## **NVM Kicks Off...**



To mark the start of a nationwide celebration under the theme "Igniting Volunteer-Led Innovation for Future Growth and Social Transformation: Bolunterismo Tungo sa Bagong Pilipinas," Cagayan de Oro City,

known as the "City of Golden Friendship," hosted the 2024 National Volunteer Month (NVM) Kick Off on December 1st with an inspiring and vibrant event. Led by the City Government Officials and coordinated by the City Volunteerism and Active Citizenship Program Office, the celebration recognized the importance of volunteerism and emphasized how volunteer-led innovation can drive future growth and social transformation.

December 1st was a day brimming with energy and purpose, truly bringing the spirit of volunteerism to life. The day kicked off with a heartfelt mass at St. Augustine Cathedral, honoring National Volunteer Month and setting a reflective tone for the exciting activities to come.



As the afternoon unfolded, over 1,000 volunteers and participants from all walks of life and from all over the country gathered for the eagerly awaited "BayaniRun: Volunteer Fun Run". The excitement was evident as the event kicked off with a high-energy 30-minute Zumba session at Plaza Divisoria, energizing the runners before they lined up for the race.

By celebrating IVD, the nation reaffirms its commitment to fostering the spirit of volunteerism, both locally and globally, as a vital force for achieving sustainable progress and uplifting communities.

The 2024 national International Volunteer Day (IVD) celebration event took place at the Ayala Museum, with Ayala Foundation, Inc. (AFI) as a key partner in organizing the event. PNVSCA, in collaboration with AFI, provided an inspiring avenue for the celebration, bringing together volunteers, community leaders, and organizations from across the country to recognize and honor the selfless contributions of volunteers in creating positive change.



PNVSCA Executive Director Donald James D. Gawe delivered a thoughtful message and shared a video that highlighted the rich history of international volunteering in the Philippines. He recognized how both local and international volunteers have contributed their skills and knowledge over the years to address key challenges, support development, and build lasting connections across borders.

Participants delved into topics such as gender-sensitive volunteerism, sustainable program design, and financial literacy. More than 140 attendees, including extension directors, faculty, student leaders, and volunteers, gained hands-on experience through an open book reading program in partnership with Ayala Foundation primary schools. This activity underscored the importance of integrating gender equity into volunteer-driven initiatives.



The second training, co-organized with PSNEI in coordination with Liceo De Cagayan University, was titled as "Training the Trainers on Volunteer Management for Effective NSTP/NSRC Implementation in Developing the Youth for Nation Building." The activity aimed to assess the NSTP as a mechanism to instill the value of volunteerism among the youth and recommend action steps to strengthen it as a channel towards the voluntary sector's vision that volunteerism becomes a way of life of every Filipino.



Sessions focused on the basic concepts and paradigms of volunteerism, Philippine Standard on Volunteering for Development, introduction to service learning in the context of volunteerism in NSTP, volunteering in NSTP as an effective service-learning delivery mechanism, innovative strategies for integrating volunteerism in NSTP, volunteerism and NSTP/NSRC implementation, and opportunities for collaboration. A validation workshop was also conducted where an enhanced draft of the existing volunteerism module in NSTP was developed. About 120 NSTP coordinators and implementers from different HEIs throughout the country attended the activity. They shared their enthusiasm as they look forward to a better implementation of the NSTP where volunteerism will be further and strongly integrated into the module.



PAPSAS facilitated the third training, "Strengthening Volunteerism: Empowering the Youth of Today," which centered on equipping student leaders with the skills and motivation to drive societal change. Among the topics discussed include basic concepts and paradigms of volunteerism, principles of volunteerism, volunteer management, and opportunities for collaboration. Several student organizations presented their volunteering initiatives, as well as their challenges encountered and best practices. A workshop was also conducted to enhance the capacity of school-based organizations as seedbeds for volunteerism culture. At the end of the training, several student organizations expressed their interest in working with organizations from other HEIs in the implementation of their volunteering projects and activities. More than 80 participants, mostly student leaders representing various HEIs in the country accompanied by SAS practitioners, attended the training.





In all three activities, the participants shared that the learnings they gathered from the sessions further motivated them to engage in volunteering and make a meaningful impact in their communities.

These initiatives underline the pivotal role of Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in fostering a culture of volunteerism. By integrating volunteerism into their curricula and extracurricular activities, HEIs cultivate leadership, civic engagement, and social responsibility among the youth. As mandated by Republic Act 9418 or the Volunteer Act of 2007, integrating volunteerism into the basic and higher education curriculum is essential for raising consciousness and nurturing a nation of engaged citizens.

The training sessions exemplify PNVSCA's commitment to empowering stakeholders to drive meaningful change. The agency recognizes HEIs as key players in embedding volunteerism into the fabric of Philippine society, ensuring that it becomes a way of life for current and future generations.

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# NVM Volunteerism Expos...

Each expo brought its own unique charm, but several key elements were consistently present throughout the events. Dialogues and knowledge-sharing sessions offered valuable insights into volunteerism and the various initiatives led by the exhibitors.

Cultural intermission performances added a lively touch to the expos, showcasing local talent and enriching the experience for all attendees. Interactive features, such as freedom walls, booth passports, and raffles, encouraged participants to engage with exhibitors.

The National Volunteer Expo in Cagayan de Oro (CDO) on December 3 at Centrio Mall marked the start of a month-long journey of discovery. The event was made possible through the support of Mayor Rolando 'Klarex' Uy and the Office for Community Affairs, with Department Manager Oliver V. Egypto representing the Mayor during the expo. This initiative was carried out in collaboration with the Ayala Foundation.



Exhibitors included Andam Higala, Ayala Foundation, City College of CDO, City Government of Cagayan de Oro, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) X, Global Initiative for Exchange and Development (GIED), Kagayanon Youth Network Alliance, Kusgan Volunteers, Life Project 4 Youth, the Philippine Red Cross (PRC), and the CDO Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA). These organizations highlighted diverse initiatives and volunteer opportunities.

A volunteer engagement forum, featuring Kusgan Volunteers, Inc. and CDO YMCA, sparked discussions on active citizenship and the collective power of volunteering, underscoring the value of collaboration in driving positive change.

Complementing the expo, activities such as the "Dugong Kagay-anon Year 2" blood donation drive and the Department of Labor and Employment's "Uswag Opportunities" job fair encouraged further community involvement. DSWD X also provided consultations and referrals to social services, addressing various community needs.



The National Volunteer Month Celebration expo in Baguio, held on December 6-7 at Malcolm Square, united a diverse group of individuals passionate about volunteerism. Organized by the City Government of Baguio through the City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (CDRRMO), the event offered participants the opportunity to connect with organizations dedicated to education, healthcare, and environmental conservation, reinforcing the message that volunteerism is for everyone, regardless of background or interests.



A diverse group of exhibitors showcased their work, providing attendees with opportunities to connect and contribute. Military and civic organizations, including the 122nd Naval Combat Support Squadron Reserve, 14th CAR Regional Community Defense Group, and 21st Air Force Group Reserve, demonstrated their roles in promoting community resilience. First responders such as 911 On-Call Inc., the Baguio City Fire Station, and Kabalikat Civicom emphasized the importance of safety and preparedness.

The Philippine Army and PRC offered insights into their critical humanitarian efforts, while international organizations like Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers (JOCV) and United States Peace Corps (USPC) brought a global perspective to the event. Local initiatives, such as those led by Deltans Zigzag, showcased the creativity and dedication of grassroots movements.

The NVM webinar series kicked off on December 11 with the "Higher Education Institution Brigada Pagbasa Initiative para sa Bagong Pilipinas (HEI-BPI)" webinar, in partnership with World Vision Philippines. The webinar focused on the crucial role of volunteerism in promoting literacy and bridging educational gaps.

In its efforts to enhance volunteerism within educational institutions, PNVSCA has formed partnerships with 74 colleges and universities, 66 of which provide courses in education, an entry point for volunteering in enhancing literacy among Filipino learners. To maximize these collaborations, PNVSCA endorses the use of Brigada Pagbasa as the volunteer initiative aimed at addressing literacy challenges.

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Mr. Geomel Jetonzo, esteemed author and Program Director of the Brigada Pagbasa Movement under the World Vision Philippines, delivered an inspiring presentation on the Brigada Pagbasa Program, an initiative designed to promote literacy among Filipino children.

He emphasized the program's mission to unite advocates, educators, parents, and volunteers in enhancing the reading skills of Filipino youth. Mr. Jetonzo highlighted the vital role of education in nation-building and the need for collective action to address literacy challenges. By bridging educational gaps and fostering strong reading abilities, the program aims to empower children and contribute to a brighter, more inclusive future.

His talk inspired the audience to view themselves as crucial contributors to this effort, encouraging collaboration to create a transformative impact on the lives of Filipino children.

Ms. Maria Cristina G. Baroso of the Department of Education Region V, in her presentation of the HEI-BPI Program, emphasized that their afterschool reading program initiative has effectively utilized the dedication of over 80,000 volunteer teachers, facilitators, and tutors to significantly enhance the reading skills of Bicolano children.

On the other hand, PNVSCA Executive Director Donald James D. Gawe highlighted the importance of Brigada Pagbasa as one vital platform for promoting volunteerism within the community. The launch of the HEI-BPI initiative marked a significant step in mobilizing higher education institutions for educational change. The online session was attended by around 140 representatives from partner HEIs nationwide.

#### Webinar Series 2: Once a Volunteer, Always a Volunteer (OVAV)

Since its inception in 2001, the Search for Outstanding Volunteers (SOV) has celebrated over 200 individuals for their selfless dedication to service. In 2020, recognizing the need for a platform to connect and inspire volunteers, the "Once a Volunteer, Always a Volunteer (OVAV)" webinar was introduced. The inaugural event emphasized the importance of a space for volunteers to share insights into good volunteering practices.

Building on its success, the 2nd OVAV webinar in 2022 became a hybrid talk show, featuring inspiring SOV 2022 awardees who shared their journeys to motivate others to embrace volunteerism.

Continuing the tradition, PNVSCA hosted the 3rd OVAV webinar on December 16, 2024, attracting over 800 online participants, including passionate volunteers and those eager to learn more about the power of volunteering.

The 2024 OVAV webinar featured inspiring stories of SOV awardees including Mr. Rod Charlie Delos Reyes (2023), Ms. Aliah Adam (2019), Mr. Mark Cerezo (2014), and Mr. Carlito Amalla (2008), along with newest 2024 awardees - Mr. Sheen Milger Ochavo and Mr. Fernando Fajardo. These esteemed individuals shared their personal journeys and valuable insights, showcasing the transformative power of volunteerism and inspiring others to embrace a life of service.



A true advocate for youth and environmental stewardship, Mr. Ochavo has demonstrated the power of youth engagement in addressing critical societal challenges. His initiatives, such as PadyaKalikasan, Kabataan sa Halalan, GrowGreen, and #SabadoTudlo, have not only inspired youth involvement but also

empowered them to become influential changemakers in education, climate resilience, and civic participation.

On the other hand, Mr. Fajardo, a recipient of the Volunteer Lifetime Achievement Award 2024, is a testament to the enduring impact of dedicated service. His lifelong commitment to community development is evident in his diverse initiatives that he shared, ranging from disaster relief to sustainable

livelihood programs.

Webinar Series 3: Volunteering for Child Rights



To extend the celebration of National Children's Month, a webinar on Volunteering for Child Rights was held on December 19th, spotlighting the impactful work of the 2024 Search for Outstanding Volunteer (SOV) Awardees – the Yellow Boat of Hope Foundation, I-SAVED, and Mr. Jorjani Sinsuat. The session emphasized the vital role volunteers play in advocating for child rights and fostering safe, nurturing environments for all children. The webinar garnered significant online traction, achieving nearly 1k views on Facebook.

Having worked with UNICEF's special project on the Third Country Program for Children during his early years at NEDA, PNVSCA Executive Director Donald James D. Gawe provided valuable insights on the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. He discussed key aspects such as the definition of a child, the four general principles of the UNCRC, and the importance of Early Childhood Care and Development.

Dr. Anton Mari Lim, founder of the Yellow Boat of Hope Foundation, shared how the organization provides children in remote, poverty-stricken areas across the Philippines access to education. Inspired by the concept of the yellow school bus, they introduced "yellow boats" to safely transport children to and from school, overcoming geographical challenges.

Established in 2016, I-SAVED made remarkable strides in improving the lives of children in indigenous communities. As shared by its Founder, Mr. John Mauro Manuel, I-SAVED provides essential school supplies, runs a sustainable feeding program, and offers literacy sessions, ensuring that children have access to quality education and essential resources.

Mr. Sinsuat's notable work includes Project Saguna, which provides vital psychosocial support to children affected by armed conflict.

#### Webinar Series 4: Voluntourism

On December 20th, the Voluntourism webinar, hosted in partnership with National University (NU) Dasmariñas, attracted over 100 participants on

Microsoft Teams and nearly 2k views on Facebook, highlighting the growing interest in responsible and sustainable voluntourism. This collaboration showcased NU Dasmariñas' dedication to promoting impactful volunteerism. Distinguished speakers included Dr. Gelena Asis-Dimpas, Assistant Regional Director of the Department of Tourism – Region 7, who provided an insightful overview of the "State of Voluntourism in the Philippines"; Ms. Jolly Joyce Tibay, OIC-Tourism Officer of the Provincial Government of Surigao del Norte, who shared valuable "Case Studies and Best Practices on Voluntourism" implemented in CARAGA region; and Prof. Richard Philip Gonzalo from the UP Asian Institute of Tourism, who discussed "Managing Voluntourism: Towards Enriching and Responsible Voluntourism in the Philippines.

## Webinar Series 6: The Role of Volunteers in Wildlife Conservation and Animal Protection

As the grand finale, on December 26th, Central Mindanao University (CMU) hosted a webinar on the Role of Volunteers in Wildlife Conservation and Animal Protection via Zoom, attracting 1,000 participants and earning an impressive 37.1k views on Facebook.

The webinar's panel of experts highlighted the crucial role volunteers play in preserving wildlife and protecting animals. Dr. Florfe M. Acma, Director of Center for Biodiversity Research and Extension in Mindanao (CEBREM), delivered a presentation on "Wildlife Conservation and Animal Protection: The Urgent Call for Volunteers and Community Involvement" where she emphasized the critical role of public engagement in safeguarding wildlife. On the other hand, Ms. Lea M. Camangeg, Faculty member from the College of Sciences at Palawan State University (PSU), shared valuable insights on "Wildlife Initiatives of PSU: A Collaborative and Volunteer-Based Effort," showcasing successful examples of community-driven conservation programs; Mr. Koushik "Venky" Subramanian, Program and Sustainability Manager at Coastal Underwater Resource Management Actions (CURMA), presented "CURMA's Initiatives and Call to Action," highlighting the organization's efforts in marine conservation and the importance of volunteer participation; and Ms. Rheanmarie Dauing, Ecosystem Management Specialist at Olango Island Sanctuary, discussed "Olango Island Sanctuary Wildlife Conservation Initiatives and Volunteer Engagement," providing a case study on successful volunteer programs in a protected area.




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
