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

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It has been another exciting and challenging year at the school and for the country. The challenge of maintaining academic and educational standards in the country gets more and more pressing. I believe that Bryanston High still can offer a superb standard of education that is comparable to anywhere in the country. The Teachers, Governing Body and I are committed to and work very hard to give all of our students the benefit of a top quality education that will open all possibilities when they leave school. A holistic education based on academic principles, extra-mural participation, democratic skills and the inculcation of life-long re-affirming values in a disciplined environment is the essence of the educational package of the school.

There are five issues that have dominated the current school year and they are:

1 The growing challenges in the financial management of the school, especially concerning the challenge of collecting school fees in the present economic, political and legal environment. The challenges are massive should the management of the school want to maintain academic standards and the facilities of the school. There is also a pressing need to extend the existing facilities, such as the need for additional classrooms and office space.

2 There are increasing concerns around the growing shortage of teachers and the quality of teachers available in the market. Bryanston is blessed to have wonderful teachers, but there are not enough new teachers entering the system from the universities to top up the system as teachers leave. The stress of working in schools is enormous and society needs to support teachers so that they stay committed to this noble and critical profession.

3 Discipline issues are becoming more concerning and I attribute the main cause to families and especially, parents who no longer have the will or the ability to manage and control their children. As a consequence values are not taught, boundaries for behaviour are not clearly defined and hence the children are doing what they like without the maturity and sense of responsibility to deal with the issues of the adult world

4 There are challenges in the preparation of our Matric students for the Matric Exams of 2008. As it is the first time we are writing the new Matric, there are a number of uncertainties about content, standards, syllabus interpretation, marking methods and teaching strategy. In addition the advice and guidance gained from the GDE has not been very helpful and, until we complete the first year of the new system we will not be able to really understand the implications of the new system for the students, school, universities and the teachers. One also wonders how the universities are going to adapt to the new system. How are they going to manage their admissions and how are the 2008 Matric students going to cope with their first year at university in 2009?

5 Another issue is the security of the school and the students, teachers and staff within the school. We have spent a fortune

improving the fencing, extending the number of cameras and upgrading the alarm. We have additional plans to electrify the fences and to place electronic exiting/entrancing systems at all the gates for students, staff and visitors. We will also increase the number of guards on duty at the various gates.

Given the above issues, I believe the school is dealing with them very well.

1 We have the highest collection rates in the community for school fees. The administrative ladies in finance do a superb job following up on all parents and meeting the complicated legal requirements of the law.

2 The teachers are superb and show tremendous courage and professionalism in the face of a lot of adversity. I admire them all for the selfless commitment they make to the school and words cannot adequately express my gratitude to them. I trust all parents will support me in the above statement. The School's Executive(SMT) are a wonderful team of leaders and managers who guide and steer the school through the maze of policies, laws and the many educational, professional and social issues with which the school and society presents them.

3 Our school is relatively safe. The new wall on William Nicol closes the school off to the traffic noise and the taxi rank, and our relationship with the local suburban security system has had a positive impact on our safety. Vandalism and burglaries are at an all time low.

4 The Matrics have been very well prepared for the exams given the large number of unknowns at the moment with the new system and I am sure our results will again be excellent. We achieved 90% exemption rate last year which places us as a top achieving school in the country.

5 We are successfully meeting all the discipline issues presented to us and parents are co-operating with the management of the school. The Grade Controllers do an excellent job managing their respective grades, showing positive leadership and they are outstanding role models to all their students.

6 Extra-murals remain a focal point of the school and we can still field 12 rugby teams, an A and B swimming team, 6 girls' hockey teams, a bulging athletic team and participate in many other activities. It is vital that parents support the extra-mural programme. The educational benefits are enormous.

7 We still have the support of parents in maintaining our ability to take sports tours away to various parts of the country. These tours are very important to the educational development of our students. I would like to thank all the teachers who give up their time to organize and participate in these tours. The Grade 11 and Grade 8 camps are wonderful experiences for students and staff.

8 Although our facilities are beginning to age our fields are in wonderful condition; there are two computer centres and we have extended our gardens and paving to many under-

developed areas of the school. We are continually up-grading our facilities.

9 Our musicals are the best in the community. "Guys and Dolls" was an outstanding success and an enormous amount of time was taken by the teachers and cast to produce an outstanding performance.

10 The leadership program in the school is outstanding. The LIA organize many events at the school and raise valuable funds. Grade 11 students are given the opportunity to learn leadership and management skills. These leadership skills are then transferred to the RCL and it performs very well. I would like to congratulate the Executive of the RCL for its very good leadership of the school community. We are developing our leaders for the future of our community and the country.



Our computer network and printing infrastructure are superb. CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT 2008

My first term as governing body chairperson is well on its way and it has not been an easy task. To fill Peter Azzie's shoes is a task in itself, because he was a size 14 and I'm only a size 10. Let me start off by introducing to you, in no specific order, our current governing body. Luis Ferreira, vice chairperson, Jenni Haefele, Chris Bell, Stewart Kapito, Hermann Ackerman, Colin Hutton, Jeff Davidson, Yvonne Flemmer, and the staff members and RCL members who also form part thereof, and of course our scribe, Sandy De Villiers.

The main issues that we currently face and will continue to face for the foreseeable future are the day to day financial management of the school, second only to the retention of our most precious commodity, teachers. I would like you all to applaud the teaching staff, without whom, our children would not be as well educated as they are. Education in this country is possibly one of the most important resources that needs to be exploited. We are finding it more and more difficult to deal with the number of non-paying parents.

This is not a reflection of the quality of parents that we attract to the school, but rather a sign of the current economic situation. The GDE employs 33 teachers in the school; this gives us a ratio of 35 students per classroom. Imagine that? We have tried fitting the 35 desks and chairs in a single classroom at Bryanston Primary School; it is physically impossible. To avoid this scenario the balance of approx 35 teachers are employed and paid for by the governing body.

Our school, when compared to many private schools with which we compete in terms of market share, excels every year with our Matrics outdoing most of the elite private school students. It is my belief that traditional "Model C" schools such as ours will be gaining market share from private schools for two reasons. Firstly, parents have come to the expensive realisation that Bryanston High School education is as good as private education, after all the teachers teaching in the private sector studied and were trained at the same tertiary education institutions as our teachers, and, in fact, many teachers who taught here have been poached by private schools.

My second theory is that we will see an influx of ex-private school students as their parents can no longer afford the exorbitant fees. This, in essence, means that Bryanston High School will be able to attract a higher calibre parent body, and by this I mean a parent body that is able and willing to pay for the services we provide.

I am alarmed at the number of parents that we have who are not willing to pay fees. In some cases it is attitude rather than affordability.

I am not here to pontificate or demand; I am here to convince you that we need to maintain the level of education which we currently enjoy at this school. Not all is doom and gloom though; I can say that we have a magnificent complement of staff members. As you know, the school is a State asset and we are responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the facilities, with no financial assistance from the State. We have spent and will continue spending money on maintenance in order to keep facilities functional at the school.

We are fortunate that violence has not affected our school community. The tragic events that have occurred in other schools are indeed incomprehensible and very sad; I refer, specifically, to the violence which has in some cases led to the death of students. We have conducted search and seizure operations in the school and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. We have had some children who have brought illegal items to the school, and we will use the law to curb this kind of behaviour.

It is with great sadness that we saw the tragic and untimely death of Thomas Leary, a Matric student; our thoughts go out to family and friends.

Lerato Mhlanga is doing well and is coping with her daily school activities even though she is wheel chair bound.

In conclusion, I would like to thank my colleagues on the governing body for their commitment and dedication and all the hours they put in, Mr Robinson and all his staff, thank you for leading the school to such high standards, under very difficult and challenging circumstances.

I look forward to serving and working with this school for as long as I am needed.

The Grade 8s began the year learning all about food processing and thoroughly enjoyed their pizza taste testing as well as making hamburgers. Their cycle exam gave them the opportunity to put their newly acquired knowledge and skills to the test whilst enjoying the theme of SMARTIES. In term 2 they learned all about graphic communication and constructed bird-feeders in their June exams. The third term saw them investigating and constructing structures. Some of the game farm lodges that they made were incredibly creative and unbelievable in their detail.

The Grade 9s started off the year learning about the problem that the world's rapidly depleting fossil fuel reserves poses. This was an extremely relevant topic for the learners at the time as it was during that terrible period in the early part of 2008 when we all had to deal with the frustrations of load shedding. The learners studied the exciting possibilities that solar power presents as a

GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT – 2008






By the third day we were starting to get used to this way of life and really liking it. We were now really starting to form strong ties with people from all over the world.

MY MOST PRIZED POSSESSION






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
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
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
