





Commonly known as Sydney red gum, rusty gum or smoothbarked apple, this a species of tree that is endemic to eastern Australia. Reaching 30 m (100 ft) in height, it forms a lignotuber (a rounded woody growth at or below ground level.

In Victoria it is a commonly planted ornamental tree and is naturalised in some places.

The species has distinctive smooth bark that is an attractive pinkish or orange-brown when new and fades and weathers to grey with age and sheds the bark in small scales.

Its lance-shaped leaves are arranged in opposite pairs along the stems, with white or creamy white flowers appearing from October to December.

Young plants and coppice regrowth have elliptical to eggshaped leaves arranged in opposite pairs with a stemclasping base without a stalk, 60–125 mm long and 20–65 mm wide. These are glossy green but paler on the lower surface.



New ical growth is strongly tined with red. The nower bads are arranged on the ends of branchlets on a branched peduncle (the stalk bearing the flower or the fruit) 3–25 mm long, each branch of the peduncle with usually three buds on the stalk, 3–15 mm long. Mature buds are oval to globe-shaped, up to 10 mm long and 11 mm wide.

There are five sepals up to 3 mm long and the petals are white to creamy white with a green keel, 3–5 mm long and 3–6 mm wide.

Flowering occurs from October to December and the fruit is an oval or bell-shaped capsule up to 20 mm long and wide.

Angophora costata trees can live for over 100 years. The species responds to bushfire by resprouting from epicormic buds and its lignotuber; shoots on branches of older specimens arise after a month, while shoots resprout from the trunk and base of young plants within a month of a hot fire. Seedlings appear within 9 to 10 months.

The tree is parasitised by the long-flowered miseltoe.

The flowers are eaten by the grey-headed flying fox and little red flying fox while the seed is eaten by the crimson rosella.

Although the bark of Angophora Costata is smooth, many invertebrates are found there and live under the loose bark at the base of the tree. Some specimens have a straight trunk while others have a more branching habit with twisted trunks. The tree sometimes sheds branches however with formative pruning this is avoided.

Angophora Costata have been planted along Austin Street by the Surf Coast shire south of the highway to form an avenue. This planting was made possible by the Surf Coast Shire street tree allocation of the year 23/24.

All tree plantings in Winchelsea are planted with extensive community consultation and input, including with the Winchelsea Arboretum Trail group, a sub-committee of Growing Winchelsea.

All trees in the town are subject to on going risk assessments carried out by the Surf Coast Shire environmental management team. See the SCS website for the Tree Risk Management Plan 2023-2027.

A representative of The Winchelsea Arboretum Trail group can be found at the Winchelsea market on the first Sunday of every month, located near the entrance to the Shire Hall adjacent to the Growing Winchelsea stand.

Report on Winchelsea Star Production Meeting Saturday 26 October 2024





The property, first known as Mt. Gellibrand run, was taken up about 1841 by Charles Ayrey. It comprised 21,717 acres in 1849. In 1847 the lease was transferred to his brother Alexander.

When the lease expired the property was purchased by James Ford Strachan, who built the original homestead in 1871. It was then purchased by F. Felix Armytage in 1884. It consisted of about 2,470 ha. and improvements were the homestead, outbuildings, stabling, woodsheds, huts, dams, tanks, fencing and yards.

In 1889 Robert Andrew Ramsay purchased MOOLERIC. The homestead was built of bluestone quarried on the property.

The garden was one of the most historic gardens in Victoria. Isabella Ramsey, Angus's great-grandmother, was a close friend of William Guilfoyle (the notable landscape gardener) who came out to lay out the garden. He described MOOLERIC as his best small garden.

It was never my intention to begin adopting brumbies. It was completely by accident that I came across an ad in the Weekly Times for an open day at the newly set up Victorian Brumby Association. I was completely unaware that we still had brumbies in our high country. That was 2007 and I've been involved since.

WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO GET INVOLVED IN BRUMBY RESCUE?

Being involved in the rehoming (I don't do the capture part) just evolved. It was not initially my plan but the time I spent with them I realised they have a gift they can offer most horse owners/riders and I had an opportunity to be able to share that with others and help at least some of our brumbies have a future beyond being wild. Brumbies do have a special place in our Colonial History and Australian Folk Lore and I'm doing my part to make sure its not forgotten.

HOW DO YOU SOURCE THE BRUMBIES?

All the brumbies here come from registered rescue organisations. That means these groups have agreements with National Parks here in Victoria or New South Wales to rehome those brumbies trapped and removed via the Feral Horse Management Plans. I also support groups gelding of all stallions before they are rehomed. There are far too many horses needing homes already, no need to create more! Plus no one wants to see dead shot horses in our beautiful parks, so this is the one way to help prevent that.

WHAT ARE SOME METHODS YOU USE TO TRAIN THEM? The method I use is called Release Focus Training. This is the foundation of an education program put together by Shane and Meredith Ransley, good friends and founders of the Australian Horsemanship program - Quantum Savvy. I have found all the

brumbies respond really well to this way of approaching your training. It's more a mind set shift of how you go about your training and what you are looking for to release on, rather than the actual task. This way you can apply it to any method or style of training you do. There are a few basic principles I use as a guide with this: That and the brumbies of course have taught me pretty much all I know about horsemanship.

Have you ever thought of rehoming a Brumby? Jen Renouf did

WHAT IS THE BRUMBIES FUTURE AFTER BEING TRAINED? I've seen brumbies rehomed to many different people. They are extremely adaptable and will give any discipline a go. They have been placed in homes for Equine Assisted Learning Pony Club, Trail Riding, many different riding disciplines including jumping, dressage, obstacle and trail and even as companions and lawn mowers. As long as they have a equine buddy, they're happy.

WHAT CAN PROSPECTIVE BUYERS EXPECT?

The first few weeks of rehoming are the toughest. Give your brumby time to settle into their new surroundings and get to know other horses you may have. Settling into a herd of domestic horses can be a bit different for them and they may take some time to adjust. Believe it or not their domestic buddies think and react differently in the herd dynamic. Spend time just getting to know your new brumby without a lot of expectation. Hang out in the paddock, take them for walks on lead around their new home and just generally spend as much time together hanging out so they can get to know you. Brumbies form very close bonds to their owners/ handlers and have a huge amount try and give and will reward you with many years of companionship if you spare the time to make that connection

Winch House AGM Chair's Report 2023/4

Winchelsea Community House held its Annual General Meeting on Wednesday 16 October, rounding out another year full of achievements, challenges and change. Ending with a small budget surplus, the financial situation reflects some positive developments but the future is full of uncertainty and significant budgetary hurdles. Your support, wherever and however suits you best, is essential to ensure the ongoing sustainability of this so-important community centre. My report to this year's AGM is as follows;

I've been listening to an audiobook, "Lost Connections" by Johann Hari. Nearly 7 hours worth of research and investigation into depression which is flooding communities across the world.

One of the key takeaways from this book is that loneliness is not just commonly associated with depression, it is thought to cause it. The title of the book is all about the way we live our lives now compared to how we evolved. We have lost our connections to each other. It turns out there is no electronic replacement for face-to-face interactions, for in-person socialising, for meeting people and making friends in the real world.

Making connections is at the core of community centres and Neighbourhood Houses like Winchelsea Community House. When you consider the activities put on such as the craft group, Chatty Cafe, crochet & knitting, singing, sound healing and tai chi – they're all about getting together and connecting.

Winch House also auspices a number of more formal groups that operate independently under the legal umbrella of Winch House. The Men's Shed, Wensleydale Rural Group, Winchelsea Youth Leisure Dropln (WYLD), Wurdale & Surrounds Recovery Network, all were formed by people with clear objectives working together – connecting for a common cause.

Our fabulous volunteer Committee, the amazing people that work at Winch House, the dedicated volunteers that are so essential for keeping the wheels turning. All are connecting with each other and the people that make use of this community facility.

This is what makes Winchelsea Community House crucial to the fabric of the town and wider region. There are plenty of community organisations around that likewise offer the opportunity to connect while driving towards their own objectives. Winch House, however, is unique in its ability to offer physical spaces, official status, resources and experienced support in an inclusive central place.

If you are part of the Winchelsea region communities in any way shape or form, I encourage you to help keep Winch House the vibrant success that it has become. Pester politicians for more funding. Hire a space. Participate in an activity.

The connections I have made here form an important and positive part of my life journey. I hope they do for you too — and if not, I (strongly) encourage you to get involved however suits you best. Join up, join in, and connect.

Hooded plovers need our care for longer than just National Bird Week

Authorities are issuing a reminder to coastal visitors about the small, but important actions they can take to safeguard vulnerable hooded plovers as they begin nesting along Victoria's shorelines.

Spring also marks the start of joint protection efforts by the Conservation Regulator, Parks Victoria, and BirdLife Australia under Operation Save our Hoodies (SoHo), an initiative educating beachgoers about keeping their distance from hooded plovers and their nests and taking enforcement action when these rules are broken to support the species during their crucial breeding season.

Hooded plovers are tiny, threatened birds which lay eggs in shallow sand scrapes and raise their chicks on beaches between August and March. The species faces significant threats from people trampling nests or scaring adult birds away from their nests – leaving eggs vulnerable to the weather and predators – and from dogs chasing, catching, and/or killing vulnerable chicks.

Last season, Birdlife monitored 152 breeding pairs along Victoria's coastline and recorded 61 chicks that survived to become juveniles.

Conservation Regulator and Parks Victoria Authorised Officers are patrolling Victorian beaches from the far south-west as beaches get busier, while BirdLife Australia are monitoring hooded plovers and helping protection efforts by raising public awareness of the species, installing signage, and fencing-off nesting sites. This year there will be more on ground presence, education and infrastructure through Operation SoHo thanks to a funding boost to the Conservation Regulator and BirdLife Australia through the federal Saving Native Species Program.

Last breeding season from September 2023 to April 2024, Authorised Officers conducted 260 patrols along the Victorian coast and engaged with more than 1600 people.

In promising news, authorities also found more beachgoers doing the right thing, issuing only 32 fines – down from 83 in 2022-23 – to people for various offences, including disturbing birds and dog owners not complying with rules near hooded plover habitat.

The Conservation Regulator has also selected the hooded plover as one of six native animals featured in its Focus Species program, promoting wildlife protection at home and in the wild. The program aims to engage and educate the public on why Victoria's environmental regulations exist and how following them helps native species survive and thrive for generations to come.

Hooded plovers are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975 and it is illegal to disturb, injure or destroy them, damage their habitat, or interfere with warning signage. Offenders face maximum penalties ranging between \$3,951 and \$47,421. Dog owners must also be aware of local beach regulations, particularly areas where dogs are prohibited, and always keep pets on-lead or under their control, as they face fines up to \$4,939 if their dog attacks wildlife.

The Conservation Regulator investigates reports of habitat destruction and dogs harassing hooded plovers. Reports can be made to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.

Food relief for families in need

Communities facing food insecurity will have increased access to healthy food thanks to grants awarded through the Allan Labor Government's Community Food Relief program.

Minister for Carers and Volunteers Ros Spence today announced four organisations will receive grants for projects to improve coordination of the supply and distribution of food across 26 local government areas, supporting more than 400 charity partners and getting more food to communities in need.

The Labor Government's \$4.5 million Community Food Relief Program includes Coordination Grants announced today, and Local Grants to be announced in coming weeks, helping respond to rising demand for food relief amid cost-of-living pressures experienced by individuals and families.

Geelong Food Relief Centre will implement a new distribution model to manage and deliver food from Geelong across western Victoria, including to Horsham, Colac and the Golden Plains Shire.

OzHarvest will establish a new warehouse and distribution centre to increase food delivery efficiency and support an additional 12 organisations across south-east metropolitan Melbourne.

Meanwhile SecondBite's funding boost will be put towards the purchase of a 10-pallet truck to expand deliveries of rescued food to regional communities in need.

The Regional Food Security Alliance's grant will see the organisation formalise its partnership with OzHarvest and SecondBite, increasing efficiencies and coordination efforts to reach more communities in regional and rural areas.

Since 2020, the Labor Government has invested more than \$56 million to strengthen the food relief system in Victoria including support for six regional foodshares. In addition, \$10 million has been provided to Foodbank Victoria to support the establishment of community food centres in Morwell and Ballarat.

Making help for addictions more accessible

The State Government is making sure Victorians seeking help for opioid dependence can access medical treatment closer to home – with a new pharmacotherapy grant program now open.

Pharmacotherapy is the use of medication (such as methadone and buprenorphine) to combat illicit opioid dependence and is an essential part of Victoria's efforts to reduce drug harm.

Currently around 15,000 Victorians use pharmacotherapy each day – mainly prescribed by GPs and nurse practitioners and dispensed by community pharmacies, as well as public specialist pharmacotherapy clinics across Victoria.

The pharmacotherapy grants program will support community health services to deliver pharmacotherapy services in areas of high demand or where there may be service gaps.

Community health services in Victoria provide primary healthcare for people at risk of poorer health outcomes, and are well placed to deliver pharmacotherapy services to mitigate the problems that stem from opioid dependence.

Making pharmacotherapy accessible at these services will mean up to an additional 1,500 Victorians will be able to undertake this life-changing treatment – adding to the more than 40,000 Victorians accessing help through state-funded alcohol and drug treatment and support services each year.

The pharmacotherapy grants are part of the State Government's \$95 million Statewide Action Plan to reduce drug harms, which includes a further \$7.2 million investment to deliver Victoria's first hydromorphone trial to diversify treatment options for those whom traditional pharmacotherapy treatment approaches have been ineffective.

The plan is also supporting the establishment of 20 naloxone vending machines, a trial of Victoria's first overdose prevention and response helpline, the appointment of Victoria's first Chief Addiction Medicine Advisor and the delivery of Victoria's first statewide strategy to address drug harms over the long-term.

The State Government is dedicated to reducing drug harm – investing almost \$3 billion in alcohol and drug treatment treatments and services since 2014.

This investment includes establishing the Victoria's first medically supervised injecting room, growing the workforce and implementing the Ice Action Plan to support users and families, and make the community safer.

New taskforce to strengthen maternity services

Victoria's maternity and newborn services are already some of the safest and highest quality in the world – and this will be strengthened through the State Government's new maternity taskforce.

A taskforce will be established with a focus on ensuring hospitals have the best workforce and models of care in place – so families have access to safe, reliable care as close to home as possible.

The taskforce will identify opportunities and address known complex challenges that can have an effect on the service delivery of Victoria's world-class maternity care, including workforce recruitment and retention.

Victoria has 52 maternity health service providers, including 33 in regional areas and the taskforce will have an initial focus on rural and regional areas – so they can continue to deliver the best care now and into the future.

The taskforce will be made up of nursing and midwifery experts – including the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation and representatives from regional and rural health services.

A targeted expression of interest process to join the taskforce is underway, with work to review Victoria's maternity system to identify strategies for improvement commencing shortly.

The taskforce will work with health services, community and experts to consider models of care that support women to have choice in their pregnancy and birth experiences, while strengthening rural and regional maternity workforces.

The State Government continues to make record investments including delivering a massive 28 per cent pay rise to Victoria's nurses and midwives.

This is on top of a \$270 million boost to the workforce, investing in scholarships up to \$16,500 for more than 10,000 nursing and midwifery students, and creating more post graduate opportunities for practicing nurses and midwives.

The Nursing and Midwifery Graduate Sign-On Bonus was also delivered by the State Government, offering a \$5,000 bonus to eligible graduates who then go on to work at a Victorian public health hospital.

The Climate Report

Although this Climate Report is specific to Tasmania, its findings in general can most certainly be extrapolated to mainland Australia

Tasmania's first State of the Environment report in 15 years warns of 'escalating' challenges

The government is supposed to provide an updated State of the Environment report every five years, but hasn't done one since 2009.

The 666-page reports warns Tasmania faces escalating environmental challenges, including warming seas, extinction threats and the disappearance of kelp forests.

The report assessed 29 environmental categories across six broad themes — coasts and marine, land, biodiversity, rivers and wetlands, air, and waste.

It found 16 of the 29 categories were "getting worse", including:

- Sea surface temperatures, with monthly mean temperatures increasing by between 2.5 degrees and 3.8 degrees since 1944
- Kelp forests, which have suffered "significant declines" during "unprecedented change"
- Migratory shorebirds, which are "decreasing rapidly" in both abundance and diversity
- Pests, including weeds, invasive animals and associated diseases becoming "established"
- Threatened fauna, with 76 out of 460 vertebrate species listed as threatened in Tasmania
- Threatened flora, with an extra 41 species listed as endangered or threatened since 2002
- Native vegetation, including native forest and woodlands, decreasing 3.99 per cent since 2009Only two of the 29 environmental categories — air quality particulate matter

- and the eradication of rice grass were listed as "getting better", with the rest described as "stable" or "unknown".
- Eleven categories were deemed to be in "poor" condition, with seven "fair", and three "good".
- The condition of eight other categories, including water quality, wetlands and riparian zones, which is land next to rivers, was listed as "not applicable" because of poor data.

The report also recommended:

- Greater collaboration with Tasmania's Aboriginal community, to incorporate Indigenous knowledge and values into improved environmental care
- Establishing more marine protected areas, including notake zones, to increase resilience of marine ecosystems
- Reviewing Tasmania's coastal policy, including impacts of climate change, development and recreational activities
- Implementing measures to end illegal clearance of native vegetation
- Developing a 'State of the Water' report

The new report said "significant investment" would be needed to implement the recommendations.

"Tasmania is experiencing significant impacts from climate change," the report stated.

"These impacts include the warming of seas around Tasmania faster than the global average, sandy beaches showing signs of erosion due to sea level rise, and the disappearance of kelp forests.

"Iconic vegetation communities have undergone concerning losses from bushfire, and face increased bushfire threat in the future.

"In addition, the number of native species closer to extinction continues to grow."

Results timelines for local council elections

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) will prepare for vote counting following the close of voting on Friday 25 October.

The VEC will accept postal votes that were completed by the voter before the close of voting up until 12 noon on Friday 1 November. Given complete results can only be determined once all admissible ballots have been received and counted, results timelines will vary across councils.

Provisional results will be published on the VEC website as they become available at vec.vic.gov.au – following completion of preference distributions or computer calculations.

All results are provisional until official declaration ceremonies are held, between Thursday 7 November and Friday 15 November.

There are 42 uncontested elections, where the number of nominations received by the close of nominations was equal to the number of vacancies. Voting was not required for these elections and their declarations will be held at the same time as the remaining ward declarations.

The Yarriambiack Shire Council election will be declared on Monday 28 October, as all 3 wards in the council were uncontested at the close of nominations and the 6 candidates have been elected unopposed.

Planting the seeds for carbon farming in Victoria Victorian State Government

The State Government is supporting farmers to reduce their emissions and improve the productivity of their farm with free training opportunities on offer across the state.

The Carbon Farming Outreach Program will deliver 130 events in Victoria over the next two years. The program kicks off this month with the Wimmera CMA's Chicks in the Sticks event, with speakers Fiona Conroy and Dr Cassandra Schefe sharing their knowledge and practical experience of low emissions farming.

In addition to the Carbon Farming Outreach Program, the Government is also providing grants to landowners in the North Central CMA region as part of the Victorian Carbon Farming Program to support tree planting on private land.

The VCFP is supporting farmers across the region to diversify income streams and gain a range of co-benefits associated with growing trees, including for shade and shelter, erosion control and timber production.

The State Government has set an ambitious target of net zero by 2045 and is supporting farmers to reduce their emissions with a \$20 million through the Agriculture Sector Pledge.

Helping families enrol in kinder

The State Government is making it easier and cheaper for families in 57 council areas to secure a kindergarten place, with extra funding for local council central enrolment systems.

A \$5.2 million in grants to support local councils to operate Central Registration and Enrolment Scheme (CRES) services for kindergarten was announced today – making it easier, faster and cheaper for families to apply for multiple services in their area.

More than 1,000 kindergartens are being supported to operate a CRES, making it free for families to apply to kindergarten.

Victorian families are also saving up to \$2,500 per child when accessing Free Kinder, giving our kids the very best start in life. More than 70,000 children across Victoria are enrolled through CRES, representing more than half of all enrolments.

The CRES grants enable councils to provide registration and enrolment services at no cost to families – another way that the State Government is working to support Victorian families with cost-of-living challenges.

Centralised systems also allow services to identify families who may be experiencing disadvantage and proactively engage with them, with direct links to other council-run services such as maternal and child health programs.

Excellence in every classroom

The State Government is building on its record investment in education – making sure all Victorian students get the best education with the launch of The Education State – Excellence in Every Classroom.

This builds on the strong foundations of statewide school infrastructure, investing more than \$16.9 billion for new and upgraded school gyms, ovals, playgrounds and open spaces.

Our nation leading \$600 million senior secondary, mental health, and wellbeing programs and our \$1.6 billion Disability Inclusion reform help Victorian schools deliver an inclusive education experience for every student with additional needs.

The Education State – Excellence in Every Classroom sets out five priorities for Victoria's education system, which has been developed following consultation with students, teachers, school leaders, and communities.

- Excellence in teaching and learning ensuring teachers have the resources and support they need so that every student can master the basics at school, as well as build knowledge across all areas of the curriculum.
- Every student matters supporting every student to feel welcome at school, not only to learn but also to belong, by continuing our nation-leading investments in wellbeing, mental health, and disability.
- Lift secondary school student engagement and achievement

 reshaping the secondary school experience including a
 greater focus in years 7-9 to meet the needs of today's
 learners and support engagement.
- Expand, support and recognise our school workforce

 investing in our hardworking teachers, principals and
 education support staff by reducing the administrative
 burden, growing the workforce and retaining our staff.
- Schools at the centre of communities connecting schools with the community better by continuing to build

kindergartens on school sites, strengthening transitions and making drop-off easier for families.

Since the launch of the Education State ten years ago, the State Government has invested an additional \$35 billion in Victorian students, teachers and school communities, helping us lead the nation in NAPLAN results, student attendance and senior secondary pathways while investing in modern school infrastructure in local communities.

In addition, the State Government is also embedding explicit teaching of systematic synthetic phonics as part of the reading programs in every classroom – this is backed by the most up-to-date national and international evidence and will ensure no child is left behind.

Safer and fairer apprenticeships

The State Government is backing workers, making apprenticeships safer and fairer across the state. The Government is accepting all recommendations of the Apprenticeship Taskforce report – in full or in-principle – and launched a \$9 million package to improve safety and mental health support for apprentices and trainees.

The reforms will provide more support for apprentices and their employers and address the key issues highlighted in the report, including safety, harassment, training quality, and fairness at work.

Among the first reforms to be implemented will be a pilot of a central helpdesk service, where apprentices and trainees can go for all types of workplace support. This helpdesk will be run by Apprenticeships Victoria and builds on the success of the Apprenticeship Support Program.

The Government has also given in-principal support to the establishment of a dedicated regulator for apprentices and trainees. The dedicated regulator will work to improve outcomes for Victoria's 77,000 apprentices and make the system easier to navigate, helping them stay in their chosen fields.

The package of reforms will include more support for employers of apprentices, greater inclusion and safety for women apprentices, modernising laws that govern the apprenticeship system, and better collaboration between agencies and the Commonwealth.

To further support our apprentices, the State Government has announced three new mental health programs that will be available to them, including the Apprentice Employee Assistance Program (EAP). The EAP offers free counselling and can be accessed online or by phone without the need for a referral.

Victoria's Apprenticeship Taskforce was established through the Victorian Budget 2023/24 and is chaired by Sharan Burrow AC, alongside representatives from unions, industry, and apprentices.

Apprenticeships Victoria, established in 2021, will oversee the new helpdesk and all mental health initiatives to make sure apprentices and trainees, across all industries, are getting the support they need to do well on the job.

New pack sizes for Panadol Haleon ANZ

Haleon, the makers of Panadol is rolling out new pack sizes ahead of upcoming legislative changes to minimise the risk of harm from misuse of paracetamol in Australia.

The changes are in response to the decision by the TGA to reduce the maximum available pack sizes of paracetamol-containing medicines for general sale in pharmacies.

From 1 February 2025, the changes are as follows:

- Packs of paracetamol-containing products for sale in supermarkets and convenience stores will contain a maximum of 16 capsules or tablets.
- In states and territories other than Western Australia and Queensland, packs of paracetamol-containing products available for self-selection in pharmacies, will contain a maximum of 50 capsules or tablets.
- · In pharmacies, packs of paracetamolcontaining products of more than 16 and more than 50 and up to 100 capsules/tablets will be available behind the counter, after speaking with a pharmacist.

The legislative date for changes is 1 February 2025, but some new packs have already started to appear on shelves.

Paracetamol remains a suitable and effective pain relief option. It is the most widely used pain relief medicine available without a prescription.

Over the counter analgesics should not be used for more than a few days at a time. If pain persists it is important to consult a healthcare professional.






