up as their favourite book characters.

Laughs, smiles and cheers in our assembly and day showed the appreciation of books all around the world, and it showed how words prove to be powerful.



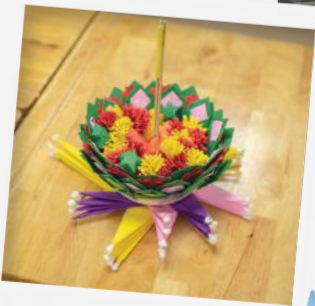
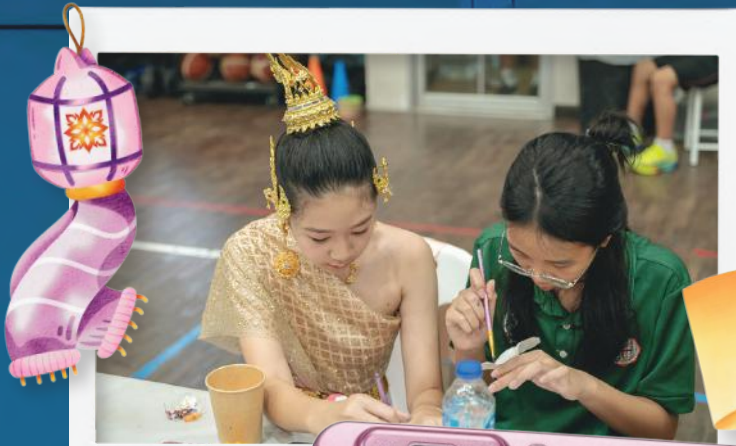


SPIP Concert Loy Kratong x Zero Waste

Zero Waste

During the 2024-2025 academic year, we organized impactful zero-waste initiatives to promote environmental awareness while supporting our community. One of our key events was Zero Waste Game Week, where students participated in eco-friendly activities.

Another highlight was Zero Waste x Loy Krathong Day, we hosted a Traditional Thai Market, serving authentic traditional drinks like nam dok anchan (butterfly pea flower tea) and desserts such as khanom chan (layered coconut pudding) - all using biodegradable plates and cups. In addition to this, the students enjoyed traditional Thai games like dod yang (jumping over rubber bands) and Thai futsal, all organized with upcycled or reusable materials.

Through these activities and entry fees, we raised 10,200 baht while demonstrating how cultural traditions can adapt to eco-friendly practices. The funds from this event, along with additional contributions, were donated to the Foundation for Slum Child Care to support education and essential needs for underprivileged children. To further extend our impact, we created an awareness campaign, sharing posters with parents to encourage donations. Thanks to their generosity, an additional 9,500 baht was raised, bringing the total contribution to 19,700 baht.

Lastly, on 6th June, the Zero Waste Debate was held with teams from Erawan, Makara, Yaksha, and Singha houses discussing an important question. Does relying on AI and automated systems for waste reduction make people less responsible for sustainable habits? This topic of the debate is especially crucial now, as AI rapidly transforms industries and daily life. With climate change accelerating, we must consider whether AI is part of the solution or if overreliance on it could create new environmental risks.

By turning eco-conscious actions into opportunities for giving, we proved that small efforts can create meaningful change...one step at a time.

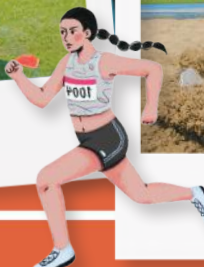
Sports Day

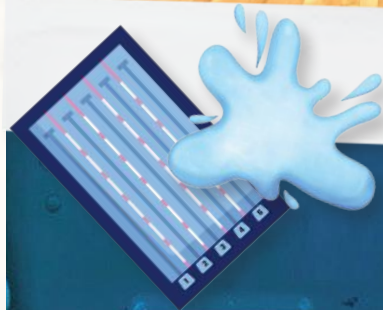


GBAC Swimming

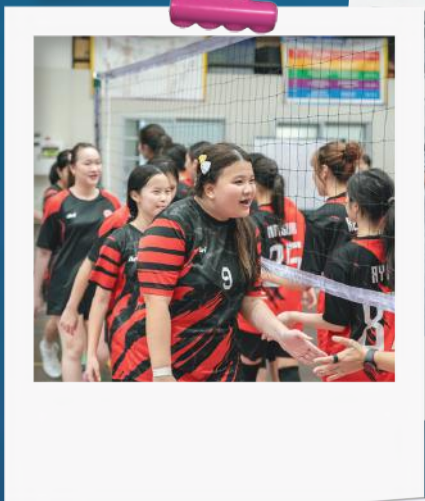

Halloween - Fashion Show

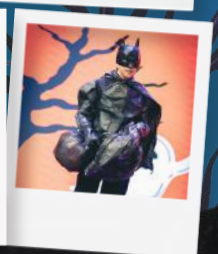
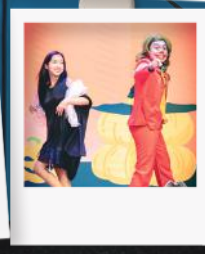
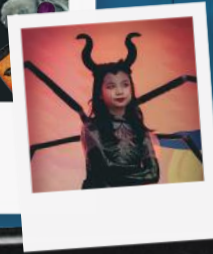
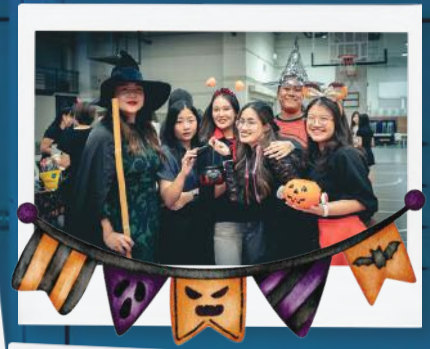
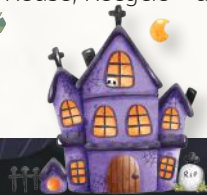

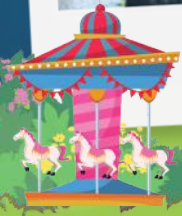
 Reduce, Reuse, Recycle—and Rock the Runway!

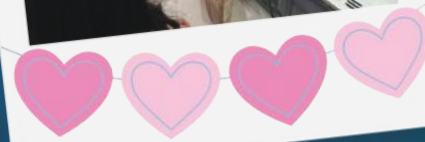




Fundraising Events (Christmas + School Production)

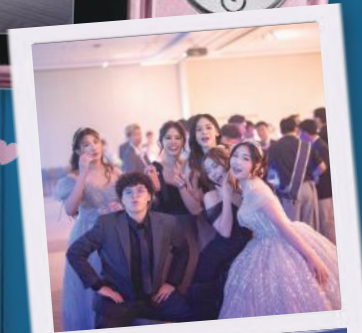
