

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



# The return of my missing Porsche

#### A childhood memory.

I was six years old when I managed to persuade my mother to get me something I'd been eyeing for months—a Hot Wheels Porsche to play with. I vividly recall the thrill of unpacking it in our driveway. As my knees grazed the hard-pebbled driveway, the toy gleamed silver in the sunlight.


I spent what felt like hours zooming my toy Porsche back and forth on the driveway, lost in my imagination, playing out daring races in my mind. But, as fate would have it, my joy was shortlived. In a blink, it slipped from my grasp and vanished into the gutter next to my driveway.

I was crushed. I scoured that drain for days, hoping against hope for a miracle, but my Porsche never appeared in my driveway. With crushed dreams, I did eventually move on. My family and I relocated from India to British Columbia, Canada, in 2006—a classic tale of immigrant resilience and struggles.

Yet, my love affair with cars persisted. I pursued a degree in Integrated Engineering (Mechanical and Electrical) at the University of British Columbia. I later set my sights on the tech and marketing industry in the United States working for companies like Tesla, Facebook and then founding my own company Roveir.

Then, just two months ago, I returned back to Vancouver, BC and set my eyes on Porsche GT4 sitting at the Porsche Centre of Langley. Soon enough, a blast from the past greeted me in my driveway. There it was, my childhood Porsche, as if conjured by magic. The car was in my driveway - my dreams finally became a reality.

I never thought it would be this early on in my life, being 27 now, that I would be able to buy and become the proud owner of a Carrara White Metallic Porsche 718 GT4. A nod to that lost toy and a testament to my journey from childhood dreams to adult realities.



Each day behind the wheel is a reminder of the joy and wonder I felt as a child. It's my first manual, and mastering it brings back that same sense of triumph and excitement I had on the driveway.

This car isn't just another possession; it's a symbol of resilience and the enduring spirit of youth. I hope to pass it down to my own children someday, sharing with them the same sense of adventure and possibility that a Porsche delivers.

In the end, it's a simple truth: a kid is a kid is a kid, and no matter where life takes us, the dreams of our childhood have a way of finding us again.

# Porsche Platz drew thousands of enthusiasts

Vancouver International Auto Show.

**PCA-CWR's display of members' Porsches at the Vancouver** International Auto Show (VIAS) on March 23-24 was an overwhelming success, attracting thousands of sports car enthusiasts.

Thirteen Porsche 911 cars from eight different series, spanning six decades, were exhibited on Saturday in various colours for spectators to admire.

On Sunday, club members displayed another thirteen GT cars, including the GT2, GT2RS, GT3, GT3RS, GT4, and GT4RS models. It was an impressive display that delighted thousands who attended.

The "Porsche Platz" (as it has been known) was previously held on Jack Poole Plaza, but at the last minute, we learned a protest demonstration was planned for Saturday! In an 11th-hour negotiation with Auto Show officials, we brought Saturday's Porsche Platz inside the Vancouver Convention Centre.

The group was promptly informed of the change of plans, and everyone arrived early Saturday morning at the Convention Centre loading docks. Auto Show officials quickly made room for our display, and we positioned all the Porsches.

The 2024 VIAS set an overall attendance record

of more than 129,000 people during its 5-day run. On Saturday alone, nearly 40,000 people attended the Auto Show - and every one of them visited our Porsche display! It was a hectic day for the participating members as we worked to look after the cars and answer all the enthusiastic questions from the public.

The "Six Decades of 911" show was a huge hit, and consequently, Auto Show officials asked us to bring the GT car show back to the Convention Centre on Sunday! The change of plans was communicated to the participating members late on Saturday, and a rejigged parking plan was put in place.

One enthusiastic member who had not registered for the Sunday event arrived at the loading dock with his GT car, asking if he could participate. Luckily, we were able to accommodate him, and after yet another reworking of the parking plan, all the GT cars were in place. And, of course, the public loved it!

Sunday drew another 25,000 visitors to the VIAS, including students from BCIT working on a documentary about the PCA-CWR who wanted to film one of the cars starting. One member accommodated the request and revved his Guards Red, 2018 Porsche 991.2 GT3 as high





as the engine limiter would allow.

Coupled with a "Shark Werks" exhaust system, this made for quite a show. We estimated 500 people were at our display, 2 to 3 rows deep, with cameras out to witness the event. People were running through the Auto Show to see what was going on, and afterwards, the crowd responded with a round of applause!

One member said afterwards that sometimes we take for granted how amazing and beloved these machines are. People love the power, the smell, and the dream that Porsche represents. Participating club members were lucky to spend time with all the people who came through our displays. It's fun to answer questions and talk about these great cars with enthusiastic people!

We are already discussing the 2025 Auto Show with the event's organizers. They want us back, and we already have ideas on how we can expand our participation and contribute to an even more exciting Auto Show next year!

Many thanks to all the club members who participated in both Porsche Platz shows this year!

# Celebrating Cinco de Mayo

# A scenic Fraser Valley drive and the flavours of Mexican cuisine.

Member Luis Brasdefer has been organizing our Cinco de Mayo festivities for several years, and this year was exceptional as they celebrated the rich tapestry of Mexican culture with the vibrant flavours of Yucatan-style cuisine.

Cinco de Mayo, or the '5th of May' in Spanish, is an annual celebration that holds a significant place in Mexican history. It is not Mexican Independence Day, a popular misconception. It commemorates Mexico's victory over the Second French Empire at the Battle of Puebla in 1862. While not a national holiday in Mexico, it has evolved into a celebration of Mexican culture for expatriates in the United States and Canada.

The day began with over 40 Porsche club members meeting in Langley for an hour-long Fraser Valley drive designed by Jeff Rebiffe, a former President of CWR.

Their lunch destination was the residence of Alan and Aimee Bird in Langley, which was decorated with Mexican folk art. To their surprise, hanging above everyone's heads was Papel Picado, intricate cut-out paper designs from the Aztec practices.

These art designs are commonly cut from as many as 40 – 50 coloured tissue papers stacked together and using a guide or template, a small mallet, and chisels, creating as many as 50 banners at a time. Included in the art was "Porsche Club" on white, green and red paper, the colours of the Mexican flag. The banners were custom-made in Mexico, ordered by Fernanda Smithers.

An accomplished Mexican chef, Fernanda Smithers skillfully prepared authentic Yucatan-style dishes using traditional recipes and ingredients. She received invaluable support from Artemisa Brasdefer, Nav Singha, Rio Coupal, and Ivan Quintana.

Members dined on appetizers of Hibiscus, Guacamole Tacos, and Mango Ceviche. They were followed by Panuchos with Cochinita (pork meat) and typical Yucatan Tamales. The desserts were Guava fruit candy with cheese and flan.

Thanks to Alan and Aimee Bird for hosting, Fernanda and Jimmy Smithers for preparing lunch and decorations, Luis and Artemisa Brasdefer for organizing the event, Jeff Rebiffe for planning the drive and volunteers.

# Penticton is the perfect Porsche travel adventure

Discovering the best roads, wineries and elevated dining experiences in Penticton's wine region.

Penticton is the perfect destination for a memorable Porsche travel adventure, especially if you want a break from the hustle and bustle of big-city life.

Situated in the Okanagan Valley in the southern interior of British Columbia, Penticton is nestled between the tranquil Okanagan and Skaha lakes. With only 40,000 residents, it radiates a simpler time, a small-town charm that is increasingly rare today.

My Porsche travel adventure begins in Vancouver and will take me 395 km, a four-and-a-half-hour drive east along Trans-Canada Highway 1 to Hope, which connects to Highway 3.

I loved the exhilarating experience of cruising along Highway 3 in my Porsche Boxster. This road is ideal for driving enthusiasts. The scenic route offers an engaging,

twisty road – including 360-degree hairpin turns through coastal mountain valleys, melting snow-cap-fed rivers and untouched forests. Along the way, you might spot wildlife such as deer, black bears, mountain goats, and forgotten gold rush mining towns.

During my two-day visit to Penticton, I visited its brewery scene and several wineries offering elevated dining experiences. My Porsche travel adventure took me north to Naramata Bench, where I enjoyed stunning lake views, orchards, and vineyards. On the second day, I took a circular drive south to Okanagan Falls and around Skaha Lake before returning to town.

Penticton summers are sunny and hot, and the region offers various outdoor activities for all ages and families. These include relaxing on the sandy beaches, water







activities on the lake, hiking and biking along the Kettle Valley Rail (KVR) trail, and skiing or snowboarding on local hills in winter.

On my first day, I quickly noticed that the residents moved much slower than city folks. The exception was a senior woman on an electric mobility scooter barreling down the sidewalk as I stepped out of the pastry shop. Perhaps she has a Porsche, too?

Main Street is lined with mom-and-pop businesses, such as coffee shops and artist galleries. Everyone is friendly. You will find a wide range of hotels, breweries, wine-tasting rooms, and restaurants, all within walking distance. Feel free to leave your Porsche parked for the night and enjoy the small-town charm of Penticton.

Arriving later in the morning, I was excited to delve into Penticton's thriving brewery scene, which currently features eight breweries.

Cannery Brewing, located on Ellis Street in the downtown district, is a must-visit. Upon arriving for lunch, I met Patt Dyck, Co-Founder and General Manager. As we toured her facility, I quickly learned they are passionate about brewing beer. She shared with me that her business is more than brewing beer; it's about their customers and the local community.

The taproom offers 12 taps, local wine and cider, locally sourced and house-made snacks, and live entertainment on Sundays. During my visit, I enjoyed a flight of light ales and their locally famous nachos, which did not disappoint.

Cannery Brewing has a dog-friendly outdoor backyard that is open to families. Food trucks are present on weekends, or you can order delicious features from the Cannery Shack in the Cannery's Backyard. It's a



welcoming spot for the whole family.

On my first evening, I headed north on Naramata Road to Hillside Winery & Bistro for dinner. This winding road is situated on the east side of Okanagan Lake. With my Porsche top down, I passed by numerous orchards and vineyards, enjoying views of the lake and the KVR trail, which crosses the road into the mountains.

When you first arrive at Hillside, you encounter a towering structure constructed from wood and stone reminiscent of old-world European architecture.

At the Bistro at Hillside Winery, you are encouraged to relax and slow down, offering a menu of sharing plates with locally sourced ingredients. My guest and I shared the Tacos with duck confit, corn tortilla, garden herbs cherry gastrique, and blueberry labneh with housemade hot sauce, which were very good.

This was followed by the sockeye salmon paired with a 2020 Merlot. As sockeye salmon has a more robust flavour than other species, pairing it with a medium-body, fruit forward Merlot was a new and exciting taste sensation.

The following morning, I started my day by looking for breakfast and stumbled upon Petrasek Bakery on Main Street, which is in a new, larger location that they just moved to in April. It's an artisan European bakery where everything is traditionally handcrafted and made from scratch.

A local informed me that Silvia and Jan Petrasek are famous for their chocolate croissants and fruit tarts. Therefore, I indulged in a delightful peach tart while relaxing on the front patio, observing the town slowly spring to life.

With the sun out and the top down in my Porsche,

It was a leisurely 24 km drive, taking me about 30 minutes since I had the road almost entirely to myself. Much of the road surface is nearly level with the lake, providing an impressive view of the calm water and the hills on the opposite side, making it an unadulterated driving pleasure.

My lunch destination was Liquidity Wines, located south of Okanagan Falls, nested on a hillside overlooking Vaseux Lake and n<sup>°</sup>aylintn (McIntyre Bluff). Upon arriving in the parking lot, I discovered two Porsche EV chargers, a rarity these days.

Upon entering the winery, we were offered a complimentary tasting of their 2022 Estate Viognier.

At the Restaurant at Liquidity Wines, Chef Josh Mueller creates a seasonal, three-course lunch menu centred around wine, allowing guests to indulge and savour a symphony of flavours that excite their palates.

Our server, Kellen, gave us a table on the patio overlooking the infinity pond and brought us freshly baked rosemary focaccia, whipped coconut butter, and preserved lemon.

I started with the Smoked Cod on potato and rutabaga, leek emulsion, and lemongrass. It was paired with their 2022 Estate Viognier, fresh, crisp, acidic flavours with herbal notes to complement my fish serving.

A Fraser Valley Chicken entree with coffee lentils, brown butter kale, fire morels, and black apple jus followed. The chicken had a crispy skin wrap with a rich, smoked taste, which was delightful. They paired it with their 2020 Dividend, a Bordeaux-inspired blend with aromas of juicy red strawberry and toasty notes that complimented the chicken dish nicely.

I finished my lunch with Black & Blue: blackberries, blue cheese, and chocolate for dessert, paired with the 2020 Estate Merlot, which is bright, juicy, and complex. You can't go wrong with a fine Merlot with chocolate! Liquidity Wines was one of the highlights of my Penticton adventure. They plan to launch a dinner service starting June 21. Visit their website for further details.

After lunch, we continued south on the Okanagan Highway 97 towards Oliver for a 12 km – 12-minute drive to the District Wine Village, Canada's first and only wine village.

The District Wine Village is located just south of n saylintn (McIntyre Bluff) and has 11 wineries, one brewery, one distillery, and a restaurant. Each tenant is housed in individual buildings with seating areas and the full production wineries produce right on-site. The venue consists of 16 units arranged in a circle facing a central outdoor plaza, which can be used for public seating, hosting music artists, game shows, private weddings, and family events.

After a brief tour, Darcel Giesbrecht, the General Manager, introduced me to their newest winery, Canter Cellars. Canter is a horse's gait with three distinct beats, representing a winery with three founding families. With a shared history with horses, they draw parallels to them as a powerful symbol of tamed beauty—much like the process of history and winemaking in the Okanagan Valley.

My tasting started with a Rose 2023 Cabernet Franc, an outstanding summer patio wine. Bright and attractive, it has pink grapefruit and raspberry aromas and sea minerals. I then tried their Field Blend 2022, an unoaked chardonnay with subtle tropical fruit notes. Both were delightful, and I highly recommend Canter for your next visit to the District Wine Village.

My route back to Penticton would be primarily on two-lane paved country roads on the west side of Vaseux Lake. As I exited the District Wine Village, I turned south onto Highway 97 and travelled about 2 km before turning right onto Seacrest Hill Road, which leads me up into the hills and offers beautiful views of Tuc-el-nuit Lake. Seacrest Hill Road eventually connects to Willowbrook Road, only 4 km—5 minutes. I kept to the right and headed northbound on Willowbrook for 4 km—4 minutes. I turned right onto Green Lake Road, which offers a winding, narrow drive through wooded forest and cattle fields with varying elevations, providing an enjoyable drive.

Along my route, I passed Mahoney Lake, Nighthawk Vineyards, Green Lake, and See Ya Later Ranch, which are lovely wine stops if you have the time. At the end of Green Lake Road, you take a left to head north on Highway 97, which brings you along the opposite side of Skaha Lake, past small town Kaleden, and back into Penticton.

My final evening dining experience was at The Restaurant at Naramata Inn, a 16 km—20-minute drive north of Penticton. They offer a seasonal dinner menu with a sommelier-curated wine pairing. Their restaurant wine list features primarily local wines, but many international wines are available.

I selected Naramata Bella Buddha's Blend Rose sparkling wine to celebrate my two-day visit. It has a candied apple nose with a pale pink hue, tart strawberry-apple and white graphite pith on the palette.

I began with the Cauliflower soup with toasted seeds, brown butter, and green oil. It was thick, creamy, and full of flavour.

Followed by the slow-braised BC Grass-Fed Beef Short Rib for my main course with celeriac potato puree, spring vegetables, and old-fashioned mustard. Each morsel melted my taste buds, so it was well worth the drive.

To finish, I ordered the house-made chocolate dessert with Plot Twist Serrano Ice Cream, Coco Nib Glace, Port Jelly, and Walnut Crumble. The dessert was divine.

During my visit, I stayed at the all-new Four Points by Sheraton Penticton at the Convention Centre, which just opened at the beginning of the year. Aditya Bhardwaj, Operations Manager, welcomed me upon arrival and ensured my check-in was smooth and efficient.

The Four Points hotel caters to business and vacation travellers and is a 20-minute walk to downtown. Throughout my stay, I noticed a substantial presence of staff on duty, underscoring the property's unwavering commitment to exceptional guest service.

A must-do is to visit the Four Points rooftop bar, the Rooftop at Palmer, which offers panoramic views of Okanagan Lake and the giant Penticton sign on Munson Mountain. On the ground floor, Palmer Casual Steakhouse, with its outdoor patio, serves delicious breakfasts, lunches, and dinners next to the lobby. I highly recommend the Banana Bread French toast on the breakfast menu; it was marvellous.

Discover the charms of Penticton, a wonderful town that is the perfect starting point for an unforgettable Porsche travel adventure. It is surrounded by exceptional wineries that offer elevated dining experiences, so you won't be disappointed.

On my last evening, while driving my Porsche from Naramata, I gazed through the front windshield at the vineyards spreading across the lush, rolling landscape of the Penticton wine region. It was tough to say goodbye, but I knew I was soon heading back to the hustle and bustle of big city life, anticipating the congestion on Trans-Canada Highway 1.

For die-cast collectors, there are drawers filled with 1:43 model cars by Brumm, Corgi, Dinky, and German tin toy cars from the 50s and 60s by Schuco, Maerklin, and Distler, very many in their original packaging.

His passion for collectibles was ignited by Winchester rifles, a fascination sparked by watching American Western movies in theatres in Solingen, Germany, renowned for its fine sword, knife, scissor, and razor manufacturing. # **Historical trails drive**

Exploring the rich history of British Columbia in our Porsches.

**Our Historical Trails Drive is one of the** most highly anticipated spring tours as it allows club members to experience British Columbia's rich history.

Last March, Gary Walker, an esteemed member of the Porsche Club, led a convoy of 16 Porsches on a three-part journey that commenced at Brownsville Park in Surrey.

This location was significant in 1882, when the first regular crossing of the Fraser River was established here. The "K de K," a steam ferry, transported wagons and passengers from Brownsville (now called Browns Landing), located at the base of Old Yale Road, to New Westminster. As time passed, the area became a popular fishing spot, and with the only sandy beach along



the Fraser River, it is now a popular city park.

From Brownsville, our journey took us to Port Kells, Clayton, and Cloverdale, with our first stop at the Canada-U.S. border.

During the second leg of our expedition, we travelled from Peace Arch Provincial Park to the historical site of Fort Langley, situated on the banks of the Fraser River. This site was established in 1827 by the Hudson's Bay Company as a fur trading post and played a vital role in the British Empire's trade route. Additionally, it was located at the heart of a large population of Indigenous people.

The third route followed the Telegraph Trail, a historic path that stretches from Bedford Landing, Fort Langley, to Abbotsford, where we had lunch at the Trading Post Pub. These unique historical trail adventures began in 2022 with the "In Search for Gold Trek the Old Yale Trail," where Gary turned back the clock to the late 1800s Gold Rush for a three-hour drive. Club members re-enacted the Old Wagon Trail as closely as possible from New Westminster through Surrey, Langley, Abbotsford, Chilliwack, Rosedale, Hope, and Yale. The drive concluded with a visit and lunch at the Yale Historical Society.

Gary Walker, a retired elementary geography and history teacher and school administrator who taught in Chilliwack and Langley for 30 years, has hosted our Historical Trail Tour for three years. With a passion for history, Gary believes that exploring our region's past is one of the best ways to enjoy driving a Porsche today.

# Hard-to-find parts

If you work on your Porsche. chances are you have had to track down parts or find hard-to-find parts. Especially if you have a classic model. The benefit we have as Porsche owners is that 80% of the cars ever produced are still on the road! This is a good thing as it motivates Porsche and other suppliers to maintain ways to service these vehicles. If you have a Porsche, even an old Porsche, you would be surprised at how many parts Porsche still manufactures for all their models and eras.

I experienced this process five years ago when I bought my 1984 944 as a non-running car. In one month, I had it running and driving, but I was aware this car was going to need a lot.

My first indications were components all surrounding the engine. I quickly concluded that this work would be a lot easier with the engine out of the car. So that is what I did. I removed the engine over a winter in my garage.

During this process, I ended up with more than I had bargained for. The old saying, "While you're in there!". I knew which parts were required, so I was able to search for them ahead of time. But there were many unexpected things needed. Also, things are needed due to my inexperience in breaking them! I badly damaged a mounting collar on the camshaft by having to drill out a stripped Cam Shaft Bolt. This was my first big hurdle! As well as many other odd parts. I ended up locating the only brand-new OEM one in the United States. Luckily, it was at a Porsche dealership in Seattle. With my own experience and during my 4-year tenure as Tech Chair, I have learned and helped members locate these hard-to-find parts. Here is the process I use:

#### Part Numbers

First, you must have the part number. This is the only way to ensure the correct



part for your vehicle. Many manufacturers, not only Porsche, stamp the part number on just about every part of your car. So, if you have removed the part, there is a good chance the part number is there. It may take some cleaning to find it and be able to read it.

#### **Reference Material**

Have a resource of reference for your vehicle. This will help you find those needed part numbers. Good references are, of course, the internet (be careful what you read. There are a lot of know-it-alls who are complete hacks!). Workshop manuals are available, which you can often download from the internet. Catalogues available from Porsche and sites like Pelican Parts for your car. Fair warning: these can be expensive to purchase. There is a publication called Bentley Publishers, which publishes a full breakdown of many manufacturers and models, including Porsche Models. Again, these can be expensive.

One of the most useful references I have used for my car comes from a site called autoatlanta.com. It is an invaluable source for locating part numbers and diagrams of just about any area or component of your car. They have most Porsche models and eras on their site, and it's Free! Log onto the website and click on Parts and Accessories. Select your car from the tabs and click on the tab which says "Hard to Find Parts." A list of diagrams for your entire car will come up, complete with part numbers! I have my car from this site bookmarked on my phone. I cannot express how much time this site has saved me! It is my go-to!

#### Locating the actual Part

Once you have the part number, you must find the part. There are tons of aftermarket parts out there, and they may be fine with you. I have used them for certain things and never had an issue. The OEM part may not be available depending on your car and model, but many are. If you are an OEM perfectionist, your first call is to your local Porsche dealership parts department.

For a classic car, they will have to order it and may take a few days. If it must come from Germany, it will take six weeks or more. The benefit of using Porsche is that they cover the shipping costs and don't pass them on to you. We also have our Club Sponsors. Parts are a big part of their business, and they often have access to

suppliers we may not know of. Here is a list of our club Sponsors who can help you locate parts and the ever-so-important part number:

- Juan's Auto
- Turn3 Autosport
- Scan Automotive
- Weissach Vancouver

Otherwise, here is a list of websites I use and are helpful:

- Auto Atlanta (they also sell parts)
- Pelican parts
- Rock Auto
- eBay motors
- 944 Online (an amazing resource for 944 owners!)
- LA Dismantler in Los Angeles a great source of used parts

And, of course, Google! Often, if I can't find the part, I just put the part number into Google by itself, and some options may come up. This method can be useful, but not always. This is, in fact, how I found the above-mentioned Cam Shaft Collar! Be aware of similar parts for similar models. Often, the part number can have one digit off for a similar model. This is a problem I often run into with my early model 944. The 944 has early models, late models, and Turbos. Some of the parts are interchangeable, and some are not. I have ordered a turbo part many times, when rushing and not paying attention.

#### Used Parts

I have used parts in my car for certain things to save time and money. Used parts can be very useful. Just be mindful of the condition and what the part does. My rule on this is if it is a load-bearing part, contains fluids, or is subject to extreme heat. I source out a brand-new part.

YouTube

YouTube is a great source of seeing what is involved on how to locate, remove,

and re-install the part. As well as giving you a good visual of what the part should look like. Again, be aware of hacks, and guys saying, "I didn't want to buy the Porsche part, so this should do!". Move on to another video or resource!

If you have worked on your car, you are probably well-versed in finding parts. If you are new to our club or Porsche, I hope this information is helpful! As always, I am available to answer questions. If you need a hand looking for something, I may be able to point you in the right direction. Don't hesitate to reach out!

# Wins at Lemans are a win for Porsche's production models

Much of what Porsche learns in motor racing benefits the production models and, thus, the customers. The sports car manufacturer's story is full of notable examples clearly illustrated with turbo technology and the 24 Hours of Le Mans through to the new 911 Carrera GTS T-Hybrid. The latest 911 model variant reaps the benefits of the insights that Porsche gained with the 919 Hybrid and currently with the 963.

Innovation and motor racing go handin-hand at Porsche. The development of sophisticated 919 Hybrid won the 24 Hours of Le Mans three times and swept the title pool in the FIA World Endurance Championship WEC. Porsche now targets its 20th overall victory in the world's most famous endurance race with the 963-hybrid prototype. Know-how transfer from the racetrack to the road.

#### The beginning of Porsche's turbo technology

It was the summer of 1970. Porsche had won the 24 Hours of Le Mans for the

The problem, however, was that the constant braking and acceleration on the twisty CanAm tracks required a high-revving turbocharger with as little lag as possible. The innovative solution: a boost pressure control system on the exhaust side prevented unwanted excess pressure in partial load or overrun operation by expelling excess exhaust gases via a bypass relief valve and a wastegate. This limited the boost pressure and kept it at a constant level. It also allowed for a

turbo technology is a prime example. In 1974, exactly 50 years ago, the 911 Turbo, Porsche's first turbocharged series model, celebrated its world debut. Producing 260 PS, it was brutishly powerful for its time. The roots of its cutting-edge engine lay in racing: Supercharging technology was used for the first time in the Porsche 917/10. Today, the system output of the latest

911 variant reaches 398 kW (541 PS, 911 Carrera GTS (provisional values): Fuel consumption\* combined (WLTP) 11.0 – 10.5 l/100 km, CO emissions\* combined (WLTP) 251 – 239 g/km, CO2 class G).

The 911 Carrera GTS is also powered by a turbo engine but combines it for the first time with a T-hybrid system. The engineers once again benefit from the knowledge Porsche has collected in motorsports: from 2015 to 2017, the technologically first time with the 917 KH and was looking for its next challenge: victories in the North American CanAm series. However, with its comparatively small 580 PS 4.5litre twelve-cylinder engine, the 917 faced tough competition from the big-block American cars. Plans for a 16-cylinder power plant were drawn up. At the same time, the idea of achieving the needed performance boost from an exhaust turbocharger was also evolving. stage was set, and the CanAm success was monumental: in 1972, Porsche's partner team Penske Enterprises won six of the nine races, the CanAm Cup, and the drivers' title thanks to George Follmer. In 1973, the 5.4-litre 917/30 Spyder put out a staggering 1,100 PS. Only changes to the regulations could stop Porsche's winning streak—but they did not halt the march of turbo technology, especially in motorsport.

smaller turbocharger, lower rotating masses and improved responsiveness.

In late July 1971, an open 917/10 Spyder with a supercharged engine turned its first laps in Weissach: Instead of a large turbocharger, Porsche opted for a smaller turbo on each of the two-cylinder banks. This improved the responsiveness enormously and produced 850 PS. The

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
