The Bible is INSPIRED by God.

"All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful to teach us what is true and to make us realize what is wrong in our lives. It corrects us when we are wrong and teaches us to do what is right." || 2 Timothy 3:16, NLT




HOMEWORK VIDEO TWO

Have you ever tried reading the Bible for yourself? Did you find it easy or difficult to navigate? If difficult, what made It difficult?

2 Some religions believe that their sacred text is too difficult for an ordinary person without years of study and instruction to understand. Why do you think Christians encourage everyone to read the Bible for themselves? What problems might emerge from a person reading the Bible without a sufficient understanding of its context?

What Is the Old Testament About?

The Bible could be broken into four chapters.



This lesson will cover the first two chapters; the next will cover the second two.

CHAPTER ONE: CREATION

The Bible is a book about God. It begins with Him and ends with Him.

The Creation

God is the Creator.

"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." || Genesis 1:1, NIV

God creates everything out of nothing.



God speaks creation into being.

"Then God said, "Let us make human beings in our image, to be like us. They will reign over the fish in the sea, the birds in the sky, the livestock, all the wild animals on the earth, and the small animals that scurry along the ground."

So God created human beings in his own image. In the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

Then God blessed them and said, 'Be fruitful and multiply. Fill the earth and govern it. Reign over the fish in the sea, the birds in the sky, and all the animals that scurry along the ground.'" || Genesis 1:26-28, NLT

For relationship to be genuine, there must be the option to opt out.

God gave the man and the woman one command to obey:

"And the Lord God commanded the man, 'You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die." || Genesis 2:16-17, NIV

CHAPTER TWO: THE FALL


The man and the woman disobeyed God. The consequence for disobeying God is death.


Take a quick tour of the Old Testament by looking at these snapshots from some of the major Old Testament passages. If you've never looked up a verse in the Bible before, start in the Table of Contents. If you're trying to find Genesis 2:15, Genesis will be the book you're looking for. Flip there. Then, look for chapter two (the larger numbers) and then verse 15 (the smaller numbers).

As you look up these passages, note the many connections between different parts of the Bible. Although they are written by different authors at different times, the themes of God's love and grace are consistent throughout the scriptures.

- 1. Where is Adam placed in Genesis 2:15?
- 2. What place are the Israelites leaving in Exodus 6:6? Who is their leader?
- 3. Where will the new king (David) be anointed in I Samuel 16:1?
- 4. Where did Solomon summon the people to dedicate the temple in I Kings 8:1?
- 5. What New Testament event is prophesied in Psalm 22: 1,7,17-18?
- 6. Where did Micah prophesy the Messiah would be born in Micah 5:2?

CHAPTER THREE: REDEMPTION


As in the previous homework, take a quick tour of the New Testament by looking at these snapshots from some of the major New Testament passages.

Compare these translations of John 3:16 (one of the best-known verses in the Bible. What similarities do you notice? What differences? Which do you find the most appealing?

(English Standard Version) "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." (New International Version)

"For this Is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes In him will not perish but have eternal life."

(New Living Translation)

"For God so loved the world that

Son, that whoever believes In
Him should not perish but have
everlasting life."
(New King James Version)

If you don't yet own a Bible, consider buying one this week. If you're unsure which translation to choose, we'd recommend starting with one toward the middle of the spectrum (for example, the NIV or NLT).

How Do I Read the Bible? VIDEO SIX

There are a lot of great ways to read the Bible - but there are a couple of important ways to NOT read the Bible.

The Read-at-Random Approach

The Reader-Response Approach

This approach assumes the reader, not the author, gets to determine meaning.

2 Peter 1:3-11, New Living Translation

3 By his divine power, God has given us everything we need for living a godly life. We have received all of this by coming to know him, the one who called us to himself by means of his marvelous glory and excellence. 4 And because of his glory and excellence, he has given us great and precious promises. These are the promises that enable you to share his divine nature and escape the world's corruption caused by human desires.

5 In view of all this, make every effort to respond to God's promises. Supplement your faith with a generous provision of moral excellence, and moral excellence with knowledge, 6 and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with patient endurance, and patient endurance with godliness, 7 and godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love for everyone.

8 The more you grow like this, the more productive and useful you will be in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. 9 But those who fail to develop in this way are shortsighted or blind, forgetting that they have been cleansed from their old sins.

10 So, dear brothers and sisters, work hard to prove that you really are among those God has called and chosen. Do these things, and you will never fall away. 11 Then God will give you a grand entrance into the eternal Kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.
