










FY 2023-2024 OPERATION REVENUE

OPERATION EXPENSE








FY 2023/2024 GROWTH

- 26% Increase in hours of one-on-one Mentoring







YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH IN OREGON

- Oregon is the second-worst ranked state (49 out of 50) for youth mental health.
- 25% of Oregon youth experienced at least one Major Depressive Episode (MDE) in the past year. Nearly half (45%) of them received no treatment, counseling, or medication.
- 15% of Oregon youth had serious thoughts of suicide.
- 12.5% of Oregon youth reported a substance use disorder in the past year.

STATS FOR THE 97759 ZIP CODE

- 17.2% of the population under-18
- 7.6% of youth live below the poverty line
- 3.1% of youth live in a home without internet access
- 1.1% of youth speak a language other than English at home
- 22% of families eligible for food stamps/SNAP benefits
- \$103,721 is the median annual family income (30% of families earn less than \$75,000/year)

SISTERS SCHOOL DISTRICT AT-A-GLANCE PROFILE (POST-COVID)

- Total student enrollment = 1,165
- Students supported by Special Education department = 13%
- Students attending more than 90% of enrolled school days = 71% (OR avg = 62%)
- 3rd graders meeting state language arts standards = 52% (OR avg = 40%)
- 8th graders meeting state mathematics standards = 30% (OR avg = 26%)
- 9th graders on track to graduate = 95% (OR avg = 84%)
- Students earning a diploma within 4 years = 90% (OR avg = 81%)
- Students qualifying for free or reduced-price lunch = 18%
- Students are non-white = 17%
