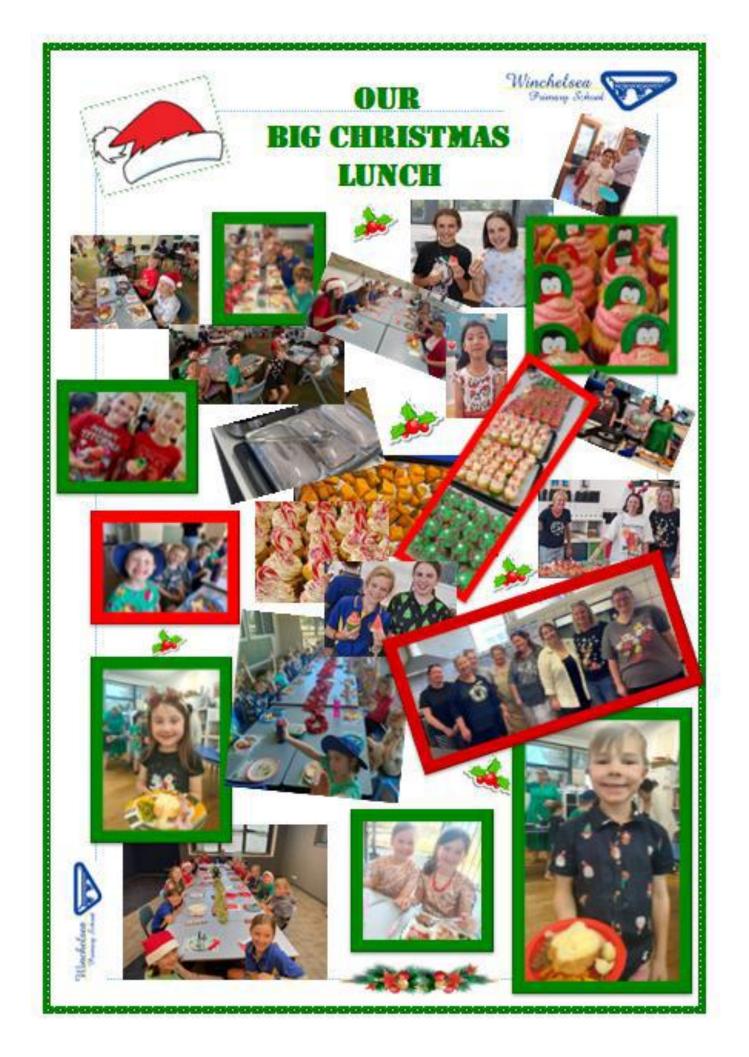
Different types of glass have different melting points, so they can't all be recycled together.

Your Input REALLY Needed

For another couple of weeks, Surf Coast Shire is gathering feedback, ideas, suggestions and directions to feed into the mandatory 4-year Council Plan that must be developed and published by October this year. I want to see more Winchelsea Ward contributions.

For now, we are running under the previous Council's 4-year Plan. State Government make Council Plans a requirement, including consultation with the various stakeholders and interested parties - in particular and especially the ratepayers of the Shire.

This 4-year Plan is no shelfware that is set and filed. It guides the strategies, directions, and decisions of the 9 Councillors. Obviously every issue and decision is considered on its own merits, but the Council Plan very much helps to shape where things go because it is based on what the community at large has said matters.

At various points, progress towards the priorities identified in the Council Plan are assessed and reported on - to you and to State Government.

The Council Plan is one of a suite of plans that State Government have decided have to be put together, maintained, and followed.

4 years is a long time. Now is the time for you to chip in with your own thoughts about what is important at the local government level, and now is the time for you to say what you think should change.

It consists of the following Themes, each with its own strategies to achieve it;

- Arts and Creativity Acknowledge the value of arts and creativity and nurture their growth
- 7. Accountable and Viable Council
 - Council has financial capacity to deliver services now and into the future and decision making is informed by community views.

Racv Urges Victorians To Prioritise Safety This Summer

RACV is encouraging Victorians to be safe on the roads and secure their homes this summer

RACV Head of Policy James Williams, said: "According to Australian Sleep Health Foundation, driving after 17 hours without sleep can be the same as driving with a blood alcohol level of around 0.05 per cent. To avoid fatigue, make sure you are well rested before embarking on a long trip, share the driving with another person if possible and plan to stop for 15 minutes every two hours."

RACV recommends packing an emergency roadside kit, checking your car insurance and emergency roadside assistance plan and doing a car safety checklist.

"It's also important to check the Fire Danger Rating on the VicEmergency app for both your destination and the route you're travelling on and follow advice from VicEmergency – for example, grassfires can move at speeds of up to 25 kilometres per hour, jump highways and be a very serious threat to motorists," Mr Williams said.

RACV also encourages Victorians to think about how they can keep their home safe while they are away.

"There's a number of things you can do to make your home safer during the holidays, particularly if you are travelling. Keep valuables locked away and out of sight and get to know your neighbours and tell them about your travel plans." Mr Williams said.

Help Keep Kids Safe Around Residential Pools And Spas

Help keep kids safe around backyard pools and spas this summer – ensure they are equipped with certified safety barriers.

Ambulance Victoria and Life Saving Victoria regional leaders have joined Surf Coast Shire Council amplifying a safety message urging people who have or are planning for a pool or spa to be mindful of their obligations to help protect children around the water.

Concerns about backyard pool and spa safety have escalated with their increased availability from hardware stores and online marketplaces, potentially being sold without guidance for new owners on Victorian Government requirements for barriers.

Royal Life Saving Australia says swimming pools are the leading location for drowning of young children.

Between 2014 and 2024, 92 children aged 4 or younger lost their lives in a swimming pool, with 41 per cent aged just one year.

Drowning risk for young children peaks in summer, with 37 per cent of all deaths

occurring between December and February.

There are more than 2,500 known pools and spas in Surf Coast Shire, and more are regularly being identified.

All spas and pools, including inflatables in place for longer than 72 hours, are required under Victorian law to be registered.

All pool and spa barriers are required to have a building permit issued before installation.

To ensure safety standards are maintained, all pool and spa owners are required by law to have a barrier compliance certificate issued every four years by a private inspector.

Each compliance certificate must be lodged with Council each time it is issued.

Surf Coast Shire Council Mayor Mike Bodsworth: "Regardless of where or how you buy it, having a backyard pool or spa comes with an obligation to help protect lives.

"The Victorian Government regulations are in place for that reason, and the responsibility sits with owners to register their pools and spas with Council and meet the safety barrier requirements.

"Tragic history shows us that carelessness about safety barriers and

gates can cost young lives. We want pool and spa owners to be proud of their safe and certified barriers, and the bottom line remains – always supervise children near water."

Ambulance Victoria Senior Team Manager Andrew Kimberley: "Drowning in home pools often occurs silently and without warning after accidental falls, with children aged under 4 most at risk.

"Always supervise children near water. Ensure your pool fence is secure, with a self-closing, self-latching gate, and learn CPR in case of an emergency."

Life Saving Victoria Manager Lifesaving Operations, West, Isaak Newcombe: "Always actively supervise children around water, 20 seconds is all it might take for a child to drown in as little as a few centimetres of water.

"Keep under-5s within arm's reach, and under-10s within eyesight around water at all times.

"Knowing how to swim isn't enough to prevent your child from drowning – they must also be actively supervised by an adult."

PayPal Tips for Staying Safe Online

During sales periods, there's often an influx of scam emails or texts from unfamiliar senders. Don't click on links in unverified communications, instead go directly to a store's official website to access deals.

Always be on the lookout for imposters of your favourite brands. If a promotional email starts with "Dear user" or "Hello, customer" rather than with your name, then you should report it as phishing.

Think twice before sharing sensitive information such as your credit card number, password, or even security questions like your first dog's name.

Stop and take stock while browsing online. Scammers often dial up the pressure with "urgent action required" or "limited time offer" messages, hoping that you'll panic and take a risk.

Before hitting the checkout button, stop what you're doing, and focus on the task at hand. It's worth taking the extra moment to limit distractions and check your work – if a deal seems too good to be true, it might be.

Check to see if the website you want to buy from has secure payment methods available, like PayPal.

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RACV Warns About Five Common Items Not To Keep In Your Car

RACV has provided information to Victorians about common items often left in cars that could be damaged or pose safety risks.

RACV General Manager Motoring Products Jeff Ames said many drivers are unaware of the risks associated with leaving everyday items in their vehicles.

"RACV is urging all motorists to be mindful of what they store in their cars, especially as the hot weather increases." Mr Ames said.

"Many of these items are oftenoverlooked hazards and by taking simple precautions, we can significantly reduce the risk of damage to personal property and potential safety issues."

The five common items you shouldn't keep in your car include:

- Electronic devices: Smartphones, laptops, and other gadgets with lithium-ion batteries can overheat, potentially leading to fire hazards.
- Medicine: Both prescription and over-the-counter medications can become less effective or inactive when exposed to extreme temperatures in parked cars.
- Aerosol cans: Deodorants, air fresheners, and other spray cans may explode under pressure in hot vehicles.



- Sunscreen: Heat can break down the active ingredients in sunscreen. rendering it ineffective for sun protection.
- Glasses and sunglasses: Frames can warp in high temperatures, and lenses left on dashboards may create fire hazards.

Victorian Crime Statistics Agency data also shows a concerning 16 per cent increase in thefts from motor vehicles, with 53.329 reported cases in Victoria for the year ending June 2024, up from 45,984 in the previous year.

"This significant rise in vehicle break-ins is concerning and we strongly advise drivers to remove all valuables and always lock their vehicles to prevent opportunistic theft," Mr Ames said.

RACV recommends that drivers regularly check their vehicles for items that should be removed and stored safely elsewhere.

RACV also emphasised the importance of maintaining a well-stocked car safety emergency kit, car insurance and keeping Emergency Roadside Assistance details on hand in case of emergency. For more information on car safety and security, visit racv.com.au.



Grants to DEVELOP Creative Inspiration

Arts and culture creatives can realise long-held project ambitions and advance careers with the help of Surf Coast Shire Council's DEVELOP grants funding.

The annual DEVELOP program aims to support creative exploration by individuals or groups, allowing successful participants to pursue new directions, ideas and concepts.

Individuals can apply for grants of up to \$3,000, and not-forprofit creative groups can apply for up to \$5,000.

Applications open on 27 January, and Council's Arts Development Team will run a series of information sessions to help people clarify concepts and prepare submissions.

"We know Surf Coast Shire is already one of Australia's creative hotspots but it is important to keep stimulating original and expansive thinking and innovation across the sector," Cr Libby Stapleton said.

"The DEVELOP grants program can help provide impetus for

individuals and groups, maybe providing opportunities for taking creative risks or pursuing unique opportunities.

"We encourage emerging, mid-career and established creatives to consider applying. Working through the submission process can be a great way to help crystallise concepts and ambitions, and we recommend intending applicants attend one of our information sessions and talk to our Arts Development Team."

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The Climate Report

2024 the hottest year on record

2024 was the first calendar year in which Earth exceeded 1.5 degree Celsius above pre-industrial levels, which is one of the targets world leaders agreed to limit warming to in the 2015 Paris Agreement.

THE 1.5C TARGET was chosen because the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) indicates that crossing that threshold risks unleashing far more severe climate change impacts, including more frequent and severe droughts, heatwaves, rainfall, and coastal flooding from storm surges.

One of the likely contributors to the extreme weather, according to climate scientists, was the continued presence of extraordinarily hot oceans around the globe.

IN AUSTRALIA hot days and hot nights dominated much of the country this year, despite some severe cold snaps during the winter.

Last year was also the 24th consecutive

year Australia failed to record a mean temperature cooler than normal. Although the overall temperature was just shy of a record, the overnight minimum temperatures were easily the highest in Bureau of Meteorology's 115 years of data.

The biggest contributor to our warming climate is greenhouse gas emissions from the burning of fossil fuels. To stop that trend, our emissions need to not only plateau but reduce.

(In 2023, Australia was called out for underreporting its annual greenhouse gas pollution. The Paris-based International Energy Agency (IEA), which conducts independent analysis of greenhouse emissions using public data including satellite detection, estimates that in 2022 Australia's coal mines were responsible for about 81 per cent more fugitive methane emissions than official statistics show, while oil and gas production generated 92 per cent more.)

RENEWABLE ENERGY is doing the bulk of the heavy lifting in reducing the world's emissions. But it's still not quite enough to offset the growing demand for electricity.

Meanwhile as wildfires rage across Los Angeles:

Planet-heating gases from burning oil, coal and gas are making wildfires in California more frequent and dangerous. With several wildfires raging around Los Angeles, 10,000plus buildings destroyed, tens of thousands have evacuated and others are confronting the precarity of where they live.

INSURANCE: For years experts have warned that homeowner insurance could easily collapse. With damages from these still mostly uncontrolled blazes now estimated at up to one hundred and fifty billion dollars.

HEALTH EFFECTS: the smoke billowing into the air carries more than the expected risks of particulate matter and carbon emissions. Urban wildfires, unlike those in remote forests, burn through large areas of neighbourhoods filled with synthetic materials like plastics, rubber, fiberglass and treated asphalt, releasing a cocktail of hazardous chemicals into the air.

Free Driving Lessons

The start of myLearners Free Lesson has been announced, a free 60 minute in-car session designed to help parents confidently guide young drivers.

The session will be delivered by an accredited driving instructor to teach learner drivers essential road safety skills and help supervising drivers gain

the confidence to support their learners to complete their 120 hours.

Victorian learner permit holders aged 16 to 19 – who have completed 10 to 30 hours of driving practice and have a fully licensed supervising driver available to attend the lesson with them – will be eligible to participate.

The course is targeted at young drivers as this cohort is almost four times more likely to be involved in a fatal or serious

injury crash than more experienced drivers in their first year of driving on their Ps.

It's important to acknowledge the importance of body positivity because everyone is different! Some women are naturally chubbier than others. Body positivity empowers mothers in rural settings to prioritize self-care, such as managing stress, anxiety, and being burnt-out. Our community can actively support body positivity and health well-being and already is with programs listed:

- Local fitness programs at the Winchelsea Health Club (group classes as well as the gym)
- The 'Sunny Gym' in Winchelsea & personal training
- Park run in Winchelsea on Saturdays
- · Walking & self-care
- Following a healthy diet

Kids doing local sports such as footy, netball

These activities promote self-care. By focusing on self-care and embracing your own appearance, whether it's chubby or skinny, it helps break down stereotypes and stigmas around motherhood or anyone dealing with insecurities and body image, not just mothers. Although mothers play a significant role in shaping their children's self-esteem and body image, by practicing body positivity, mothers can model healthy attitudes and behaviours to our younger demographic here in Winchelsea. The food we eat can either positively affect us or cause us to have health issues. Body positivity is about self-care and taking good care of one's health. No matter what you look like, your worth isn't justified by how skinny you are; rather, it's about creating a healthy environment and taking good care of yourself, prioritising health and being the best person you can be. I wanted to put this in the Star because we have such a good community here in Winchelsea, and want the community to spread kindness and acceptance, especially for a younger demographic. Eating disorders are most common in adolescence (younger people). This needs to change!

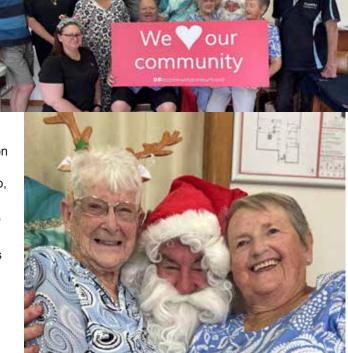

Your Care Path: A Lifeline for Rural and Remote Communities

New program provides holistic support for people with chronic conditions in rural Victoria

The start of this year saw a new program, "Your Care Path" being introduced at Hesse Rural Health (Hesse). The program provides essential support to individuals living with chronic conditions or those at risk of developing them, particularly in rural and remote areas. Aiming to improve both health and overall wellbeing, the initiative delivers comprehensive care and encourages sustainable, healthy lifestyle changes.

Hesse in partnership between Colac Area Health and Great Ocean Road Health (lead agency), implemented the program with funding received from the Western Victoria Primary Health Network to serve the Colac, Coast, and Otway areas. This area spans the municipalities of Colac Otway and parts of the Golden Plains and Surf Coast Shires.

The key goal of Your Care Path is to complement—not replace—existing chronic condition management, allowing patients to continue seeing their regular general practitioners while receiving specialized care from a team of health professionals. This approach is designed to support people at all stages of their care journey.

The program offers a holistic model that focuses on personcentred care, early intervention, and evidence-based selfmanagement. One of the most exciting aspects is the formation of multidisciplinary teams that collaborate to provide ongoing care. These teams include a range of Allied Health professionals who work alongside GPs, providing services such as exercise and healthy lifestyle education, as well as individualized treatment plans.

Feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive. One participant shared, "It's a very good program... being with other people is an advantage. It disciplines you to do exercise when you would normally overlook it. It helps give a sense of community... the program helps prioritize exercise in a busy schedule."

Since the introduction of Your Care Path, Hesse has experienced a notable increase in attendance at its community health centres. The number of Allied Health programs offered has also grown, reflecting the success of this collaborative approach. Many consumers have reported significant



improvements in their health and wellbeing, with increased confidence in managing their conditions. Additionally, participants have expressed feeling more socially connected, which adds to the overall impact of the program.

By combining practical health support with a sense of community, Your Care Path is transforming the way people in rural Victoria manage their chronic health conditions and live healthier, more fulfilling lives. 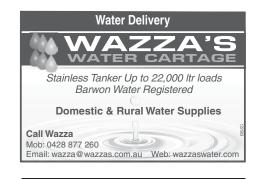

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Storing Hay On Farm

Low rainfall in winter and spring has made it difficult in many areas of the state to make good quality hay this season. However, once it has been made it's important to store it to minimise yield and quality losses and make it efficient to feed or load.

For cropping farmers it's also been a difficult year causing some cereal crops intended for grain production to be cut for hay due to the dry and frosty end to the grain growing season.

By the time the decision is made to turn cereal crops into hay, it can often be too late to make good quality hay. Some areas in the state have had a much wetter end to spring causing hay on the ground to remain damp and take longer to cure before baling.

The optimal storage for hay is under cover with protection from the weather on the side of most common wind direction. Placing a tarp under the haystack can help prevent moisture

spoilage on bottom bales. Square bales are the most efficient to store under cover and to transport due to the weight density.

When storing in the open round bales should be in single rows and not stacked on top of each other. This helps the rain run off the rounded edge rather than get trapped between the top and bottom bale.

Square bales should be stacked with the top 2 bale rows offsetting the 2 rows of bales beneath by half. Square bales stored outside should be tarped or capped to help prevent weather damage.

Proper storage is crucial to maintain the quality of the hay. Hay can lose up to 1 5% of its dry matter weight over one winter when stored poorly in the paddock.

Getting a feed test done on your hay will tell you what sort of quality hay it is, which is important if you want to sell it or feed it to livestock.

Think about using sensors or physical methods to check bale temperatures to reduce the fire risks once stacked.

Protect Your Summer Tomato Harvest

Agriculture Victoria is urging gardeners to use insect-proof netting to shield their tomato plants from pests, including Queensland fruit fly, this growing season.

State Fruit Fly Coordinator Cathy Mansfield explained that most tomatoes grown by home gardeners are indeterminate varieties, which continuously flower and set fruit.

"The best time to apply insect-proof netting is after most of the flowers have been pollinated but while the fruit is still small," Ms. Mansfield said.

"This ensures your crop is protected without interfering with pollination."

The same applies for other continuously flowering fruit and vegetables such as eggplants and capsicums.

"Check the netting is secure each time

you harvest your tomatoes, and repair any holes promptly to maintain protection," Ms Mansfield said.

Stings on tomatoes will look like a pin prick on the surface of the fruit, and when cut open you may have maggots inside. If your tomatoes have been

infested with fruit fly make sure you treat by bagging and putting in the sun, microwaving or freezing solid to kill the maggots.

Avoid placing infested fruit in compost, as this can allow fruit fly to emerge and infest future crops.

Training is once again in full swing and all players are urged to get onto the green and put in some extra work for the remainder of the season, may the bowls be with you!!





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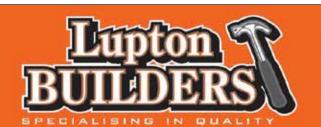
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
