




State Funding Update

How Lakota Fared in Ohio Budget

We wanted to provide an update on state funding as it affects Lakota. Unfortunately, we don't have good news.

Governor John Kasich, in signing the state biennium budget, used a line-item veto to eliminate a component of state education funding. He eliminated the Tangible Personal Property tax reimbursement provided to many school districts, including Lakota. The change will take effect in the 2016-17 school year. It means a reduction of \$3.1 million annually in our state funding beginning that year.



The governor's action came after both the Ohio House and Ohio Senate revised the governor's initial budget proposal, which called for large cuts to many school districts. The legislature instead passed a budget that ensured no school district would receive a funding cut during the two-year biennium. The legislators had responded to an outpouring of public concern about cutting funds to schools and children while the state continues to build up a "rainy day fund," now at \$1.5 billion, and is also cutting income taxes.

We are extremely disappointed in the governor's actions, in ignoring the clear wishes both of Ohio's citizens as well as the Ohio House and Ohio Senate.

We do appreciate the efforts from both the House and the Senate, which held our district harmless from the initial cuts proposed by the governor. But we are disappointed that there isn't sufficient support in the legislature to override the veto.

All of us at Lakota greatly appreciate the phone calls and emails so many of you made to advocate for our children's schools during this budget process.

We will analyze the impact this has to our budget in 2017 and beyond, and plan accordingly. And, we will continue with stringent cost-control measures that are already in place. So while there should be no significant impact on the coming school year, we must begin working immediately on how to best absorb a \$3.1 million reduction in yearly funding that will take effect one year from now.

Meanwhile, we've been working hard to prepare for the beginning of school! We look forward to welcoming our students back this month.

A Busy Summer Makes Way for an Exciting New Year

Around Lakota, the last school bus pulling away is the signal for a long list of summer work. Here's a quick look at what this summer's "to do" list means for the new school year.



Maintenance & Construction

Summer doubles as construction and maintenance season in the school world.

To make good on another levy promise, Lakota embarked on 11 major safe and secure entrance projects. New entrances at the following schools will have visitors entering directly through the main offices.

- Independence
- Shawnee
- Woodland
- Adena
- Ridge Junior

Note: The other 11 schools are already equipped with this entrance type.

Summer is the only time of year Lakota's custodial staff can give all 22 schools' combined 2.4 million square feet a deep clean. Training on proper cleaning techniques help extend the lifespan of flooring, furniture, windows and more.



Staff Learning

Twice this summer, Lakota hosted a professional development series for staff and by staff. Each offered more than 50 course options to help staff in all 22 schools come together and share ideas for the next school year.

Throughout the year, hundreds of professional development opportunities were made available to staff, both in person and online. Staff participated in several pilot programs to test the effectiveness of new instructional technology tools made possible by the levy.



A Busy Hiring Season

One of the largest classes of retiring teaching professionals in Lakota's history made this summer an exceptionally busy hiring season. The increase in retirements is attributed to changes in the state retirement system. The district maintained strict evaluative staffing strategies to review each position against student support needs.

A new teacher contract transformed the approach to teacher salaries, saving the district significantly over the long-term and boosting the starting salary to help Lakota attract top talent in an increasingly competitive market. Part of Lakota's recruitment efforts centers on increased diversity, to reflect the diversity among Lakota students. Some full-time and part-time positions for both teaching and support staff are still open. Visit Lakotaonline.com/employment.



- A new learning management system is being piloted this fall through a digitally enhanced high school government course. It will grow to support other blended and online student learning opportunities.
- Modernized document cameras in the K-6 schools, interactive whiteboards for grades 7-12 and modern computing devices at all schools are replacing failing, 10-year-old technology. The updated tools will support Lakota's move to more modern instruction and digital learning.
- Expanded capacity and capability for Internet resources is being achieved with continued upgrades to network infrastructure.

- In addition to art, music and PE, first- through sixth-graders will enjoy a technology special, for development of state and nationally recommended technology skills.
- A new mobile app through Home Access Center will allow parents and students to quickly and easily access grades and assignments from their mobile devices (see Lakota's website).
- For a second year, Lakota is making available to all grades 2-12 students the full Microsoft Office suite for their personal devices at no cost (see Lakota's website).
- The Lakota school board just adopted BoardDocs, a paperless solution for more open communication with the public. Visit Lakota's website to see old and new board business.



Lakota continues to add innovative and still cost-conscious and healthy items to its menu. In fact, Child Nutrition Director Chris Burkhardt was recognized over the summer as a top 10 national foodservice influencer by Foodservice Director

New made-to-order lunch options like the noodle bar at the high schools will allow students to mix and match their favorite ingredients. Other food stations, like the SLURP bar for custom soup orders and the panini bar for grades 7-12, use the same serving model and follow the same healthy food guidelines set by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Burkhardt also worked with Domino's Pizza to develop a healthier version of its personal pan pizza, an item that will be expanding to more K-12 cafeterias next year.
