

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

We at Bryanston are confident though that we can continue being the excellent school that we are currently.

With our Educational system facing serious challenges I am happy to report that Bryanston High School has not been severely affected in recent times. BELA (Basic Education Law Amendments) has been tabled in parliament without any input from any Teacher Unions. Some of the issues discussed in BELA are increased class sizes, different subject combinations and subject content matter. We at Bryanston

are confident though, that we can continue being the excellent school that we are currently.

We are lucky to have a very involved Governing Body and I would like to thank Mr Hillebrand and the Governing Body for their continued support and assistance in 2017. Their guidance is invaluable to the Management of the school. Our matric results of 2016 did not reflect a 100% pass rate although the 99.3% that we did achieve is still higher than the norm. I want to thank my Academic Staff and Heads of the Department for their hard work during the year. I would also like to thank the Governing Body for employing 28 additional teachers. This is only possible because we are a fee paying school and we are proud of how this affects teaching and learning in this school. The Achievers Club is now up and running and we can already see learners turning their Bs into As. Thank you to the staff who introduced the Achievers Club.

We were, for the 7th year in a row, the top Northern Government School as rated by the GDE. We, as a staff, work very hard to achieve this; we hope that we can build on this trend.









I would like to highlight some of our superb achievements in 2017:

- In Athletics we came 3rd in the A-league, which is a phenomenal achievement.
- Our boys' squash team won their league for the second year.
- Even with the lack of an Astro, our hockey boys remain one of our strongest sports in the school and they certainly have had a good year.
- Our English and Biology departments were ranked top in the District again and Mr. Gillespie was rated top EGD teacher in the district.
- We had a fantastic musical that certainly set the tone for things to come.
- True Blue day has grown into a very special event with bigger and better activities.
- We have privatised the tuck shop and the new Blue Flame Café has certainly added value to our school.
- Our first team rugby boys were unbeaten in the Clover series and won the final to move up a league.

REPORT FROM THE SGB CHAR Our successes of 2016 have been built on and we stand ready to grow further in 2018.

Back in 2015 I made mention of the palpable excitement I could feel in the air for 2016. It has been great to see and feel this grow in 2017 and we have seen a change in the confidence we as a school exude. Our successes of 2016 have been built on and we stand ready to grow further in 2018.

As always, our first function of the year was our staff long service awards with numerous staff being recognised for reaching various

milestones in their chosen careers. We welcomed 8 new "young" staff with a mix of academics and sports administrator. These new staff members continue to add to the mix of youth and experience that we see in our staffroom.

From an academic perspective we had great results with our outgoing matrics. We achieved a very commendable 98.2 % pass rate with a 74.46% bachelors pass. Paayal Naiker continued our tradition of at least one learner getting 8 distinctions, Sheoree Suklal got 7 distinctions, three learners got 6 distinctions and four learners got 5 distinctions. Without doubt these results were aided by rolling out the successful academic council to all grades. After two years academic council as gained tremendous traction and our learners are reaping the rewards of this programme. Our thanks to the SMT staff who manage the programme and all the staff who contribute tirelessly toward the academic excellence of the school.

Our Grade 8 learners for 2017 have been challenged by the success of our 2016 grade 8s. It has been a pleasure to see them rise to the occasion and immerse themselves in life at Bryanston High School. Once again we look forward to the input of a new intake over the next 5 years.

While we acknowledge we are first and foremost an academic institution, we do strive to provide a holistic education which includes cultural, sporting and social responsibility programs. On the cultural side we found ourselves in the middle of an amazing production of "High School Musical". Every year I am blown away by the talent we uncover and this year is no exception. Our learners and staff spent many hours in rehearsal prior to presenting it to their parents, friends and the broader Bryanston community. Our thanks to the many staff and parents for their tireless mentoring, passion and commitment to the learners who gave of themselves to entertain us. The production set exceptionally high standards and brought out talent in our learners that many parents and friends did not believe existed. Well done to our learners and staff for an entertaining and uplifting night out.

Our win ratios in almost all sporting codes have risen yet again this past year with success rates of 60 - 70% no longer being the norm but rather expected. This is not without hard work from our sportsmen, sportswomen and their coaches. Training like never before, teams continue to jockeying for space on the fields in the first and second terms - all of them at 6 am in the morning in pre-season training, let alone the regular afternoon practices. On some mornings there were as many as 6 different codes all putting the in the hard yards. Let's not forget the coaches who were also out there at 6 am most mornings with their teams and then still putting in a full days teaching, followed by an afternoon of coaching and then preparing for school in the evenings. Even now in October some rugby coaches are still out there with their boys at 6 am preparing for 2018.Last year I singled out our Athletics Team and I would like to do so again. After having won the C League in 2014 and the B League in 2015, competing in the A League was quite a challenge and 2016 was about staying in the A League. To their credit they performed wonderfully and came a brilliant second at Inter High. 2017 saw us win the Torch Trophy yet again and retain our spot in the A league with a third place in Inter High. At the Prestige meet our athletes performed incredibly with individual athletes and relay teams taking 6 gold, 3 silver and 4 bronze medals.

Cross Country continues to shine under the guidance of Mr Lawrence with a 2nd place in the Northern District League. 7 Athletes were invited to the inter-league finals and all of them were placed in the top 15.

This year I would like to make mention of our rugby boys in all age groups. While we did lose some of our derby day matches, the season as a whole was a great success. The KZN Festival hosted by Port Natal saw our 1st team winning one match and losing one. The season culminated with all our "A" teams making it to the Pirates Challenge finals. Of these our U16, U15 and U14 teams won their leagues with our 1st team finishing second. This was good enough to get promoted to the A league where we will face our traditional rivals. Our under 15 boys have been exceptionally successful with only two losses this year and have added the scalps of large rivals Northcliff and Randpark to their list of wins. They have lost only 4 matches in two years, winning their league in 2016 and 2017.

Our hockey boys have had a phenomenal season with our 1st Team ending with an 75% win ratio and ending the season 2nd in the B-League. Included in their wins were victories against some of our traditional northern rivals. Congratulations to Kyle Neilson for reaching 100 caps – a first for Bryanston High.

On the support side, we continue to see an improvement in the levels of support our sports teams are getting from their friends and families. I am greatly encouraged by the number of parents we see at sports events. I would really encourage you to attend our home Derby Days and where possible the away games too and be part of the growing Bryanston Family.

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To all our coaches, sports men and women and supporters – WELL DONE! You deserve all our support and encouragement and continue to make us proud.

In between all the mainstream activities on the campus our learners and staff have been very busy with activates such as Miss Pizzazz, Miss Elegance, Mr Bryanston, the LAN Club, the Midmar Mile, inter-house sport, LIA, grade camps, councillor camps, debating, the Matric Dance, Paarlauf and numerous charitable projects. Thanks to all who gave up their time to make these events a success.

We are indeed fortunate to have Mr John Skelton as our Principal. Mr Skelton leads a dynamic Senior Management Team comprising staff with years of experience combined with the energy of youth. Anyone involved in the governance of a school will very quickly realise that no two days are ever alike. With 913 learners, their parents and the GDE to serve, the value of a capable and competent SMT cannot be underestimated. We are privileged to have a SMT that continues to manage the day to day functions of the school efficiently, with integrity and often with compassion and empathy. Their leadership style contributes to the ethos of our school and makes every one of our learner's part of the larger "Bryanston Family". The support they receive from our admin ladies cannot be overlooked and the manner in which they manage the day to day functioning in the school is commendable. These ladies also manage the admissions system and the record numbers we are expecting in 2018 is testimony to their dedication and hard work.

As Chairman of the Governing Body I am acutely aware of the need to maintain standards in a climate where many schools are facing tremendous challenges. These range from providing a good education in a disciplined environment with limited resources to providing opportunity for learners to express themselves on the sports field or on the stage. The accolade of "Top School" in the northern suburbs is testimony to each and every teacher's commitment to our learners. We will be eternally in your debt for the influence you have had in the lives of our sons and daughters.

Through 2016 we started the process of privatising our tuckshop. This was done with the intention of focussing on our core functions of offering a wholistic education and offering a better service to our learners and staff. The process was finalised in May 2017 and "The Blue Flame Café" commenced trading on the first day of 3rd term. The café has been incredibly well received and the offering to patrons is simply superb. We have taken the café into the digital age with a biometric prepaid system that allows parents the prerogative to limit their child's access to junk food etc if you so wish.

As with learners leaving Bryanston High School, so too, do we lose parents from our Governing Body. Our thanks to Mrs Liz Edwards who was an integral part of marketing Bryanston to our surrounding communities. Liz will be relocating to Thailand with her husband while her two boys who graduate in 2017 will be furthering their studies at UCT. Liz has served tirelessly for many years and has contributed so much to the success of Bryanston High.

Hendrick Swartz was elected to replace Liz at a by-election held in the 3rd term and while Hendrick has only served for a short period we look forward to his input over the next few years. Our existing members who continue to serve are Trevor Blackstock (Governance), Chris Durand (Discipline), Ron Tavener (Fundraising), Dave Denton (Legal), Liza Williams (Treasurer), Janine van Duyn (Human Resources), Gavin Kennedy (Addition to Projects) and Rob Dijkhuis (Ground and Maintenance). Our gratitude to you all for your willingness to serve in what can be a tough but immensely rewarding environment.

To our Grade 12s, I would really encourage you to join the Bryanston High Alumni and contribute in some way to the Alumni Foundation. As you take what you have learned here and spread your wings, I trust that you will look back fondly at your time here and where possible play your part in shaping the lives of future learners at Bryanston High.

I look forward to 2018 with great anticipation as we plan to expand on our facilities and celebrate our 50th anniversary. Please make every effort to be part of these celebrations and be part of the wonderful family that is Bryanston High.

Inter-house Gala




LIA COMMITTEE VALENTINE'S DAY
