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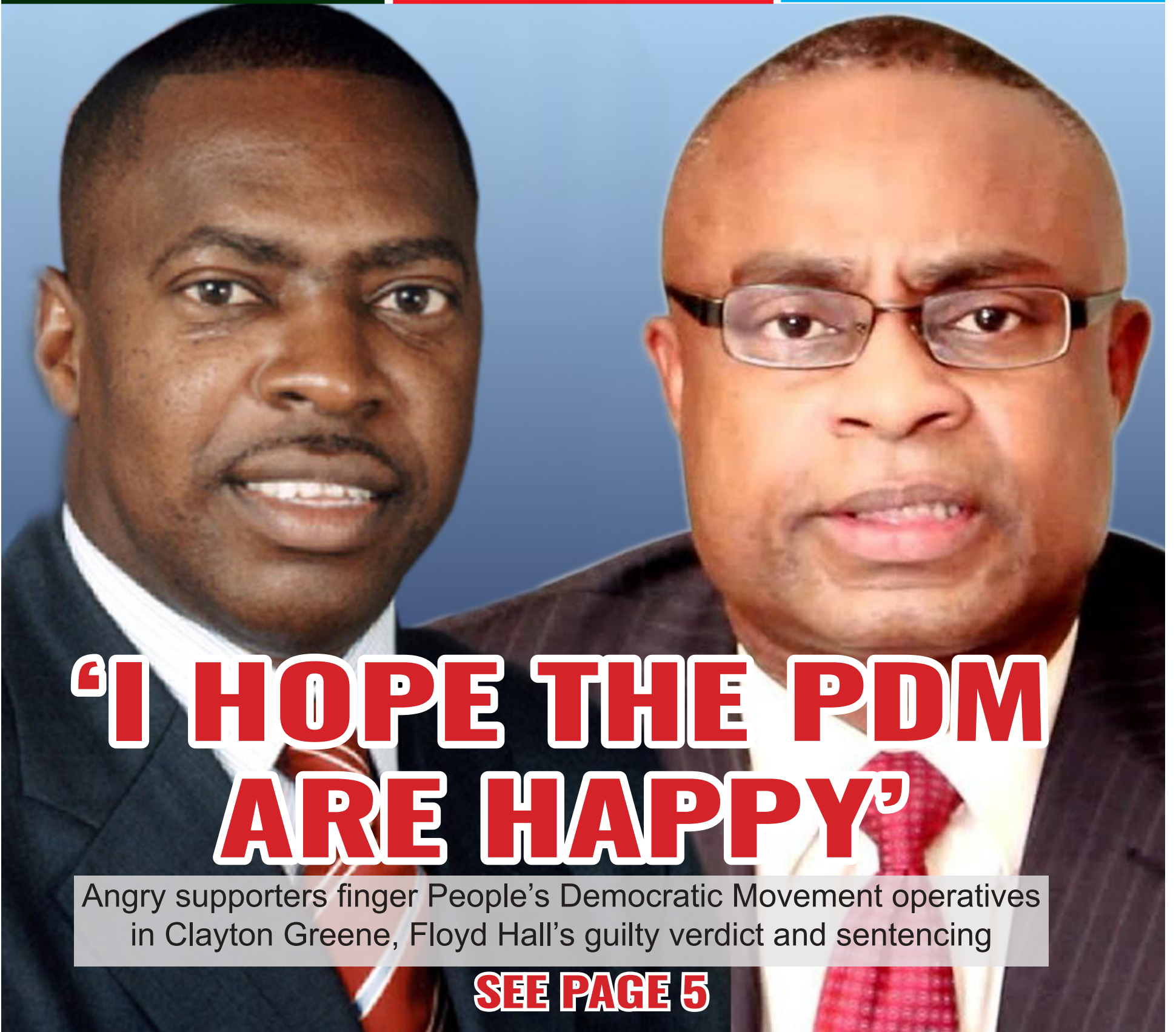

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Finger-losing American Tourist sues local watersports company



A New York Tourist, who lost one of his fingers after his hand came into contact with a sharp implement from an eFoil ride, is suing.

Assegide Mark Getachew, a New York attorney, who was accompanied by his family on the vacation, claimed that SURF TCI Ltd. trading as FLY TCI gave no warning that the apparatus was potentially dangerous.

The plaintiff, who is represented by George C. Missick of Geordin's Attorneys at Law, claim alleges that the accident and his injuries are due to FlyTCI's negligence. Getachew contends that the company failed in its duty to provide crucial warnings and training on the proper use of the surfboard, leaving him and his family exposed to unforeseen dangers.

When contacted, FLY TCI, represented by Conrad Griffith of Griffith and Partners, was initially apprehensive about answering some questions surrounding Getachew's case. However, upon revealing that we were in receipt of the legal claim and that the court document was in the public domain, they responded but declined to give any further comment. "We are aware of and handling any historic events that have occurred within our business thoroughly and efficiently. We follow diligent, and thorough practices as a business and all matters go through the proper legal and insurance channels if and when needed."

Court papers, obtained firsthand, peel back the layers of this case. Details from these documents reveal that on Tuesday, March 21, 2023, Getachew, along with his two children and two additional minors between ages 9 and 15 years, arrived at one of FLY TCI's

operation locations adjacent to Grace Bay Club for a pre-booked e-foil surfboarding session.

The claim states "The Defendant through its agents fitted the plaintiff and the four children with helmets, life vests, and water shoes before giving a short 10 to 15 minute briefing focused on how to operate the e-foil, with the only safety instruction being a benign reference that they should try to fall to the left, right, or rear of the board, but not the front, to avoid being hit by the board.

"At no time was the plaintiff or any of the children warned as to the nature of the risk or potential serious harm, including the real likelihood of a traumatic bodily amputation, such as that suffered by the plaintiff."

Following the briefing, the plaintiff and the accompanying four children, each equipped with a board, entered the water to commence their e-foil experience. Meanwhile, two of the defendant's employees also took to the water with their own boards to provide intermittent assistance.

However, shortly into the session things took an unfortunate turn as the plaintiff fell off the board. That fall resulted in his right hand being struck by the e-foil blades, which led to the amputation of the top digit of his middle finger on that same hand.

Getachew is now speaking out for the first time since the incident. He said, "Had FLY TCI informed us of the extremely sharp exposed parts of the e-foil and the risk of serious injury, including the loss of body parts by one or more prior FLY TCI customers,

I would have never used it and certainly wouldn't have let the children I was with do so."

As per the court documents, the plaintiff attributes his accident to the negligence of the defendant, among other factors. The particulars of such negligence claim include:

- failure to ensure the safety of the plaintiff while he was using the e-foil;
- failure to warn the plaintiff of similar accidents that had occurred involving electric hydrofoil surfboards and the potential risk of individuals suffering serious injuries, including traumatic bodily amputations;
- failure to warn the plaintiff of the inherent dangers involved in using electric hydrofoil surfboards, including the risk of injury from the propellers and the hydrofoil blades; and
- failure to provide proper training on the use of the electric hydrofoil surfboard to the Plaintiff; and failure to remedy any danger.

The Complex World of eFoil

Research shows that there is a steep learning curve when mastering eFoil. This particular type of equipment, in the simplest of terms, is a motorized board with a mast, and wing- all built of full carbon fiber for maximum durability. Housed inside the board are electronics and a computer with another waterproof casing. There is a space reserved for its battery and charge which plugs into a regular wall outlet.

Meanwhile, the controller of the eFoil wraps around the hand and comes with a trigger for only the motor speed. All other movements like turning and getting lifted are controlled by the body and feet. Most eFoil can reach cruising speeds 25-30 km/h.

The concept of an eFoil has been a controversial debate worldwide for decades. The earliest record of the science behind today's eFoil models dates back to the 1800's. By the early 1900's Alexander Graham Bell managed to successfully create a more efficient model which later evolved into a tool for military use.

Today, eFoil is marketed as safe and fun for the whole family. However, incidents like Getachew's seem to suggest otherwise. For example, two years ago, an Hawaii family sued a company called WeFoil after their 10-year-old son, a winner of the NSSA West Coast Regional Championships, fell off the equipment, leading to the severance of his thumb by the propeller. Some manufactures of e-foils have recommended that users should be at least 16 years old.

Experts on efoiling.com say in the world of watersports, injuries are inevitable and those involving eFoil are no exception. They also reveal that eFoil in shallow water or near the coast elevates the danger.

Sapodilla Bay Beach and Long Bay Beach, are listed as some of the locations for customers to explore.

The Varied World of eFoil Legislation

Amidst all the controversies, Canada stands out as one of the few countries globally that currently prohibits eFoil boards. Any propeller-driven surfboard-type vessels are illegal under Canadian laws and violators face a pricey fine. In Switzerland, eFoil are also banned. Conversely, countries like the United States, Austria, Germany, The Netherlands, France, and Italy have legislation in place to regulate motorized boards.

Most operators, whether it be for personal or rentals, are required to register their eFoil. Some jurisdictions additionally mandate a serial number to be placed on the eFoil and for them to be operated in low-density areas for the safety of other individuals who may be swimming to partaking in other watersports activities.

'I Hope The PDM Are Happy'

It was all teary eyes in the Supreme Court Annex along the Leeward Highway in Providenciales late Thursday morning after Chief Justice Mabel Agymang pronounced a one-year sentence on former deputy premier and minister of finance Floyd Hall and a six-month sentence for former speaker of the House of Assembly Clayton Greene.

A plea by the defense to have the sentences suspended fell on deaf ears, as the judge declared she would have none of it. About half hour after the judgement was handed down, the two were whisked away in a marked police vehicle to the station for processing and to return in the early afternoon for the confiscation judgment.

Hall was sentenced after he was found guilty of bribery, while Greene was sentenced on money laundering charges. Both were found guilty a few weeks prior, by the said judge.

The lawyers for both men filed an appeal into the matter, and for their release, pending the appeal. However, Greene was able to secure his release, but Hall was taken into custody, and at press time, he was not released.

The judge, in her judgement stated that she took into consideration the length of time the case had been going on and the number of character reference letters penned on their behalf.

A confiscation session was held late in the day, where the judge ordered that a little under one million dollars was to be taken from Hall, and \$330,000 from Greene.

Director of Public Prosecution Hon. Eugene

Otuonye weighed in on the matter, bringing clarification:

"Following the conviction of Mr Floyd Hall, former Deputy Premier of the Turks & Caicos Islands, the Chief Justice sentenced him to twelve (12) months' imprisonment.

"The sentence was substantially reduced because of the delays that the proceedings have suffered. The Court also imposed a confiscation order in the sum of \$943,295.00 against Floyd Hall to reflect his benefit from the crime of Bribery of which he was convicted. Mr Hall is to pay that sum within 21 days of the conclusion of any appeal that he may bring and provided the confiscation order survives an appeal.

"Mr Hall will serve six (6) years' imprisonment, if he fails to pay the sum of the confiscation order when it falls due. Bail pending appeal was not considered until Mr Hall makes the appropriate application in that regard.

"Mr Clayton Greene, an Attorney with the firm of Clayton Greene Associates, was convicted by the Hon Chief Justice of money laundering, being monies, he received on behalf of Mr Floyd Hall, some of which he placed into a specially formed client account having also opened a ledger for Mr Hall in a disguised name.

"Similarly, taking into account the delays the proceedings have suffered, the Hon Chief Justice sentenced Mr Clayton Greene to a substantially reduced term of six (6) months' imprisonment. The Court also imposed a confiscation order in the sum of \$330,021.00 against Clayton Greene to reflect his benefit from the crime of money laundering of which he was convicted.

"Mr Greene is to pay that sum within 3 months of the conclusion of any appeal that he may bring, provided the confiscation order survives an appeal. Mr Greene will serve five (5) years' imprisonment, if fails to pay the sum of the confiscation order when it falls due.

"Meanwhile, the Court granted Mr Greene bail pending resolution of an appeal which he indicated he will be launching."

Family members and friends went to the courthouse to support the men. Some of the men's supporters – both men and women – could be seen wiping tears and heard sniffing loudly. Some even went as far as to mention that the trial against the men were politically motivated and fabricated.

One of the individuals in the court room could be heard saying, "I hope the PDM (Peoples Democratic Movement) is happy." He continued, "It was the PDM, who started this @\$%&*, running to the British for them to overthrow a democratically elected government.

"If you did not like what they were doing, then you should vote them out the next election cycle. You should have done what was done to Dr. Ewing (former premier Rufus Ewing)...do what was done to Sharlene (former premier Sharlene Cartright Robinson). If you don't like them, just vote them out at the next election cycle...don't run to Britain for them to solve our problems, when we can solve it for ourselves."

The Progressive National Party, led by ex-premier Michael Misick, was tilted from office a little over a year in his second term in 2008, by the British Government, and a commission of Inquiry ensued, which, at its conclusion, recommended that Misick and many others, including his deputy Hall, Greene – who was speaker of the House at the time, Lillian Boyce, who was education minister, Jeffrey Hall, who was minister of Immigration, and McAllister Hanchell, a former minister of natural resources.

Boyce, who later pleaded guilty to misconduct in public office, agreed to a financial settlement. Also, her plea erased the original charges, which included: defrauding the government and/or Belongers, conspiracy to defraud the government, conspiracy to defraud the PNP (Progressive National Party), conspiracy to disguise the proceeds of crime, acquiring \$1 million knowing or suspecting it to be proceeds of criminal conduct in an arrangement to defraud the government and facilitating Michael Misick in criminal conduct.

However, during Thursday's judgment, Justice Agymang declared that the Boyce deal should never have been made, dismissing it as a mistake no less than three times, stating that it could not be used in consideration for her ruling against Greene and Hall.

The Boyce deal was made by Justice Paul Harrison, who has since been deceased, paving the way for Agymang to take over the case.

After Harrison's death, application was made for the case against all the defendants to end, but the authorities ruled otherwise.

Terrorism by any standard

There will be several perspectives, analyses, and conclusions about Hamas's attack on Israel.

Many will be hard-pressed not to include the Palestinian cause as the *raison d'être* for Hamas's actions. Others will blame Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's long-held animosity and policies, his history of suppression and denial of the rights of the Palestinians, and more recent actions against West Bank Palestinians for Hamas's attacks against Israel. Yet others will blame Iran, a well-known State sponsor of terrorism and Hamas's benefactor, for launching a proxy war against Israel. There may be some truths in these arguments. But there is no justification for acts of international terrorism, and that's what this is.

At the end of the day, no one can plausibly refute the fact that Hamas's attacks against Israel are acts of terrorism. For that, if for no other reason, the entire international community must condemn the attacks. At the same time, we should not take our eyes off the root causes of terrorism and the conditions in the region which give rise to this constant threat. Primary among the reasons is the lack of a peaceful settlement of the age-old conflict between the State of Israel and the Palestinian people. Nothing short of a two-State solution — with Israel and a Palestinian State living side by side under conditions which guarantee security for both — will suffice.

Almost three decades ago, the international community took the unprecedented decision to reject the so-called political exception to acts which would otherwise be characterised as terrorism. The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) in its December 1994 Declaration on Measures to Eliminate International Terrorism (1994 Declaration) set a new precedent for how the international community, all states, should treat acts of terrorism. The UNGA's consensus rejected the then often-used and abused political exception to international cooperation against acts of terrorism.

The 1994 Declaration unequivocally "condemned all acts, methods, and practices of terrorism as criminal and unjustifiable, wherever and by whomever committed", and, most importantly, that "criminal acts intended or calculated to provoke a state of terror in the general public, a group of persons, or particular persons for political purposes are in any circumstance unjustifiable, whatever the considerations of a political, philosophical, ideological, racial, ethnic, religious, or any other nature that may be invoked to justify them".

This formulation rejecting the political exception has been adopted and reiterated by the UN Security Council in its pre-9/11 resolution 1269 (1999) and post-9/11 resolutions 1368 (2001), 1373 (2001), 1377 (2001), and several subsequent resolutions. I worked on some of these resolutions while serving on the UN Security Council, with resolution 1377 being adopted under Jamaica's presidency of the council, convened at the foreign ministers' level, with Jamaica's then Foreign Minister K D Knight presiding. It was generally accepted that the political exception no longer had resonance.

There are certain undeniable facts about Hamas's attacks on Israel. Hamas crossed an international border to wantonly kill Israeli civilians on Israeli territory. This was not an attack against the Israeli military. In the process, citizens of other countries, including the United States, were also killed. Women, children, and the elderly were indiscriminately killed in the attacks. This was an attack that was intended to instil fear in the Israeli population and destroy their way of life.

There were reports, of which I have no means of verification, that women were raped in the process. This attack targeted and destroyed civilian properties. Hamas took civilians as hostages, including women, children, and the elderly and took them by force across Israel's border into Gaza to be used as human shields against possible Israeli military response.

By international and moral standards, much of what Hamas did, and perhaps yet to do, are crimes against humanity. Some of these egregious acts may be characterised as war crimes and subject to the jurisdiction of the International Criminal Court. In the meantime, these acts are acts of international terrorism which should be universally condemned and prosecutable in any country which obtains future jurisdiction over any Hamas leader deemed culpable for the planning and execution of these attacks.

It has been common knowledge for decades that Hamas receives a great deal of support from Iran. According to reports, over the decades of Hamas's existence, the designated terrorist group has been funded, supplied with arms, and trained by Iran's Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC).

Hamas's arsenal of rockets, which rained terror on Israeli civilians, were supplied by Iran. No independent verification is needed. These rockets cannot be classified as intended for defence of Palestinian territory, whether Gaza

or the West Bank. And they were not used in the past for deterrence. These rockets are offensive weapons, to be used for one purpose only — attacking Israel.

Because of Hamas's dependence on Iran, speculations have been sparked that Hamas would not have taken such bold, unprecedented actions, invasion of Israel, without the acquiescence of Iran.

For a very long time, while Israel has been surrounded by enemies of the State of Israel, partially due to the unsettled Palestinian question, Netanyahu has been seen by many, inside and outside of Israel, as Israel's enemy from within. Yet Netanyahu, despite being indicted on several criminal charges in Israel, continues to use the perpetual fear of the Israeli people and his hard line defence policies to coalesce with Israeli hardliners to hold on to power.

The attacks by Hamas have destroyed the facade Netanyahu has built about his uniqueness to protect the Israeli people. When the dust is settled, and the Israeli people have had time to investigate Netanyahu's failure, he may finally meet his Waterloo. In the meantime, the Israeli people, as they always have under difficult circumstances, will come together and respond to Hamas's atrocities. There will be many more casualties on both sides. Most will be innocent civilians. The Israeli hostages taken by Hamas will be on the front line and may be among the first to die. The cost of peace is not war. This attack by Hamas, rather than advancing the Palestinian cause, as some are speculating may be the outcome, will have the opposite effect. The Palestinian cause will be set back yet again.

The international community will continue to go in circles on this issue. One country, the United States, has the power and influence to move this issue to an acceptable conclusion. But domestic politics stands in the way, and there is no political will now or in the foreseeable future to change these dynamics.

Turks and Caicos Islands Continues To Enjoy Bumper Growth In 2023

Visitor arrivals to the Turks and Caicos Islands continue to grow immensely in 2023, records show.

Addressing international and local journalists at a media briefing on Monday, October 9, at the Caribbean Tourism Organisation's (CTO) State of Tourism Industry Conference (SOTIC), Minister of Tourism, the Hon Josephine Connolly said arrival numbers have matched pre-pandemic

levels in 2022 and are on track to do the same this year with both cruise passenger and airline arrivals.

The islands welcomed 321,423 arrivals via air from January to June 2023 with the United States market leading with 291,070 arrivals. There were 28,709 arrivals from Canada, 4,437 from the United Kingdom and 27,207 from the Caribbean and other territories.

Though there was a 13.37% decline in arrivals from 2019 (502,000) to 2021 (434,863), the Turks and Caicos Islands rebounded in 2022 with 621,913 arrivals, a 43% increase over 2021.

In cruise arrivals, the Turks and Caicos Islands welcomed 491,806 visitors from January to June 2023. This is a 51.72% increase over the same period in 2022 which saw 324,161 arrivals.

The total arrivals in 2022 were 734,448 compared to 26,573 in 2021. There were 1.1 million arrivals in 2019 with 532,173 arrivals from January to June that year.

Airlift was boosted with non-stop service from major gateways in the US (Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Houston, Miami and Fort Lauderdale, New York, New Jersey, Dulles), Canada (Toronto and Montreal), the Caribbean (The Bahamas, Cuba, Dominica Rep, Haiti and Jamaica) and the United Kingdom (London Heathrow).

Minister Connolly announced that on November 4, 2023, Virgin Atlantic will commence their Inaugural Service, to Providenciales from London Heathrow.

As she looked forward to a successful year for the tourism industry which comprises over 85% of the country's GDP, Minister Connolly said the new marketing and product development strategy goes beyond Providenciales, to build awareness about all the islands, the people, each island's unique natural assets, distinct natural beauty and charm.

She said the creation of Experience Turks and Caicos is to promote all of the islands and the development of tours and attractions to assist islanders to benefit from tourism through culture/heritage tours, local culinary offers and adventure tours, land and water-based activities.

Before the beginning of SOTIC, the media were given tours to Middle and North Caicos where they explored Mudjin and Bambarra beaches, got a taste of Turks and Caicos cuisine at Miss B's and sampled cane juice and homemade jams at Isaac Farms.

The media, representing publications such as Travel + Leisure, Condé Nast Traveler, Travel Pulse, Insider Report, Travel Press, Travel Courier, Travel Influencer, and Travel Noire, will experience tours to Salt Cay, Grand Turk and South Caicos during the course of the week.

They will also enjoy street food delights, custom-themed drinks, and live entertainment by Provision Band at the popular Thursday night Fish Fry.

Man Charged With Assaulting Police Officer

A 48-year-old man is expected to appear before a South Caicos Magistrate on charges of assaulting a police officer and resisting arrest.

The accused, DAVID CLYDE WILLIAMS, of South Caicos, was charged on October 07th, 2023. The charges against Mr. Williams followed an incident that occurred around 1:24 p.m. on October 06th, 2023, whilst a police officer was executing a Bench Warrant.

The officer was medically examined and discharged. Mr. Williams is due to appear in Court on October 24th.

Superintendent of Police (Divisions and Community Policing) Dwight Gardiner said the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force view seriously any attack on its officers and is warning the public that it is unlawful to prevent officers from carrying out their duties, and anyone who does so will be charged.

"The incident is regrettable. Any person who harms any Police Officer in the execution of their duty will be dealt with swiftly within the fullest extent of the law. The RT&CIPF will not tolerate individuals who are disrespectful or obstruct officers from executing their duties.

"I wish to extend my sincerest thanks to the officer for remaining professional in the face of the incident."

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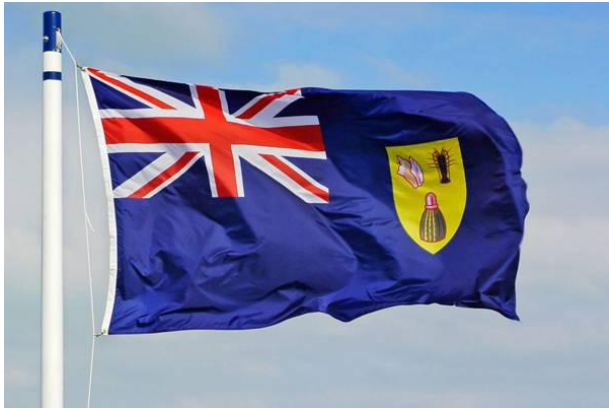

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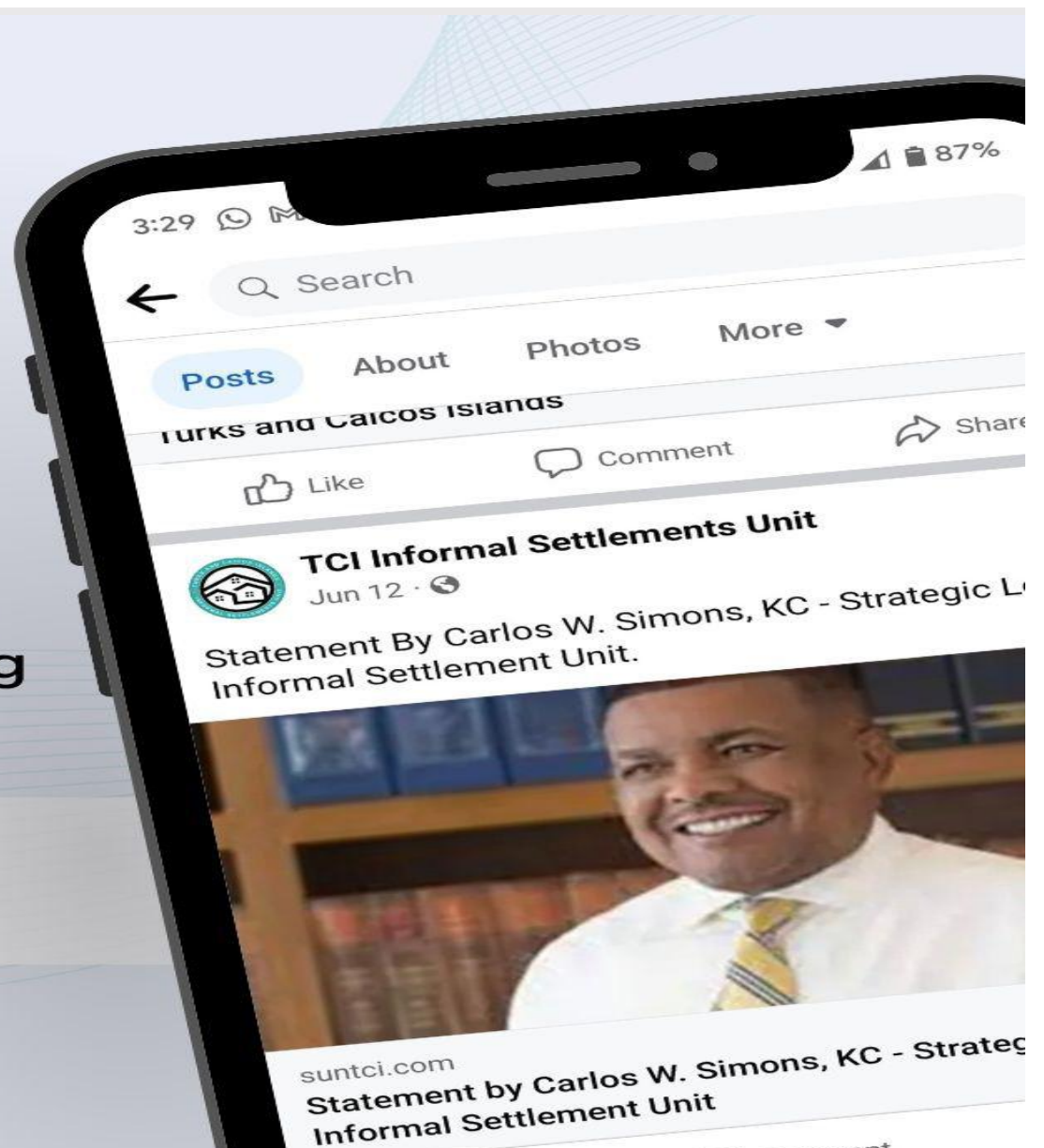

PROVIDENCIALES, TCI OCTOBER 3, 2023: The informal Settlements Unit (ISU) is continuing its progress with informing the public about the importance of their mission as they reach out to the non-English-speaking communities of the Turks and Caicos Islands.

This intercultural communication has started in the Haitian community via the radio waves. The ISU partnered with a figurehead of the Haitian community, Pastor Solomon Morency, owner of Example of Christ: Radio Creole 95.1 FM, to connect with his listeners and inform them of the organization's efforts.

Speaking on the partnership, Justice Carlos Si-

mons, KC, Strategic Lead of the ISU, said, "We are very excited to partner with Pastor Morency to reach the Haitian community with vital information on our work and the services that are available as we continue our commitment in empowering the non-English speaking residents while helping to mitigate the formation of informal settlements." He continued, "Our organization has taken a proactive approach to address this issue head-on and educate all residents through information. We seek to empower individuals by equipping them with crucial knowledge and resources to navigate the challenges associated with informal settle-

ments."

Pastor Morency has already hosted two live radio shows with members of the ISU and its supporting committees, and he is excited to continue his partnership with the organization to help disseminate information in the Haitian community.

Pastor Morency commented, "I am happy to partner with Justice Simons and his team. Through my station, I have been able to communicate and share important information with the Haitian people here in the Turks and Caicos Islands. By coming down to our station and reaching out to the people, in Creole, it shows how important it is to the ISU that everyone is not only made aware of the situation, but also how to protect themselves against misinformation regarding planning permissions when building their homes or any illegal land deals." Through a translator, Justice Simons, along with members of the Crown Land Unit and the Ministry of Physical Planning and Infrastructure Development, discussed the organization's goal to build safer and more sustainable communities in the Turks and Caicos Islands.

"In an increasingly interconnected world, effective communication is paramount to the work of our organization," Justice Simons said, "and we are excited to continue our collaboration with Pastor Morency to keep everyone informed. We hosted a live call-in show last Saturday, September 30th, where members of the community were able to call in with their questions and concerns, which we were able to answer," he said.

The ISU is also actively updating its website to include both Haitian Creole and Spanish translations to accompany the default English text. A translation into Tagalog is also planned as part of their future updates.

Justice Simons added, "We recognize the challenges faced by non-native English speakers in accessing vital services, information, and opportunities. By making content available in their native language, we are striving to create an environment that fosters understanding, inclusivity, and collaboration."

He continued, "This will be an ongoing effort, and our team will be targeting all these communities through various dissemination channels to ensure that the work and mandate of the Informal Settlements Unit are being shared with all residents, whether English is their first language or not."

The Conch Bar Caves are one of the largest cave systems in the Caribbean, they are located on the island of Middle Caicos and house four different species of bats. The cave system is named after the village of Conch Bar nearby. Moreover the cave also boasts the skeletal remains of several extinct animals from birds to tortoise.

The cave system is considered mid-sized on a global scale, and is a live cave system. Conch Bar Caves has many of the common cave features found in caves in other regions, including stalactites, stalagmites and columns, along with pools that fluctuate with the ocean tide.

The cave's recorded history started when guano (bat manure) mining began in the 1880s. Guano was in great demand at the time as a fertilizer, and the guano from Conch Bar Caves was exported from the Turks and Caicos. During these initial diggings, skeletal remains of animals and Lucayan Indian artifacts were found, but unfortunately, these findings weren't preserved. Recent archeological excavations at the nearby Indian Cave site uncovered skeletons of extinct animals, including a giant iguana, a tortoise unique to the Turks and Caicos, and owls, hawks and other birds, so the discoveries in Conch Bar Cave were probably much of the same. Carved and painted names and dates from the guano mining period can still be seen in the cave today.

The system spans more than 1.5 miles of underground caverns.

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POACHER FISHING VESSEL INTERCEPTION



Illegal, Unregulated and Unreported (IUU) fishing is a major threat to TCI fisheries resources undermining national efforts to sustainably use, manage and protect fish stocks and marine ecosystems leading to the loss of both short and long-term social and economic opportunities including food security, livelihoods, exports, and realization of sustainable and inclusive blue

economic growth.

On Wednesday, 4th October, 2023, Officers from the Department of Fisheries and Marine Resource Management, during a mobile patrol in the Great Sand Cay and Endymion Rack areas of the Turks and Caicos Islands (TCI) intercepted a small fishing vessel named "JOHAN-I" with 3

Dominican nationals onboard. The vessel was detained and persons arrested and brought into Grand Turk for processing and await criminal charges.

The Department continues to encourage the public/fishers to report any unusual vessels and to be mindful as to colours associated with illegal fishing vessels.

TCI Approves New Systematic Shutdown Regulation For Disaster Management

In a resolute effort to ensure the protection from loss of life and damage to property, the Turks and Caicos Island Government has approved a new Regulation that will allow a systematic shutdown to be implemented in the event of a hazardous situation such as a tropical storm or hurricane.

The Disaster Management (National Systematic Shutdown) Regulations 2023 are made under section 64(2)(c) of the Disaster Management Ordinance. This new Regulations provide the Government with the legal framework to implement a phased/systematic shutdown of the entire Turks and Caicos Islands or a phased/systematic shutdown of any island that can be impacted by a hazardous event. The Regulations include the following components: National Shutdown Order, Offence and Fixed Penalty, Staggered Approach, Public and Private Sector Shutdown Procedures, Essential Services and the All Clear/Reactivation Procedures.

National Shutdown Order: The National Systematic Shutdown Regulations which comes into operation on October 20th, 2023 will al-

low H.E. the Governor under the guidelines set out in the Regulations to issue a shutdown order requiring the closure of businesses and services and restricting the movement of persons within the Islands. The issuance of the shutdown order would be in effect for every sector of the Island(s). A shutdown order can be issued after the Turks and Caicos Islands has been issued a 'Warning' notification, for example in relation to a tropical storm or hurricane.

Offence: A shutdown order will be issued with a timeline required for enforcement. Individuals and businesses who fail to comply with a shutdown order may be found liable of committing an offence and can be sentenced to a fine of \$10,000 or imprisonment for two years, or to both.

Fixed Penalty

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Officer as the enforcers, can issue a ticket to individuals and businesses found to have been in breach of a shutdown order.

An individual opting to plead guilty can produce the ticket to the Clerk at the Magistrate

Court on or before the date present on the ticket and pay the Fines as follows:

(a) individuals can be charged a fine of \$500.00
(b) Businesses can be charged a fine of \$5,000.00.

Staggered approach: The National Shutdown order can be issued utilising a staggered approach to allow for Private and Public Essential Sectors identified in the Regulations to implement systematic closure of operations for as long as possible towards the enforcement timeline. It is intended that this approach will allow national operations to be smoothly transitioned towards closure.

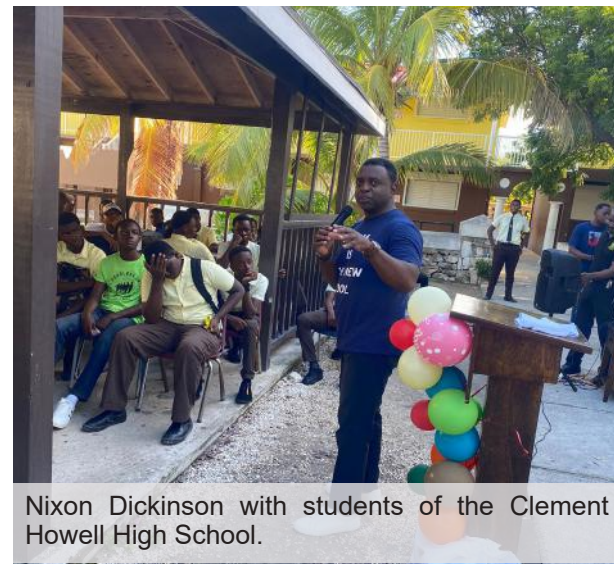
Essential Services: The Regulations identifies essential Services/Agencies for both private and public sector. The general public is encouraged to become familiar with these services/agencies.

All Clear: The Regulations provide the Government with the rights to issue the All Clear for reactivation of the Turks and Caicos Islands. The general public is reminded that residents are required to remain indoors (homes/buildings) until the All Clear is given.

A two-day workshop with male population of the Clement Howell High School and the A Louise Garland Thomas High School targeting anger management took place on October 6 and 7.

The session with the Clement Howell High took place at 9:00am, while the session at the A Louise Garland Thomas High took place at 1:00pm.

The workshop was spearheaded by Nixon Dickinson, Events Coordinator and the Boys Club in partnership with Delvin Rogers, CEO Control Anger Limit Madness (C.A.L.M.), Miami FL, USA.

C.A.L.M's Mission is teaching people to develop anger management skills and techniques that will help channel their anger in a positive and productive manner, its mission is to equip people with different tools and techniques to help manage their unwanted behavior, through an educational curriculum key. Resources are taught and practiced to help individuals work through their negative behavior.

According to Dickinson, an effective anger management curriculum focuses on providing youth with the skills and strategies necessary for recognizing and controlling angry feelings. The curriculum also assists participants in learning ways to manage their emotions and develop alternative behavioral responses, stating that in most cases, youth with behavioral/angry feelings can learn to get them under control by establishing coping skills.

What is Anger Management?

Dickinson stated that anger management is a psycho-therapeutic program for anger prevention and control.

"It has been described as deploying anger success-

fully. Anger is frequently a result of frustration or of feeling blocked or thwarted from something important. The process of learning to recognize signs that you're becoming angry and taking action to calm down and deal with the situation in a productive way," said.

He aid while most people categorize anger as a "negative emotion", it can be positive.

"If left unchecked or of having self- control, angry feelings can lead to aggressive, yelling at someone or damaging property etc. Angry feelings also may cause you to withdraw from the world and turn your anger inward. Anger can lead to aggression, can make one physically strong or a possible fear of the unknown.

"The need for Youth and Anger helps those to recognize frustrations. Allows youth to express their needs and keeps them calm and in control. Persistent negative thinking, frequent arguments, out of control or frightening behavior, irritation, impatience and anxiety are signs of anger.

"Youth can be taught problem solving skills so they can learn to recognize that they can solve problems without resorting to aggression," Dickinson said.

He pointed out that possible management tips include: Thinking before you speak, remain calm and express your anger/frustration in a positive manner, get some exercise, identify possible solutions, don't hold a grudge and use humor as a way to release tension.

He said the group - Black Male Explorers- is designed to be implemented with all students in grades 7th-12th in learning the important aspects of Anger Management.

He said the group will consist of 10 three quarter of an hour sessions on a daily basis starting in June 2024. He said a date of between June 13th and 24th has already been decided, noting that the sessions would be done in a classroom setting.

He said ehe group will consist of 30 to 35 young men, who will engage in a Social, Emotional Learning (SEL) style format.

"They will participate in engagement readings, role playing, worksheets and activities, creative writing and expression," Dickinson said.

He said Session 1, which would be the Introduction session, would deal with:

Self-Control;

-Overview of the purpose and goals of the group; and

-Review group rules/expectations; and

-Icebreaker activity.

Session 2 will deal with Emotional Intelligence, which include:

-The definition of Emotional Intelligence;

-Social Awareness; and

-Self Management.

Session 3 will deal with:

-Coping Skills/Socials Skills;

-How to Cope and be Social-Being aware of triggers

-Using diversions; and

-Knowing your warning signs;

Session 4 and Conflict Resolution, and will tackle:

-The definition of Conflict Resolution;

-Building listening skills (understanding how conflict arises from miscommunication); and

-De-escalation (quality solutions to productive outcomes)

Session will deal with Impulsivity, and include:

-Exercising being CALM

-Changing the way you think (check yourself)-Making smart choices; and

-Improve your communication skills.

Session 6 will deal with Communication over aggressive impulse, and included:

-Hostile communication traits;

-Mood swings; and

-Exasperation (irritated/frustrated).

Session 7 will be about Positive Self-Talk, and will include:

-Being optimistic;

-Good character; and

-Learning to forgive.

Session 8 with deal with the Art of De-Escalation (D.E.F.U.S.E), and will tackle:

-Decision making;

-Ensure safety;

-Form Relationships; and

-Utilize Interests-Set Limits-Enforce/Evaluate.

Session 9 looks at Social Emotional Learning (S.E.L.) and will cover:

-Self Management ;

-Responsible decision-making;

- Social awareness (Empathy);

Session 10-Keeping your cool;

-Maintain composure -Have a peace of mind -Reduce friction; and

-Pick your battles.

Dickinson pointed out that the goal of each session is to help reduce both emotional and physiological arousal that anger causes.

"Regardless of each individuals well-being, it is important to get a full understanding of particular target areas and utilize them to navigate through life You can't get rid of, or avoid, the things or the people that enrage you, nor can you change them, but you can learn to control your reactions," Dickinson said.

6 Waist Exercises That Tighten Your Core

If you're looking for a legit way to strengthen your waist, try this six-movement core waist training exercise routine.

The following series of six exercise movements comprise one set. Repeat the six-movement sequence below three times, resting for one minute between sets.

Benefits of a Stronger Core

In reality, there's no such thing as a quick way to "tighten" your core. And when people think "tighten," they usually mean "strengthen." It takes work, time, and a bit of sweat. Core exercises work when you prevent undue movement along your spine and pelvis as an exercise force is placed on your body—known as engaging your core.

Core-strengthening Exercises

Be patient with yourself as you begin this series. Being consistent with these exercises can help strengthen your core and get you the waist goals you desire.

Side Plank With Twist

Position yourself into a side plank position on your left forearm with your feet either stacked or staggered. Place your right hand behind your head and keep it there while you try to bring your elbow toward the floor. Be sure to tighten your oblique muscles during this motion. Oblique muscles run down the side of your waist and abdomen and connect the ribs to the pelvis. Raise back to starting position. Repeat the movement for 15 repetitions and then switch sides.

Heel Grabber Waist Exercise

Lie on your back, your feet flat on the ground, and your arms by your sides. Crunch up by raising your chest towards the ceiling. Engage your abs. From here, reach—slide—for your right heel with your right hand. Then reach—slide—for your left heel with your left hand. Keep your abs engaged throughout the movements, and avoid leaning up.

Continue alternating right and left side reaches for 15 repetitions per side.

Jack Knife

Lie on your back with your legs straight and your arms over your head. From here, bring your right arm and left leg up towards each other using your abs, and touch your foot. Then, come to starting position and repeat with your left arm and right leg.

Continue alternating sides until you've completed 15 repetitions on each side.

V-ups and Knee Hugs

Lie on your back with your legs straight and your arms over your head. Move both arms and legs towards each other, so they meet above your waist. Squeeze your abs as you slowly lower down to the floor in a controlled movement. Repeat for a total of 15 repetitions.

Triangle Crunch Core Movement

Start by kneeling on your left leg with your right leg straight to the side. Place your left arm on the floor and your right arm behind your head. From here, crunch your oblique muscles by bringing your right knee towards your right elbow. Control the movement and keep the muscles engaged.

Repeat for 15 repetitions, then switch sides for another 15 repetitions.

Bicycle Crunch

Lie on your back with your hands behind your head and your feet raised. Your knees should be bent at a 90-degree angle. Start the movement by bringing your right elbow towards your left knee and straightening—pushing the pedal—with your right leg. Hold for one second, then alternate to the other leg-elbow combination. Continue alternating between the left and right sides for 15 repetitions per side.

Prime Minister Andrew Holness, in a post to his social media pages, congratulated the team on their victory.

"I am immensely proud of Team Jamaica! We won the Gold medal for the Katherine Johnson Award for Engineering Documentation in which the team had to demonstrate its robot-building process," the post read.

Minister of Foreign Affairs Kamina Johnson Smith also commended the team and their teachers on the victory.

"Jamaicans winning gold in the #RoboticsOlympics in Singapore shows how much potential we have in untapped areas! So excited to congratulate these young people! Kudos to their teachers and mentors and many thanks to UJAA [Union of Jamaica Alumni Association] President Wilson and his team for their invaluable support," Johnson Smith tweeted.

The Robotics team was sponsored by the United States-based non-profit organisation, the UJAA.

More than 90% of people killed by western Afghanistan quake were women and children, UN says

ISLAMABAD (AP) — More than 90 per cent of the people killed by a 6.3-magnitude earthquake in western Afghanistan last weekend were women and children, United Nations (UN) officials reported Thursday.

Taliban officials said Saturday's earthquake killed more than 2,000 people of all ages and genders across Herat province. The epicenter was in Zenda Jan district, where 1,294 people died, 1,688 were injured and every home was destroyed, according to UN figures.

Women and children were more likely to have been at home when the quake struck in the morning, said Siddig Ibrahim, the chief of the UNICEF field office in Herat, said. "When the first earthquake hit, people thought it was an explosion, and they ran into their homes," he said.

Hundreds of people, mostly women, remain missing in Zenda Jan.

The Afghanistan representative for the United Na-

tions Population Fund, Jaime Nadal, said there would have been no "gender dimension" to the death toll if the quake had happened at night.

"At that time of the day, men were out in the field," Nadal told The Associated Press. "Many men migrate to Iran for work. The women were at home doing the chores and looking after the children. They found themselves trapped under the rubble. There was clearly a gender dimension."

The initial quake, numerous aftershocks and a second 6.3-magnitude quake on Wednesday flattened entire villages, destroying hundreds of mud-brick homes that could not withstand such force. Schools, health clinics and other village facilities also collapsed.

The Norwegian Refugee Council described the devastation as enormous.

"Early reports from our teams are that many of those who lost their lives were small children who were crushed or suffocated after buildings collapsed

on them," the council said.

The maternity hospital in Herat province has cracks that make the structure unsafe. The UN Population Fund has provided tents so pregnant women have somewhere to stay and receive care, Nadal said.

Many people inside and outside the provincial capital are still sleeping outside, even as temperatures drop.

The disproportionate impact of the quake on women has left children without mothers, their primary caregivers, raising questions about who will raise them or how to reunite them with fathers who might be out of the province or Afghanistan.

Aid officials say orphanages are non-existent or uncommon, meaning children who have lost one or both parents were likely to be taken in by surviving relatives or community members.

Earthquakes are common in Afghanistan, where there are a number of fault lines and frequent movement among three nearby tectonic plates.

Women may be at greater risk of being unprepared for quakes because of Taliban edicts curtailing their mobility and rights, and restrictions imposed on female humanitarian workers, a UN report has warned.

Authorities have barred girls from school beyond sixth grade and stopped women from working at nongovernmental groups, although there are exceptions for some sectors like health care. The Taliban also say that women cannot travel long distances without male chaperones.

Aid agencies say their female Afghan staff members are "for now" working freely in Herat and reaching women and girls affected by the earthquake.

UNICEF has launched a \$20 million appeal to help the estimate 13,000 children and families devastated by the earthquake.

WI Academy to face Ireland Academy from November 17



ST. JOHN'S, Antigua – Cricket West Indies (CWI) has announced the match schedule and ven-

ues for the West Indies Academy home series against Ireland Academy.

The series will feature three 50-Over matches and two four-day matches in Antigua from 17 November to 5 December.

The first 50-Over match will be at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium (SVRS) on Friday 17 November followed by the second match at the Coolidge Cricket Ground (CCG) on Sunday 19 November. The third limited over match will be back at SVRS on Tuesday 21 November. Both four-day matches will be played at CCG – the first starting on Sunday 25 November and the second start on Sunday 2 December.

Graeme West, CWI's High-Performance Manager, outlined the idea behind the series and the structure. He noted that CWI continues to prioritize the development of players with the aim to prepare them to play at the highest level.

He said: "We are delighted to host Ireland Academy in Antigua for what will be a highly competitive multi-format series. This series is critical in the players ongoing development and education and we are pleased that it will involve both red and white ball matches. 2023 has provided

West added: "These five matches are not being played in isolation, but form part of CWI's overall high-performance strategy. We want to provide the squad with competitive environments and high-performance platforms that facilitate growth and prepare the players to excel in a West Indies shirt."

IOC suspends Russian Olympic Committee for incorporating Ukrainian sports regions

GENEVA (AP) — After nearly 20 months of waging war in Ukraine, Russia was suspended by the IOC on Thursday for a land grab in sports administration.

The International Olympic Committee's executive board imposed the suspension on the Russian Olympic Committee for a breach of the Olympic Charter — a book of rules and principles for international sports

bodies — by incorporating sports councils in four regions in eastern Ukraine.

The suspension does not immediately affect any Russians who are returning to compete in international sports as neutral athletes, including in some qualifying events for next year's Paris Olympics.

Russian Olympic officials provoked the dispute last week by accepting the councils

in Donetsk, Kherson, Luhansk and Zaporizhzhia as its members.

"(This) unilateral decision," the International Olympic Committee said in a statement from Mumbai, India, "constitutes a breach of the Olympic Charter because it violates the territorial integrity of the NOC of Ukraine, as recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) in accordance with the Olympic Charter."

The IOC didn't suspend the Russian Olympic body for a similar move in 2016, more than two years after the annexation of the Crimean peninsula.

Russian media reported in December 2016 that the sports councils of Crimea and Sevastopol were included as ROC members. International law still recognises the region as part of Ukraine.

Still, the decision Thursday to suspend the ROC appears to highlight rising frustration from the IOC and its president, Thomas Bach, who can ultimately decide to impose a blanket ban on all Russian athletes from Paris.

"(The IOC) reserves the right to decide about the participation of individual neutral athletes with a Russian passport in the Olympic Games Paris 2024 and the Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026 at the appropriate time," the IOC said.

TCI Face BVI In Crucial Nations League Match-up

The Turks and Caicos Islands are set to face off against the British Virgin Islands in a Concacaf Nations League match on Monday, October 16, at the TCI field at 4 p.m. This match is a crucial one for the Turks and Caicos Islands as they aim to revive their bid in the league.

Currently, the Turks and Caicos Islands find themselves at the bottom of Group C in League C without any points. They have played two matches in the league so far, and unfortunately, they were defeated by Dominica and the British Virgin Islands. In their most recent game, they suffered a 0-3 defeat at home against Dominica. The first encounter between the Turks and Caicos Islands and the British Virgin Islands, which took place in the British Virgin Islands, ended with a 3-1 victory for the home team. Luka Challowell scored a brace for the British Virgin Islands, and Troy Ceasar scored the other goal, while Billy Forbes netted a penalty for the Turks and Caicos Islands.

Despite the outcome, the stats from that game suggest that the Turks and Caicos Islands were not significantly outplayed. The British Virgin Islands had 52 percent of possession, while the Turks and Caicos Islands had 48 percent. The TCI had one more shot on goal (11) compared to BVI (10). Both teams had three shots on target, with the British Virgin Islands converting all three and the TCI scoring one.

In terms of pass accuracy, both teams were relatively similar, with the British Virgin Islands at 74 percent and the Turks and Caicos Islands at 72 percent. The British Virgin Islands created four corners in that game, while the Turks and Caicos Islands had three.

The upcoming match on Monday marks the start of the return legs in the competition. To

keep their chances alive for advancing to the next round, the Turks and Caicos Islands must win by a margin of two clear goals.

The team will rely on key players, including veteran forward Billy Forbes, along with younger strikers such as Junior Paul, Peterson Evariste, and Roguel Aneston. Midfielders Callum Park, Herby Magny, and Raymond Burey, as well as the solid defense provided by goalkeeper Sebastian Turbyfield, and defenders Wildens Delva, Mackenson Cadet, Christopher Louisy, and Kristen Howell, will be crucial to their efforts.

The Turks and Caicos Islands Football Association is hoping for strong support from the fans in the venue to cheer on their team and provide the necessary boost to secure a victory.

The Concacaf Nations League is a tournament that began in November 2017, featuring three tiered leagues (A, B, and C) with four groups in each league. Teams can be promoted or relegated based on their performance within these groups. The group winners of League A enter a knockout competition to determine the champion, while the group winners of Leagues B and C are promoted to the next tier. Relegation occurs for the four teams at the bottom of the groups in Leagues A and B. The tournament also serves as a qualification pathway for the CONCACAF Gold Cup.

The Group A teams are (League A, Group A) Trinidad & Tobago, Panama, Guatemala, Martinique, Curacao, and El Salvador. League A, Group B comprise Jamaica, Cuba, Honduras, Haiti, Suriname and Grenada.

In League A, Group 1, the two teams facing relegation are Curacao and El Salvador. In League A, Group 2, the teams in danger of relegation are Suriname and Grenada.
