Featured Guest Speaker: Rev. James Bhagwan

Born and raised in Fiji and an ordained minister of the Methodist Church in Fiji, Rev. James Shri Bhagwan is in his second term as **General Secretary of the Pacific Conference of Churches**, the Oceania region's peak ecumenical organization with 35 member denominations and 11 national Councils of churches from 19 Pacific Island Countries and territories, including Aotearoa New Zealand and the land now called Australia. A practicing ecumenist, Rev. James is also licensed to preach and celebrate the Sacraments in the Anglican Diocese of Polynesia. He holds a Bachelor of Divinity in Ecumenical Studies (with Honors) from the Pacific Theological College, a Master of Theology in Christian Social Ethics from the Methodist Theological University in Seoul, South Korea and hopes to eventually finish his PhD, when he can make time.

A great-grandson of laborers brought to Fiji under the British modern slavery programme known as the Indenture System, social and ecological justice are key areas of Rev. James' Christian Activism. An avid stand-up paddler and volunteer crew member, chaplain, and trustee of the Fijian Traditional Voyaging canoe, the Uto Ni Yalo - he is heavily involved in coastal and ocean/marine protection. He has previously served in the Methodist Church as Fiji's Secretary for Communication and Overseas Mission, as well as acting General Secretary of the Fiji Council of Churches.

Rev. James is also involved in gender justice work, climate justice and development issues.




SPECIAL GUEST: Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson, UCC President

The Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. Thompson is the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ. Rev. Thompson is the first woman and first woman of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination.

Prior to this call, Rev. Thompson served in the national setting of the United Church of Christ for 14 years – two years as Minister for Racial Justice, eight years as Minister for Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations and four years as the Associate General Minister for Wider Church Ministries and Co-Executive for Global Ministries. She was elected as AGM in 2019. Her passion for justice and equity moved her work on behalf of the UCC into a global context, affording the opportunity to participate globally in efforts to reduce the marginalization experienced by African descendant peoples and other communities globally.

Before joining the national staff, Rev. Thompson served in the Florida Conference United Church of Christ as a Pastor and on the Conference staff as the Minister for Disaster Response and Recovery. She also worked in the nonprofit arena for over 10 years in senior leadership positions.

Rev. Thompson earned a Bachelor of Arts from Brooklyn College in New York, a Master's in Public Administration from North Carolina Central University in Durham, NC, and a Masters of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary in New York. She also studied Public Policy at Duke University and earned her Doctorate in Ministry at Seattle University. She was awarded an honorary doctorate from Heidelberg University.



OPENING PROTOCOLS AND LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Please remember to bring a small vial/bottle of water from your region as we will pour together into a large bowl representing "Wai Ola I Ka Wai" and also to acknowledge the lands from which you are presently living.

The United States seized more than 1.5 billion acres from Indigenous people since 1776, but today, most of that land is held in trust by the government, severely <u>restricting the rights</u> of Native American people. Recognizing the original inhabitants of the spaces we occupy through awareness-building and land acknowledgment practices is only a first step toward equity, but it is an important one.

A new <u>SMS bot</u> developed by <u>Code for Anchorage</u> with information provided by the Canadian nonprofit <u>Native Land</u> encourages land acknowledgment by making it easier for those in the US to learn which Indigenous territories they're standing on. Just text your zip code or your city and state (separated by a comma) to **(907) 312-5085** and the bot will respond with the names of the Native lands that correspond to that region. (The service currently only works for US residents, but may be available for other countries in the future.)

A Note on Water Bottles

The event organizers are requesting attendees to bring their own water bottles for refillable drinks to promote sustainability and trash and plastic waste. The theme of the event is OLA I KA WAI "water is life."

WORKSHOPS (All Tentative)

At the upcoming conference, we are excited to introduce a new and innovative approach to workshops - the "flip workshop". This approach involves a video component that all participants will view prior to attending the workshop. Traditionally, workshops have consisted of 75% lecture presentations and only 25% group discussion time. However, we have decided to flip this ratio on its head. With the flip workshop approach, only 25% of the lecture will be presented live, with the majority of it already recorded on video and transcribed with accompanying materials. This means that we can dedicate a whopping 75% of the workshop time to open discussion and group interaction. We believe that this approach will lead to a more engaging and collaborative learning experience for all participants, and we can't wait to see the results!

GENKI BALLS

During the upcoming PAAM Convocation, attendees will have the opportunity to learn about the crucial role that water plays in the Hawaiian ecosystem. Specifically, we will explore how water flows from the mountains down to the sea, passing directly beneath the Church of the Crossroads and continuing on towards Waikiki. Unfortunately, this natural process has been disrupted by human activity, as the manmade "Ala Wai" Canal has become heavily polluted over the years due to the use of toxic pesticides, fertilizers, and sludge. In an effort to combat this issue, PAAM has joined forces with the Ala Wai Genki Ball project. This initiative involves throwing special rice-soil balls containing EM good bacteria into the polluted waters, which then work to consume and eliminate the harmful sludge and toxins. The culmination of this project will take place on Saturday, June 22nd at 8:15AM, when we will all come

together for a big throw prior to the close of the PAAM Convocation. By participating in this important effort, we can help to protect and preserve Hawaii's precious natural resources for generations to come.

Each of the active regions of PAAM UCC has been given grants specifically for the convocation. Please contact your regional moderator.


