Following community consultation it was agreed that moving the roses was not a good idea because of their age and having grown well where they are thanks to Laureen Lloyd.



Pool passes pressure test



Winchelsea's new 25-metre pool has passed crucial testing of its structural integrity.

Contractors completed hydrostatic pressure testing by filling the pool as if ready for use, and leaving the water for several days while checking for leaks.

The pressure testing was successful and work continues on completing the pool.

Contractors have now started work on pouring concrete to form the adjoining leisure pool and zero-depth splash park.

The pool project remains on schedule for completion during summer, bringing fun times for families and users of all ages.

Tree assessments in preparation for river loop

Preparations for construction of the Barwon River Loop walk are continuing, including a detailed tree impact assessment.

The assessment determines which trees need to be removed or trimmed to provide space for the loop's two new viewing platforms and the bridge which will replace an existing culvert crossing.

Removal of any native trees will require a planning permit, with offset planting specified.

The loop, north of the Princes Highway will link with a previously completed path to the south, creating a two-kilometre path connecting Winchelsea's four quadrants and better connecting the community with the river environment.

Construction is expected to start in November or December.

More tree planting in partnership with the community

Street tree planting is continuing with officers working with community members identifying other locations to finalise this round of planting .

Planting of a total of about 40 trees in Witcombe Street and Austin Street, pictured, is complete.

Species planted include lemon scented gums, smooth barked apple gums and Pyrus Korean Sun ornamental pears.

Proposed Road Renaming Surf COAST



Proposed Renaming of Northern Section of Clarkes Road, Winchelsea South

Council is proposing to rename the northern section of Clarkes Road, Winchelsea South 'Cherry Lane' after Cherry Ballart (Exocarpos cupressiformis) a native plant found in the area.

Background

Council has an obligation in accordance with the Local Government Act 1989 and 2020, the Geographic Place Names Act 1998 and associated guidelines to ensure public safety and responsible service delivery to the community. Where Council identifies the potential for confusion and risk to public safety, Council must take steps to rectify the situation.

Council is proposing to rename the northern section of Clarkes Road, Winchelsea South to avoid confusion during emergency situations.

The above proposed road naming adheres to the Naming rules for places in Victoria-Statutory requirements for naming roads, features and localities 2022 (the Naming Rules) and Australian New Zealand Standards for rural and urban addressing AS/NZS 4819:2011.



Submission Process

In accordance with Section 223 of the Local Government Act 1989, submissions are invited on the proposed renaming of the section of Clarkes Road, Winchelsea South by 15 September.

Back to Basics Councillor Team Revealed

Surf Coast Shire councillor Paul Barker is leading a team of new candidates into the upcoming council elections.

They launched their campaign at the Torquay Bowls Club on Sunday evening with a dinner attended by more than 30 residents and early supporters. Councillors and candidates all addressed the guests with their vision and hopes.

Rebecca Bourke, local family counsellor, family law mediator and mother of two, described how the community is feeling let down by local and state governments. "I work with families everyday and I see that they are hurting. There are simple solutions, and getting council back to basics will be important for the prosperity of the shire, and Surf Coast families bottom line. Improving things like the council's community engagement process will be of great benefit moving forward." Eric Menouge, father of three and army special forces veteran, is determined to streamline the flow of information within the council to deliver faster real-world results. "The council should be fully transparent. It's alarming that basic information often requires a Freedom of Information request", Menogue stated. He believes that by improving communication and focusing on clear, measurable outcomes, the council can make smarter decisions that lead to quicker, tangible benefits for the community.

Joel Grist, an allied health business owner, is sick of the waste he's seen in council. "I've lived in Surf Coast Shire for 21 years and as a business owner I feel the budget is being mismanaged. If you want to deliver big budget projects, then you have to look at streamlining processes and cutting wasteful expenditure, not lump future ratepayers with debt." Councillor Barker then unveiled the group's 'Back to Basics' logo and its policy platform overview. ECONOMIC -A focus on core services. SERVICES -Ensure basic functions of council are achieved with everyone treated equally. **GOVERNANCE** - More transparency and empower ratepayers, residents and councillors to raise topics in council. SOCIAL - Support of Australia Day, Christmas, and women only spaces. DIVERSITY OF OPINION - we will be independent people who can disagree and debate in a civil manner. "Heading towards October we are looking for more candidates to join the group, and get general support from community members in our campaign with things like letterboxing, invites to speaking engagements, and of course hanging our signs on their property, so please get in touch." Cr Barker said.




Photo of the SS Warrimoo taken by Allan C. Green (1878-1954). Taken prior to 1918.

A Freak of Nature!

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was built in the U.K. for use in Australia and one was one of countless similar ships making passage between the continents at the end of the Victorian era.

The SS Warrimoo was making one such journey across the mid-Pacific on its way from Canada to Australia when the navigator finished working out a star fix and brought Captain John DS. Phillips, the result.

The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899.

"Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line". Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime.

He called his navigators to the bridge to check & double check the ship's position. He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather & clear night worked in his favour. At mid-night the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line. The consequences of this bizarre position were many:

The bow of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere & in the middle of summer.

The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere & in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was December 31, 1899.

The date in the forward part of the ship was January 1, 1900.


The ship was therefore concurrently in:

- two different days,
- two different months,
- two different years,
- two different seasons

ED NOTE: from Wikipedia:

- SS Warrimoo was a passenger and refrigerated cargo liner that was launched in 1892 in England for Australian owners, was later owned by two of New Zealand's foremost shipping companies, and finally belonged to a Singaporean company.
- Warrimoo was a troop ship in the First World War. In 1918 the French destroyer Catapulte collided with Warrimoo in the Mediterranean. In the collision some of Catapulte's depth charges broke loose and fell into the sea, where they detonated and sank both ships.

"The survey was quick and easy to complete, and it feels good to know that




my input will contribute to making our business community stronger."

Alex Dyson aiming to deliver Wannon its first ever Federal Independent

The event will feature local Wannon figures, performers, as well as federal Independent member for Goldstein Zoe Daniel, who will be able to share her insights into just how the region, and the country, can benefit from Independent Representation.

Education in the Anthropocene: addressing the environmental crisis means learning about our place in Earth's history

Education should prepare young people to face the challenges of their time. To keep up with the changing world, this means that education has to keep adjusting. But unfortunately, our education systems have fallen out of sync with the times.

Environmental decay is arguably the greatest challenge facing humanity today. However, education systems are failing to prepare young people for life on a rapidly changing planet.

One way to escape this trap is to shift our perspective on the period of time we inhabit. Instead of the 21st century, we might think of ourselves as living in the Anthropocene.

The Anthropocene is a proposed new geological epoch – a unit on the geologic timescale – characterised by unprecedented human influence over the natural environment. While a panel of geologists decoded against declaring the Anthropocene an official geological epoch in 2024, there's no doubt that it remains a powerful way to understand the world around us.

Thinking of "our times" as the Anthropocene – official epoch or not – rather than the 21st century forces us to confront "deep time". This means considering what our society is doing to the planet not just during our individual lifespans but over the long term, before we were born and after we die.

This could be, for example, considering how sea level change might affect the places we live in a hundred – or a thousand – years' time, and what life might be like then.

Educating differently

Recent education policy has often focused on "21st century skills" an idea that stresses the new challenges brought by an interconnected postindustrial society, such as navigating the benefits and pitfalls of new communication technologies. Concepts like "critical thinking", "collaboration" or "creativity" have become increasingly influential across many education systems around the world.

But the problem with this approach is that it reduces learning to an instrument to grow the economy. The "21st century skills" are now so commodified that we can almost think of them simply as tickets to the job market.

Critical thinking has come to mean "problem-solving for infinite growth" rather than an ability to truly reflect critically on our society's values and practices.

Shifting the focus to think about the long term shows us just how inadequate the idea of 21st century education is at tackling the challenges we face, including environmental degradation.


My research has focused on what an education fit for the Anthropocene might look like. Right now, this education often takes place outside school walls, such as among grassroots environmental movements. In my work, I argue that schools would do well to take a cue from these "alternative" spaces of learning if they are to remain relevant.

My research with activists has taught me that learning in the Anthropocene is not so much about specific skills as it is about rediscovering our own humanity.

This requires an emotional connection with what we learn. If we grasp what is at stake in the Anthropocene (the survival of our own species, among other things), we cannot help but care.

Learning with emotion

This emotional response fuels our imagination of different futures, which we can communicate to others, with whom we can act. It is a circular process: once we have communicated and acted with others, we might realise there was something we did not fully grasp, which makes us change our vision of the future, and communicate this to others.

This could mean many things in different contexts. In my own work as an educator, I have tried methods like participatory filmmaking wih students or exposing my students to art that enages with the emotional aspects of the unfolding environmental crises.

Rather than contributing to economic growth, the goal of education in this process is to help us realise our nature as beings that can grasp complex issues, care about them, communicate about them and act to change them. It means removing the obstacles that might get in the way of our ability to realise these aspects of our humanity.

Education fit for the Anthropocene is, in other words, simply an education fit for understanding what it means to be human.

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What the Council **Caretaker Period** Means for You

What is the Election Period?

The election period, also known as the "caretaker period," is the time leading up to the Council elections, which is 19 September 2024 through to 26 October 2024. During this time, specific rules and restrictions are in place to ensure the Council's actions are impartial and do not influence the election's outcome.

Impact on Council Activities

During the election period, the Council and its various units will experience significant restrictions on their usual activities. This includes limitations on making major policy decisions, entering into significant contracts or agreements, and initiating new projects. The aim is to maintain a fair and unbiased environment leading up to the election.

What This Means for You

For businesses and residents, this means there may be delays or temporary halts in certain services or communications from the Council. The Economic Development team, which regularly supports local businesses through initiatives and advice, will also be limited in its activities, but will maintain it's core services.

While ongoing projects will continue under strict guidelines, new initiatives and announcements will be paused until after the election.

Easing The Transition From Primary To Secondary School

The Victorian Government is helping keep students engaged in their education as they move from primary school into secondary school – a period where there can be higher levels of disengagement from learning.

Minister for Education Ben Carroll today released an update to materials for schools which are expected to support roughly 200,000 students every year through the transition.

The first day of secondary school can be daunting. While it is a period of tremendous growth and development for most young people, for some students, there is a heightened risk of disengagement from their education, poor wellbeing, and a decline in learning outcomes.

Keeping kids engaged in school helps them to be productive and successful young adults.

A student's transition experience is successful when they have good engagement with their peers and their families – this is especially important for students who may be at higher risk of a poor transition, including neurodiverse and Autistic students, students with disabilities and students from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

The updated materials feature a series of internal guidance, resources, and practical examples for schools to use through a four-year staged process from upper primary to lower secondary. This update, designed to provide greater support for students during their transition, is set to significantly enhance their engagement and overall experience for students in Years 5 to 8.

This update is particularly beneficial to parents, carers, and the broader network of family or guardians. Acknowledging their profound and formative impact on students, this support network is recognised as a major contributor to a successful transition.

The new guidance and resources cover four phases of transition:

- Preparation (Years 5 and 6)

 introduces students to general skills like organisation and time management that will help them navigate in a new environment, for example using lockers and having a timetable
- Transfer (end of Year 6) students can attend their new school for a day to learn the new layout and attend classes and meet key staff and future classmates
- Induction (Year 7) supports new students to develop a strong sense of connection and belonging in their new environment and to ease into the new practices, rhythms and relationships
- **Consolidation (Year 8)** builds on the skills, knowledge, and experiences students have gained in previous phases, with a strong emphasis on supporting their wellbeing and confidence in their learning environment.



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Kerry and Richard

Moving from Flinders Lane in the heart of Melbourne, Kerry and Richard landed in Winchelsea after many years of searching for a place in the country. Who would find a small rural town called Winchelsea, then find a piece of land abutting the railway line and see this as a place to build, to learn and to contribute to a new community? Then to work together to create their new home. Kerry and Richard would, and they have. Having lived in many different places in Australia as well as overseas, they have come to value the simplicity and complexity of creating a village. Bringing their skills of design and their understanding of true community development, this village offers them a chance to live in the country as well as the opportunity to explore everything from the beach to the mountains – a 360-degree window. Joining Winchelsea Land and River Care they are learning about the history of the area, the underlying values as well as the connection between soil, water, air, fire and design. 'Winchelsea has come out of the land and this authenticity is appealing.'



New Vlocity Trains Hit The Tracks In Regional Victoria

The State Government's first train from its latest order of new, locally made regional trains has started taking passengers on the V/Line network.

VLocity train number 119 is the first of 23 new trains ordered as part a \$601 million investment in the Victorian Budget 2023/24 – which will help deliver almost 200 additional weekend V/Line train services progressively in the coming years, meeting the increased popularity of regional rail travel in Victoria.


This order of VLocitys is replacing the longest serving Classic Fleet trains boosting Victoria's VLocity fleet to 141 trains once the rollout is complete.

The extra trains will deliver more reliable journeys on the Geelong and Bacchus Marsh corridors, and will also help lift capacity on the Melton line by 50 per cent, with nine-car services to be introduced following the completion of the Melton Line Upgrade.

The new trains feature improved accessibility, with six spaces in each

three-car set for wheelchair or mobility scooter users and space for up to six bicycles.

A new train will roll off Alstom's Dandenong production line approximately once a month, with the project supporting around 500 local jobs.





Celebration Series TUTOR LEARNING INITIATIVE

David Peel is an experienced teacher and a Learning Specialist at our school.

As part of the Department's Tutor Learning Initiative, David works with a number of students in small groups and one-on-one settings to maximise learning.



The Victorian Government is helping primary school students get the best maths education with support for more teachers to become mathematics specialists. A further 100 government school teachers will become mathematics education specialists through the Primary Mathematics and Science Specialists (PMSS) initiative.

It is part of the Government's plan to deliver teaching excellence in maths and science and will ensure more students excel in both subjects. The teachers will be trained over the next two years – giving them expert knowledge and skills to teach and assess mathematics. They'll use the skills to boost primary students' engagement and achievement in mathematics – an underpinning of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) disciplines.

The next 100 teachers to become maths specialists will follow in the footsteps of the 800 teachers from 430 schools who have already completed the training and are now leaders in STEM knowledge and delivery within their schools.

Schools To Get Creative With The Curriculum

Students will have the chance to build new creative skills with applications now open for the 2025 Creative Learning Partnerships program. Public, independent and catholic schools are invited to apply for the program which supports schools to work with artists, creative collectives and companies on a creative residency project that is linked to the curriculum.

Grants of \$10,000 are available for schools to partner with an individual artist or \$35,000 to partner with a creative collective or company, with residency projects happening in Terms 2 to 4 in 2025. The Government has supported creative education programs for more than 40 years and has connected more than 1500 artists with 1200 schools – giving 70,000 students unique and exciting creative experiences.

Hundreds take part in soft plastics recycling trial

Surf Coast Shire Council ran a soft plastics collection trial over the past month to reduce waste to landfill and maximise resource recovery, resulting in a positive circular economy outcome for our community.

Soft plastics are 'flexible' plastic packaging that can be easily scrunched in your hand, like bread bags, chip packets, bubble wrap, zip lock bags, which are not accepted in kerbside yellow-lid recycling bins.

Community members were encouraged to collect their clean and dry soft plastics during July and drop off them off for free at drop off sites located in Anglesea, Lorne, Torquay and Winchelsea over the first weekend in August.

"Soft plastics are one of the hardest types of waste for householders to deal with, so we decided to trial a once-off drop-off collection to help residents recycle them and to collect data to inform possible future programs", Mayor Cr Liz Pattison said.

"We had a great response with hundreds of residents taking up the opportunity to recycle the soft plastics they'd been collecting. The total customers through the drop off sites for the trial period was 487, with 339 of them visiting the Torquay drop off site," she said.

"A total of 1,328 bags full of soft plastic were deposited with bag sizes could varying from a bread bag up to a 25kg dog food bag."

"The plastics will be baled and sent for processing in Melbourne to be converted into new soft plastics packaging and recycled road products."

"We would be very keen to hear from the community about their experiences with this trial, and encourage people to complete our soft plastics collection trial survey to help with our evaluation."

"We're lucky to have an environmentally conscience community and it was great to see so many people getting involved in this circular economy initiative. We will continue to work closely with our community through implementing actions from our recently adopted Circular Economy Action Plan 2024-2027 to reduce waste going into landfill and increase resource recovery," she said.

The soft plastics trial is now complete, and Council are evaluating the results. If you still have soft plastics and need to dispose of them, please put them in your red lid landfill bin, not in your yellow lid recycling bin.

Avoiding waste in the first place is always a better action than recycling waste, so residents are encouraged



where possible to try to avoid soft plastics, for example, bring your own bags and containers to stores, avoid single-use plastic films, buy loose produce, and choose items with zero or minimal packaging.

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Carrie the Musical Features Local Talent

The actual book written by Stephen King is 50 years old this year and still remains one of the great horror stories but the musical score to this production will truly amaze you . Tickets are available through TRYBOOKINGS .

Carrie White is a misfit. At school, she's an outcast who's bullied by the popular crowd, and virtually invisible to everyone else. At home, she's at the mercy of her loving but cruelly over-protective mother. But Carrie's just discovered she's got a special power, and if pushed too far, she's not afraid to use it.

Set in the present in the small New England town of Chamberlain, Maine, Carrie: The Musical features a book by Lawrence D. Cohen (screenwriter of the classic film), music by Academy Award winner Michael Gore (Fame, Terms of Endearment), and lyrics by Academy Award winner Dean Pitchford (Fame, Footloose).

Stephen King's blockbuster 1974 debut novel Carrie sold over a million copies in its first year of publication. The classic 1976 film adaptation, directed by Brian De Palma, became a critical and box office smash, and earned two Academy Award nominations — for Sissy Spacek as Carrie and Piper Laurie as Margaret White. First presented by the Royal Shakespeare Company, the original musical adaptation of Carrie premiered in Stratford-Upon-Avon in England for a limited run in February, 1988. Transferring to Broadway, it opened at the Virginia Theater on May 12, 1988 starring Betty Buckley, Linzi Hateley, Sally Ann Triplett, Paul Gyngell, Gene Anthony Ray, Charlotte d'Amboise and Darlene Love. Fiercely polarizing audiences and proving wildly divisive with critics, the show famously closed after only 16 previews and 5 performances.

Though the production did not run long enough to generate a Broadway cast recording, bootlegged audio and video tapes from the production started to appear online. They attracted so much interest and demand that the authors decided to revisit the piece 24 years later.

On March 1, 2012, their revamped version of Carrie: The Musical opened off-Broadway, presented by MCC at the Lucille Lortel Theatre, starring Marin Mazzie and Molly Ranson. Featuring an updated script and new songs in a smaller-scaled production, the show received multiple award nominations, and was named Best Off-Broadway Musical by the Off-Broadway Alliance. A live performance was filmed by the New York Public Library's Theatre on Film and Tape Archives, and Sh-K-Boom Records released the Premiere Cast Recording.


With a stronger and more resonant focus on high school bullying and social isolation, this resurrected version went on to successful productions across North America and in locations around the world, including London, Manila, Spain, Germany, Australia, and New Zealand.

On April 18, 2018, the hit CW high school television series Riverdale featured a special musical episode centered around Carrie: The Musical. It was a huge hit with critics and viewers alike, and YouTube videos of its songs now exceed 20 million hits.



NATIONAL TRUST - "An attractive bluestone church built in 1870. The main facade has an unusual arrangement of triple gables embracing twin porches and central windows and of interest for its meticulously detailed window tracery. "

The first Presbyterian service at Winchelsea was held in the Shire Hall on 19/9/1869.

Nineteen months later, on 30/4/1871, the existing bluestone church was opened for public worship. The stone was quarried and carted from local quarries to the site by members of the congregation. The church was not complete on opening as the porches and vestry were added at a later date. The initial cost of the building was \$764. Presbytery approved the appointment of Messrs. George Anderson, William Stirling, Henry Meyler and Archibald McIntyre as Trustees of the Winchelsea Property.

Rev. Henry B Giles was inducted as the first Minister on 16/8/1870.

The Foundation Stone was laid by William Stirling and engraved "WS" on the left hand porch as you enter the church.

The Manse was built in 1911 and the Sunday School Hall was built in 1936.

In 1969 Miss Helen Mary Kinninmonth left a bequest for the building of a Kindergarten.

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
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
